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### DEVOTIONAL



Scripture: St. Matthew 16:13-16; St. Luke 18:18-30.

"Good Master, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?"

If someone in a crowd turned to you and said, "Who is this Jesus I keep hearing about?" What would you answer?

It has been said that a true witness for a person must tell only what he knows, not just what he (or she) hears about that person. So, to witness for Christ to the world we must keep our witness simple, to be able to answer quickly and joyfully: "Jesus is the only begotten Son of God!"

Next questions asked probably would be "How do you know? Who told you? Or, where did you learn who He is? Well, how do you know, or rather, how do I know who Jesus is? I know Jesus now personally, but I came

to know Him this way: I heard about Jesus. All my family believed in Him and belonged to His church; prayer was prayed daily in my home in His name; I learned from my family that Jesus was God's Son, loving, forgiving, merciful, and had died to pay for our sins.
