## Dimmitt, Sudan Split

The accurate firing of Candace Mudgett and Jackie Norman paced the Sudan Hornets to their third straight win in the basketball season Tuesday night as Sudan won over Dimmitt 54-47. In the first game of the season for the boys, Dimmitt's team defeated Sudan 42-34.

Miss Norman, a new player for Sudan this year, and only a sophomore, contributed 20 points, second only to Miss Mudgett's 24.

The first period ended with the Hornets leading 17-9, and the Sudan forwards kept the nets hot in the second quarter, scoring 18 points. It seemed that both teams kept the free throw line busy, but somehow only one girl fouled out. When the second half began, the Hornets had a 35-27 lead over the Dimmitt girls, and kept it for the final 24-47 victory.

Scoring high for Dimmitt was Ladawn Kemp with 22 points.

Although victory slipped out of the hands of the Hornets, they played a good first game. They showed a lot of hustle and potential and did extremely well with only two practice days.

The Hornets trailed at the end of the first quarter 5-6, and the Dimmitt boys still had a four point margin over them at intermission. Sudan did a fine job of "struggling" the ball, but they still were behind 25-31 at the beginning of the last quarter. Even though Tommy Thomson's 13 points, and Corley Baker's 10, the Hornets couldn't catch up.

Ladell Frazier scored high for Dimmitt with 15 points.

For many Sudan football fans, it was a bear fight, but most folks nevertheless enjoyed last Friday night's 20-7 win over the visiting Hale Center Owls. The victory closed out the Sudan football season, leaving the Hornets with a 4-6 record, and third place in the district.

Last year the Owls beat Sudan in the final game to prevent the Hornets from winning their first district title ever. And though there was nothing at stake Friday night except prestige, it was a close, hard-fought battle.

The game was a lot closer than

the contest, as Sudan had a single touchdown lead until freshman guard Ronnie Brown fell on a fumble in the Owl's zone for a touchdown on the last play of the game.

Biggest play of the night was a 69-yard run by Sudan junior fullback Danny Masten, who made the long run in the second quarter to bring Sudan from behind a 7-6 score. Masten picked up a hobbled pitchout and then appeared due to take his lumps far back of the line of scrimmage, but somehow got away and then again appeared trapped before he suddenly thrust into the clear and outran everybody, with so many Hornet blockers trailing him it appeared the whole Sudan team was going to the showers.

The slashing runs of Negro halfback J. D. Davis kept Hale Center in the game. Davis repeatedly ran for good yardage, but never was allowed to break away.

Sudan took the opening kickoff and drove 90 yards to score, with Pat Brown crashing over from the 2 for his 50th point of the season. Brown, Tommy Thomson, Danny Allen and Donny Ford were playing their last games in Hornet uniform.

Hale Center scored early in the second, as Davis did most of the damage in a 41-yard drive. However, HB Mark Laney scored, from the 1. Guard Larry McMinn kicked the point which gave the Owls a brief lead before Masten's long run. Mike Smith ran for two points and it was 14-8 at halftime.

The last half saw no serious threats by either team, and Brown scored his TD on the last play as the Owl quarterback faded back near the goal intending to pass. When he was hit, he fumbled, and Brown fell on it in the end zone, a play which doubtless pleased his father, Sudan Coach Hank Brown.

Farwell won the district title with a 25-6 whipping of Springlake last week, after trailing 6-3 at halftime. The Steers will face the heralded Petersburg Buffaloes Friday night in Lubbock.

Scripture: St. Matthew 16:13-16; St. Luke 18:18-30.  
"Good Master, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?"  
If someone in a crowd turned to you and said, "Who is this Jesus I keep hearing about?" What would you answer?  
It has been said that a true witness for a person must tell only what he knows, not just what he (or she) hears about that person. So, to witness for Christ to the world we must keep our witness simple, to be able to answer quickly and joyfully: "Jesus is the only begotten Son of God!"  
Next questions asked probably would be "How do you know? Who told you? Or, where did you learn who He is? Well, how do you know, or rather, how do I know who Jesus is? I know Jesus now personally, but I came

to know Him this way: I heard about Jesus. All my family believed in Him and belonged to His church; prayer was prayed daily in my home in His name; I learned from my family that Jesus was God's Son, loving, forgiving, merciful, and had died to pay for our sins. I heard about Jesus, and I felt strange and lonely that I did not belong to His church, so joyfully I went down the church aisle, at the altar to "join" His church. No longer lost and outside, but now I belonged to Jesus. I was nine years old.

Since that time, I have fallen, I have stumbled, I have been disobedient to God; but He remembered me (even me, praise His name!) and kept calling me back into the right way, the straight and narrow way that is the only way into eternal life. I was "prone to wander", but Jesus kept calling, kept forgiving me, and again at the altar, I finally said "Here am I - just as I am - take me and use me. I give myself and my all to thee."

So, I knew by experience that Jesus had the power, not only to save me from sin and death into right and eternal life. I knew that He also had the power to keep me clean and use me in His service to do His will here, if I would be willing. I learned

who Jesus is by daily experience, by prayer, by reading of the Bible, by fellowship and companionship of others who know Him, by my faith to believe in Him. I know Jesus through faith and in obedience as my personal Savior, my Lord, my Friend, my Counselor, my Comforter, my Guide, my Forgiving Heavenly Father! He is my hope, my joy, my all in all, King of Kings and Lord of Lords!

Now that I have told you something of what Jesus means to me, to be a true witness, I must ask you: Will you take Jesus and learn of Him? Will you believe His Word, and surrender yourself to Him, that you, too, may have eternal life, starting now, when you accept Jesus as God's only Son who came to die and save you from your sins? (Do you yet lack only one thing?) Will you confess Jesus as your personal Savior? Turn from your own way, ask Him to forgive you, and take Him now; be ready when He calls for you. Jesus is the only way into eternal life.
