EATING PECANS is sort of like eating chicken, except the pecans taste better. But in each case, the eating, no matter how good, is just not worth it.

Chicken, for example, is pretty good, but by the time you gnaw around on the bone, you've got a little bitty bite of meat, and grease all over your face, and in spite of all the contortions you go to trying to get the good parts separated from the bone, you usually wind up biting !! down on a bone.

Exceptions, of course, include gamers, which cherry lake a evenpts from GR Tire Stoop. I also file the pulley bone, which some folks call the wishbone, and which is poetly easy to deparate good from bad.

To me, eating chicken is just more trouble than it's worth, and if you want a real mess, try it barbecued.

Pecam offer another frustrating food. But pecans are so good, I eat them in spite of all my complaints. Little pecans just aren't worth fooling with. But big ones, paper shell, one can cat. What you do is take a couple of them and squeeze them in the palm, and just when you think it ought to be called iron shell instead of papershell, it gives way suddenly and you smash it into little giblets all over your hand. Then you throw it away and crack another.

Then you start digging. You see a big half pecan that looks delicious. By the time you get it out, it is in 17 pieces and your thumb is beginning to hurt, Finally, triumphantly, you have the kernel separated from the shell and you eat it. Delicious, but just barely enough to taste, so you tackle another one feverishly, mouth watering, and this just gives you another tantalizing taste, so you've got to try another, Pretty soon your thumb is raw and bleeding and you have to quit.

Of course, if you have the will power to wait, you can shell 15 or 20 pecans before you even taste them, and after 30 minutes of shelling, you can take two big delicious mouthsful, and that way you may figure it was almost. worth it,

I remember one time I shelled out a pile of goodies like that once, anticipating a real good bite, and some fiend came along and swiped the pile and ate it. I exercised remarkable restraint and only hit her twice.



Farm Bureau Seeks End Of Agriculture Controls

A national farm leader has called on the new administration to reassess the unsatisfactory experience with a government-controlled economy in agriculture and take steps to permit greater freedom for the market to operate.

"Farmers are ready to lead the way," Charles B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, asserted.

Mr. Shuman said that farmera "have indicated in many ways their rejection of a government-managed agriculture -they ask only to be unshackled and given the opportunity to produce for consumers rather than for politicians."

He added that "Farm Bureau will gladly cooperate with the administration in any sincere re-evaluation of government agricultural programs and policies."

"The time is here," he said, "to clear the decks for competition in both domestic and world markets," but he pointed out that if farmers are to do this, "it is imperative that the entire national economy be more definitely market-orien-

Mr. Shuman said that "clearing the decks for competition" will not be accomplished "merely by blocking new attempts to increase government intervention in agriculture," but "existing government production control devices and artificial pricing mechanisms" must be eliminated as rapidly as possible.

"We may never find a better time than now to dispose of these legalistic and costly structures which have become such a burden on farmers and taxpayers alike," he said.



# **Medicare Would** Cost \$35 Billion Congress Is Told

WASHINGTON-Enactment of the Administration's Medicare health program (King - Anderson Bill) will cost \$35 billion for benefits to the aged eligible for treatment, the American Medical Association has told Con-

Testifying before the House Ways and Means Committee, the AMA said that this huge outlay would be necessary to pay for the health care for the rest of the lives of the elderly qualified to take part in the program at the start even though they would have paid little, or nothing,

under the program. Other arguments against the measure that have been presented to the Committee include the following:

1. The resulting Social Security Tax increase would have to be double the amount proposed by the Administra-

2. This proposed boost comes at a time when the Administration is urging Congress to lower personal and corporate income taxes as an incentive to economic growth.

3. There is no justification for the use of tax funds collected from workers at the low end of the income scale to pay medical expenses for the entire elderly population, including the self-supporting and the wealthy.

4. The aged who need help in meeting medical bills are already receiving it through private health insurance, through public funds and through self-financing.

A majority of the voters opposed passage of the King-Anderson bill in 34 polls conducted by senators and congressmen to ascertain the sentiment of their constituents, according to Rep. Tom Curtis (R.-Mo.).

# March of Dimes Plans to Double Birth Defects and Arthritis Centers

Announcing plans to double the present number of March of Dimes birth defects and arthritis, centers in the nation, the world's most successful voluntary health organization this week launched its traditional January fund-raising

Basil O'Connor, president of The National Foundation-March of Dimes, which financed development of both polio vac-cines, said the goal this year would be \$45 million, "a sum our medical and scientific advisers agree we can wisely use to combat the ravages of these cripplers. This sum would apply to patient care, research, professional and public educa-

The March of Dimes now supports some 77 birth defects and arthritis treatment centers across the country. According to Dr. William S. Clark, director of the medical department of The National Foundation-March of Dimes, the national dimensions of the health problems posed by birth defects and arthritis "have grown to a point where this nation re-quires at least 100 centers for birth defects and 50 for ar-

Through the generosity the American people, we will build up our chapter and center programs across the United States to meet their needs. Our

States to meet their needs. Our offensive against both these crippling affictions will be redoubled in 1964."

Leading in this offensive will be the members of the 3,000 March of Dimes chapters in the nation plus the volunteers they enlist—an expected army of two million people. The campaign continues throughout January and culminates with the Mothers' March during which some 15 million homes are visited from coast to coast. In addition, a total of 36 million "mailers" are distributed nationally to inform families of the health aims of the March of Dimes and they alse serve as a means of returning contributions to local chapters. The herculean task of addressing those envelopes regionally is unselfably assumed by volunteers—thousands of teenagers,
