## Sudan Man Named Texas CROP Head

The Texas CROP-CWS Board at its annual meeting in Austin last week elected Joe T. Salem, a Methodist layman of Sudan, as Chairman of the body for 1964.

CROP (Christian Rural Overseas Program) is the Community Resource program of Church World Service and conducts appeals in the state, through county and community committees, for farm commodities and cash to purchase food and self-help supplies for the overseas program of the churches. It is composed of members of the major Protestant denominations and farm ranch organizations and is sponsored by the Texas Council of Churches.

Adopted for the year was a goal in value of commodities and cash of \$150,000, and an additional goal of 300,000 pounds of food.

## Smith Seeking Second Term

Preston Smith of Lubbock has announced his candidacy for a second term as Lieutenant Governor. He called for "an intelligent and determined effort" to trim non-essentials from the State's 1965-66 budget.

"Texas is spending \$3.2 billion this biennium, and the pressure will be on the Legislature to go much higher next session," Lt. Gov. Smith said. "If this happens, it will mean a tax increase. This we should make all reasonable efforts to avoid."

He cited President Johnson's economy drive at the federal level as a good example for state and local governments to follow.

"A dollar saved at the state-house or courthouse adds just as much to the private economy as one saved at Washington," he said. Smith and his wife Ina have two children, Mickey, 22, and Jan, 18, both Texas Tech students.

## 500 PHONES REFLECT GROWTH OF SUDAN

If telephone growth is a measuring stick in determining a city's progress, Sudan has come a long way in the past 30 years. The number of telephones in Sudan recently climbed over the 500 mark, according to R. E. Saunders, district manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

"This milestone is even more impressive when compared to the number of telephones in Sudan 30 years ago," Saunders said. "In 1930, Sudan had only 78 telephones."

The town has experienced steady gains through the years, and has gained over 37 phones during 1963. According to forecasts and estimates, Sudan should have around 600 telephones by 1967, Saunders added.

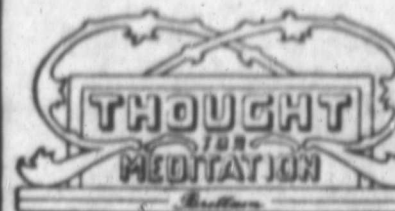

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### Education—and America's Future A Proposal by William S. Paley

Because the least educated worker is usually first to be hardest hit when business is slow, the nation's educators consider themselves in the front lines of the battle against chronic unemployment.

Many have joined with labor experts in hearty welcome of a proposal by William S. Paley, chairman of the Columbia Broadcasting System, for the establishment of clear-cut national educational policies and standards. Mr. Paley, who speaks with particular authority because he headed the Presidential commission appointed in 1952 to evaluate the nation's material resources, asserts that human resources are "the most priceless of all."

He sees the pace at which jobs for the unskilled are disappearing as one of the most startling social facts of our time.

In a convocation address at Bates College, Mr. Paley warned that failure to deal adequately with the problem will create "a giant pool of unused and unusable human resources that will sap the whole economic foundation of our society."

Noting that as recently as three years ago two of five Americans had not gone be-

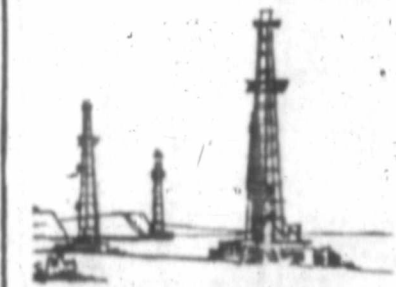
yond the eighth grade, Mr. Paley urges two "essential standards to fix the number of years that a student is required to attend school and the number of hours of instruction he receives."

Second, he suggests: "If a state, for any reason, fails to provide the necessary basic education which the nation's interests require, the federal government must step in and fill the void. To discourage laggards, federal funds now going to such states for other purposes may have to be diverted to the educational system."

Stressing that education and democracy are "necessarily interdependent," Mr. Paley says the gap will widen between what poorer and richer states spend for education in the years to come.

Mr. Paley points out that, since 53 per cent of the population favored federal aid to education in a 1961 poll, the "will of the American people is being thwarted" by present policies.

"We cannot be content with the incredible idea that the accident of a child's place of residence will decide whether he shall have an adequate educational opportunity," he declares.
