HUNDREDS OF times in my life I have left a cut finger or other bruise or skinned place unbandaged so that it would heal faster. "Leave it out for the open air; it'll be healthier," I had heard all my life. So even if it did stand more chance of being rapped accidentally and painfully, I bravely left it uncovered.

Now comes Parade, a Sunday supplement, to inform me that all those wounds would have healed faster and with less danger of additional irritation if I had bandaged them up. Parade reported the following experiment:

Seven San Quentin prisoners volunteered to help answer the question of whether wounds heal faster when covered or left exposed. The answer: wounds that got no air healed two to five times faster than the exposed ones. A couple of doctors (or butchers?) sliced into the arms of each convict and covered half of each wound with airtight film. Anti-biotic solution was applied to all wounds. The bandaged areas subsequently acquired a healthy new skin covering faster than the exposed areas.

Such activities could greatly increase the sales of band-aids and numbers of sore-armed prisoners.

THE AMERICAN Home Economics Assn. claims that 20 years from now the average U. S. housewife will lead a life without housework. Homes will be electronically dusted, all dishes will be disposable, etc. Said the group: "Madame will have more time for children, leisure, study and husband."

Probably in that order, too.

Sudan's Hornets, after winning the district championship for the sixth straight year, this week embarked on pre-playoff series of practice games which should give them all the stiff competition they want, plus maybe a little bit more.

The Hornets rocked Kress in the finals of the district tourney, and then suffered their second defeat of the year in a practice game at Cotton Center Monday. But tomorrow night at Sudan (Friday), the Hornets take on the

big bad mamas of South Plains girls basketball, the unbeaten Friona Squaws, in the first of two-game series.

The Squaws, winners of District 2-AA, will bring a record of 25-0 to Sudan. The Hornets, meanwhile, have a season mark of 26-2. The Squaws are led by two terrific forwards, Tito Jennings and Charlotte Nettles.

The Hornets will return the game at Friona next Tuesday, since the actual bi-district playoff will not be held until the following week, either March 2 or 3. The Friona games, of course, do not count in the playoffs, but each team will be anxious to test the other, and fans in the area have been looking forward to the games.

Meanwhile, Sudan's foe for the bi-district clash remained in doubt, with a playoff apparently shaping up in District 4-A. Idalou and Silverton girls each have beaten the other, and Idalou finished the district season Tuesday with a 71-63 win over Ralls to give the fans a 7-1 mark. Silverton, 6-1, has a makeup game with Petersburg girls Friday night, and if Silverton wins, Idalou and Silverton will have a playoff next week.

The Hornets Monday night went down to their second defeat of the season, a 71-69 thriller which Cotton Center girls won in the last few seconds. Despite the loss, which was a non-conference affair between district winners in two different classes, the Hornets played one of their best games of the year, highlighted by an astounding 42-point performance by Candace Mudgett.

The total point output in the fast-moving game was Sudan's highest of the season as the forwards, for once, outplayed the guards. In defense of the guards, it must be pointed out that they were guarding the best group of forwards they've faced all year, led by cat-quick Debbie Moring, who scored 36 points. However, bad passes by the guards proved disastrous at crucial times.

Guard Linda Logan did a good job of containing Miss Moring until Miss Logan fouled out only 3 minutes into the second half.

Sudan trailed 15-17 at the end of the first period, but led 32-27 at halftime and 50-47 at the third. Cotton Center came through with 24 big points in the fourth to 19 for Sudan.

All Cotton Center forwards hit with astounding accuracy from the outside. Sherry Burnett had 25 points and Donna Shackelford 10. For Sudan, Jackie Norman hit for 17 points and Sharon Walker 10.

In a freshman girls game preceding the contest, Sudan won 42-33 as Joyce Williams fired in 24 points.

Sudan won the district title with a rather uneventful 49-31 victory over Kress girls in the finals of the district tournament. It was Sudan's 25th win of the year; the girls already had won the round robin play in district.

Candace Mudgett scored 21 points to lead Sudan, and Linda Laurie scored 15 for Kress.

Sudan guards gave Kress lots of trouble in the first quarter and the Kress girls scored only 1 point in that period, to 5 for the Hornets. Sudan led 22-12 at halftime and 37-21 at the end of the third.

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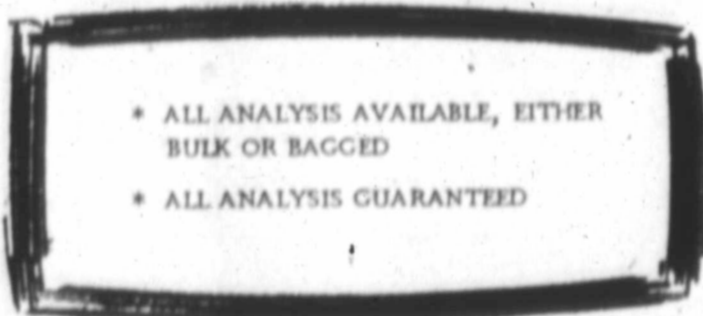

| 2/3 cup (small can) undiluted Carnation Evaporated Milk | 1 1/2 cups (1 1/2 6-ounce packages) semi-sweet chocolate pieces |
| 1 1/2 cups sugar | 1 teaspoon vanilla |
| 2 tablespoons butter | 1/2 cup raisins |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt | 1 cup chopped pecans |
| 1 1/2 cups (about 16 medium diced marshmallows) | |

Combine evaporated milk, sugar, butter and salt in saucepan over medium heat. Bring to a boil, and cook 5 minutes, stirring constantly. (Start timing when mixture starts to "bubble" around edges of pan.) Remove from heat. Stir in marshmallows, chocolate, vanilla and raisins. Stir vigorously for 1 minute or until marshmallows are completely melted and blended. Spread chopped nuts on heavy waxed paper. Pour fudge mixture over nuts. As fudge cools, form into roll. Cut in 1/2 inch slices.

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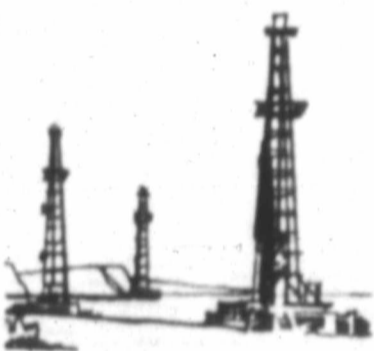
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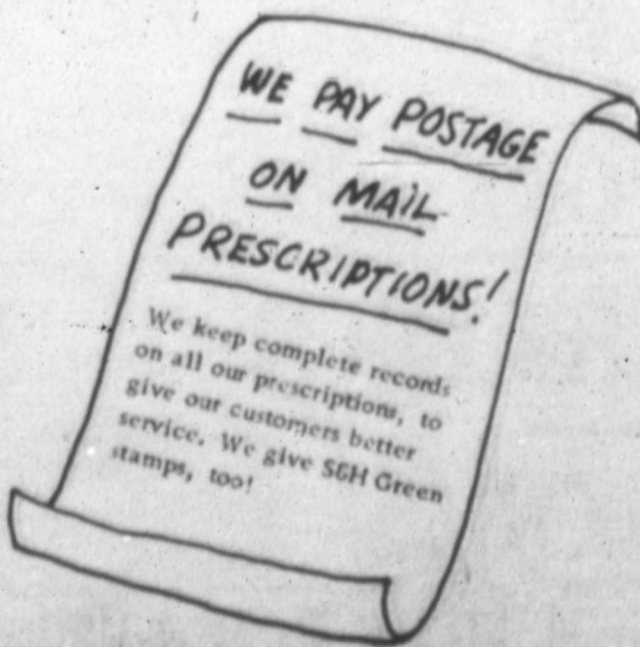
