

Sudan City Commissioners, beset with several complaints by citizens regarding damage done by dogs, and nuisance created by dogs in local neighborhoods, on June 4 voted to get a dog catcher to pick up all unlicensed dogs in Sudan.

A spokesman said the commission recognizes that dogs running loose are a serious nuisance and a possible health problem, and pointed out that all dogs within the city are required to be licensed at a fee of \$1 for males,

or \$2 for females, with a tag to be worn on the dog's collar at all times.

In addition to this, it was noted, dog owners are required to keep their pets up and not allow them to run loose in the city.

All citizens owning dogs were urged to license them immediately and keep them penned; otherwise they will be picked up.

He is there wery near - always there when you turn to Him.

He will make you a way of escape, if you will do it! Easy? No, it is never easy to climb upward, but it's easier than sinking into the devil's hell both here and now, and forevermore. Then, with Jesus triumphant, there is such a joy and humbleness and wondrous love, only in Jesus can you win the victoryby your faith in Him you will live eternally! And here is warning and promise to us who have this eternal life in Jesus. "Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life ever-
