Burn your records and you can land in jail - burn your draft card and you land on the front pages and help create a lot more paper than you destroyed - burn trash in your alley and the police and firemen will be looking down your throat.

And if, in final desperation someday, we attempt to burn all of it and leave room for the human race to breathe in, the resulting holocaust would surely suffocate us all.

But Science has come to the rescue. The Scientists have the answer, and they may yet save the world and turn the tide in the People vs. Paper war. Scientists have just perfected a wonderful new paper which you can dissolve in water - in 30 seconds or less - and then you can drink it if you choose to. It's non-toxic.

It's true. We got a sample in the mail the other day from Science Service, a Washington D.C. outfit. It was only a four-inch square of nice - looking white paper, but it had positively magical qualities. We tried it. **Two Honored By Wheat Growers**

Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. announced a cash distribution for its stockholders of \$259,401.10 at its 32nd annual meeting Tuesday night at Friona High School.

Highlight of the meeting was the honoring of two people who had served Friona Wheat Growers a combined total of 59 years.

The cash distribution was announced at the meeting of the membership following the annual free barbecue attended by 725 persons at Friona High School Cafeteria, catered by Walter Jetton of Fort Worth.

The cash distribution compared to the total of \$293,161.99 which was distributed to members last year. Total distributions by the co-operative in the past five years totals \$1,842,092.08, and it has distributed \$4,618,310.68 in its history.

Clyde Goodwine, a member of the founding board of directors and a constant member of the board for the organization's 32 years, retired as a board member Tuesday night, asking the nominating committee to withhold his name from nomination. W.M. Massie was re-elected to a three-year term as a director and Ernest Osborn was elected to replace Goodwine on the board. Holdover directors are E.L. (Hap) Fairchild, Ralph

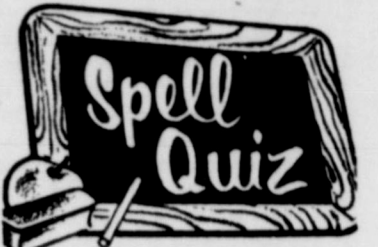

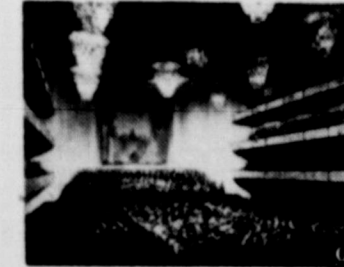

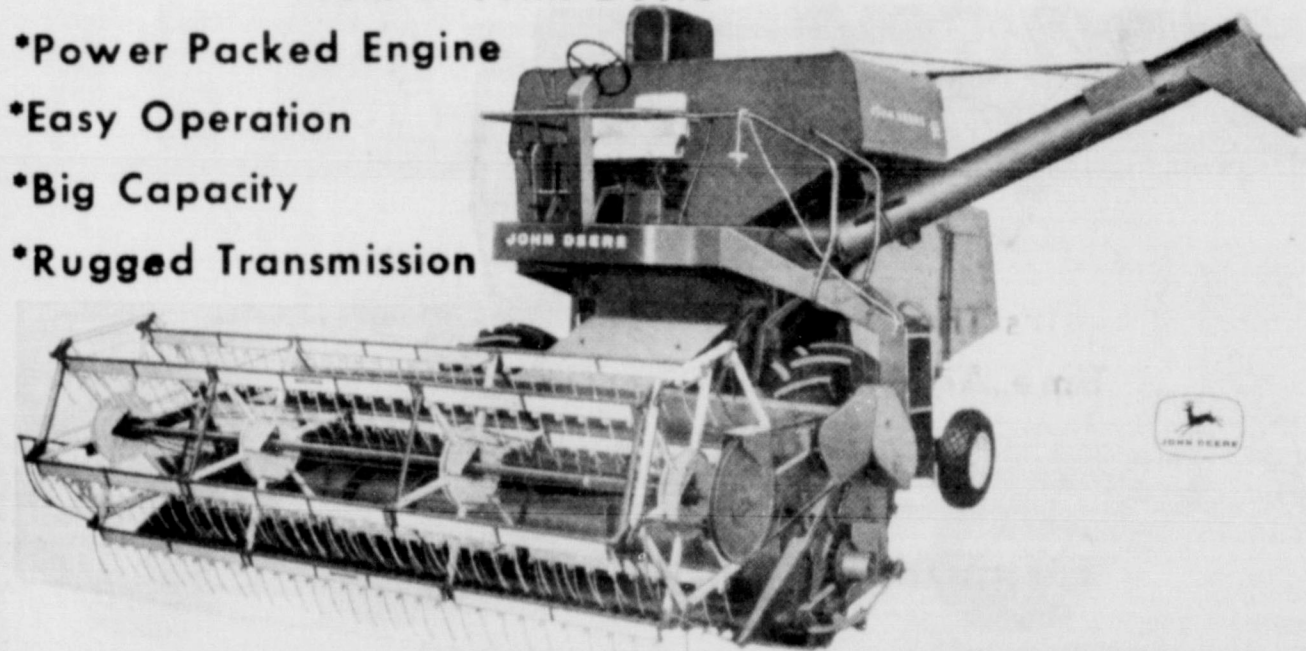

### At Home In Parmer County

#### GETTING ENOUGH MILK?

June is traditionally the "Dairy Month," and this is a good time to consider daily needs from this important source of food.

Why do we need milk? Well in the first place it is especially important for these three nutrients:

- \* Calcium, needed throughout life for healthy bones.

- \* Riboflavin - a B vitamin, one of the essential nutrients for healthy skin and nerves.

- \* Protein-the main material needed for building and repairing body tissue.

Many people get too little of these three nutrients for their best nutritional health. It's very difficult to get enough calcium and riboflavin, in particular, without a good deal of milk.

One reason why milk is such an excellent food is that it contains many different nutrients in favorable proportions that can readily form efficient work teams for your body's nutrition.

How much milk is enough? Nutritionists consider mainly the calcium needs when they figure the amounts of milk for good daily nutritional needs. Here they are:

Children under 9 years - 2 to 3 cups.

Children 9 - 12 years - 3 or more cups.

Teenagers - 4 or more cups.

Adults all ages - 2 or more cups.

Expectant mothers - 3 or more.

With summer weather ahead and with picnics and many other activities where other beverages are being served (that contribute nothing but calories) the wise homemaker will need to plan carefully to see that this important milk food is not neglected when providing nutritious meals for each family member.

An eight-ounce glass of milk costs only two cents more than other beverages. It's such a waste, nutritionally speaking, to neglect this very important food.

Here is a good way to get more milk into the meals, try this recipe:

#### APPLE CUSTARD

1 cup canned apple slices, drained  
3 tablespoons sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 beaten eggs  
1 - 1/2 cups hot milk,  
Nutmeg

Arrange apples in bottom of four custard cups. Combine sugar, salt, and eggs. Add milk slowly. Pour over apples, sprinkle with nutmeg.

Set cups in a pan of hot water. Bake at 350 degrees F. (moderate oven) for 30 to 40 minutes, or until custard is set.

4 servings. Over 1/3 cup milk per serving.

Also that long popular "Banana Pudding" is a good source of milk too. Another recipe that's full of good nutrition is:

#### SOFT CUSTARD

1/4 cup sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
3 eggs, beaten  
3 cups hot milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Cinnamon or nutmeg

Add sugar and salt to beaten eggs. Gradually add the milk to the egg mixture.

Cook over hot, not boiling water, and stir constantly until the mixture coats the spoon.

Remove from the hot water at once. Strain. Cool; add the vanilla and sprinkle a little cinnamon or nutmeg on each serving. 6 servings. 1/2 cup milk per serving.

As a sauce. For thinner custard to serve as a sauce, follow the recipe, using 2 eggs or 4 yolks instead of 3 eggs. Good with many kinds of fruit gelatin desserts, cakes, and puddings.

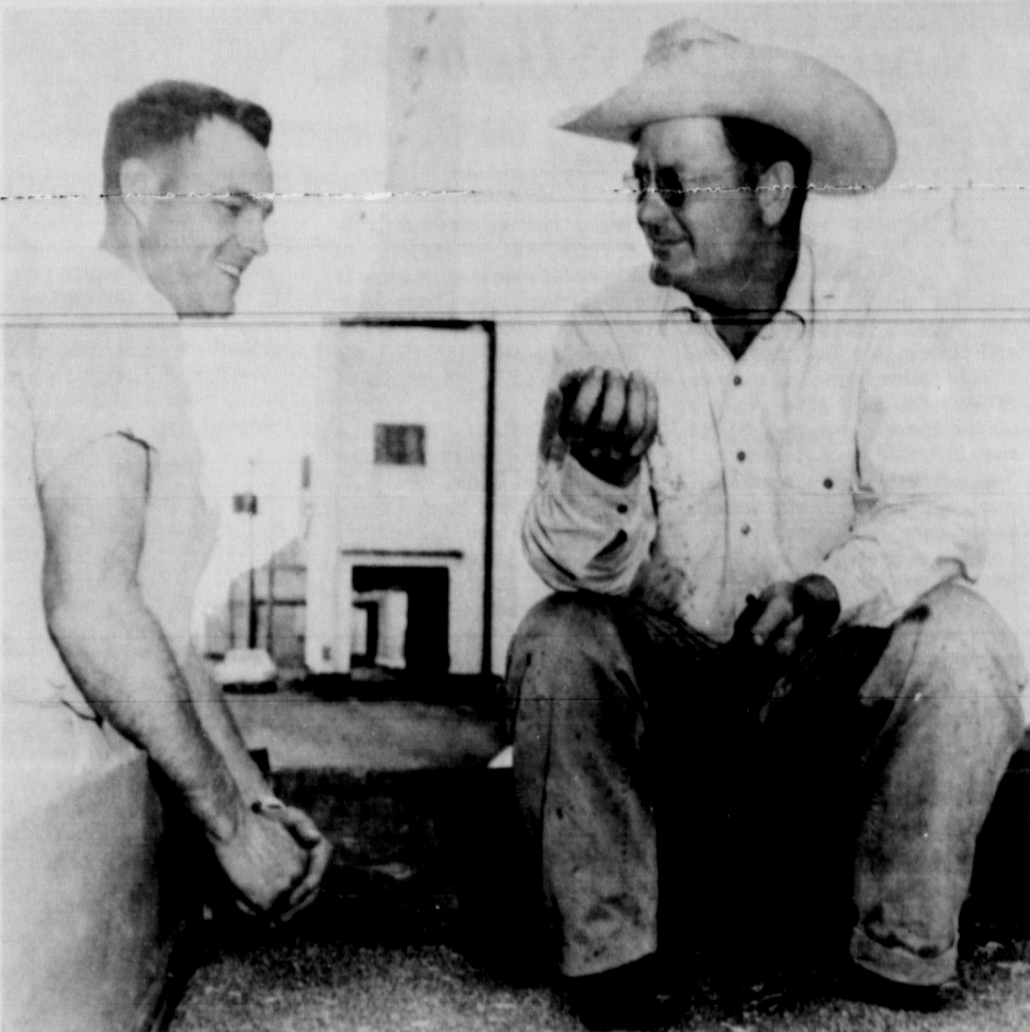
### Scoutmaster Awarded Trip

During the past three years, management and technical assistance were provided Latin American countries by NRECA under its non-profit contract with AID.

Several Co-ops are being constructed in Nicaragua, Columbia and Ecuador. Co-ops are in the planning stages in other Latin American countries. Existing Co-ops in Chile are being assisted.

The training session at Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative should be especially helpful to the visitors since Forrest returned only last week from an assignment in Chile.

Forrest spent a month there as a technical advisor to personnel planning Electric Cooperatives in that country. He also was on a three month assignment in the same capacity during the latter part of 1962.

## On The Farm In Parmer County

The rains have been nice and were just about what the doctor ordered. Weeds and grass are starting to take off now along with our crops.

We want to discuss two chief enemies of profitable farming - Bindweed and Johnsongrass. Now is the time to really get after these two profit robbers if you have any of either.

For eradication of small patches of bindweed, we recommend any one of the following at the rate listed per acre. Sodium chlorate at 960 lbs; Benzac 354, Zobar, Trysben 200, Benzac 1281 or Tritac at 10 gallons per acre. Also Tritac 10G or Fenac granular at 200 pounds and Fenac at 13.5 gallons per acre.

Other chemicals recommended are Benzabar at 250 pounds or No Vine at 240 pounds/acre. The newest chemical recommended in Tordon 22K at 1.5 gallons and Tordon Beads or Borolin at 150 pounds per acre.

Large acres can be controlled with intensive cultivation and proper crop rotations. Call at the county agents office for a leaflet on bindweed control. This leaflet summarizes the latest recommended control practices and contains valuable information for anyone planning to control some bindweed.

Johnsongrass is another problem we notice in more fields each year and along a lot of ditches. Here again small areas are a lot easier to control before Johnsongrass spreads to larger areas, which it sure will if left alone.

Many farmers are beginning to do a lot of work on grass in their ditches and roadways. Probably the best all around chemical for this type of situation, considering cost, is a methyl arsonate (DSMA, MSMA) sold under several different trade names. Apply 5 pounds per acre active Methyl arsonate in 40 to 100 gallons of water per acre plus a surfactant when grass is 8 to 12 inches high and actively growing. Three sprayings may be required during a year to eradicate grass.

Dalapon, TCA, Hyvar X and sodium chlorate are also effective killers of Johnsongrass but control based on these herbicides is more expensive than previously described.

Very small patches of Johnsongrass can be sterilized with sodium chlorate or Hyvar X. With these herbicides the soil will be barren for 2 to 3 years. TCA and Dalapon can be used on small areas and will not sterilize the soil over 2 months. TCA and Dalapon will take 2 to 3 treatments to eradicate

Johnsongrass. Herbicidal oils can also eradicate Johnsongrass with 3 to 5 sprayings in a year and will not sterilize the soil.

These chemical controls already listed can be used in cotton to control Johnsongrass. The main precaution is to use them as a directed spray and not spray over the top of the cotton plants.

We also have prepared a summary of the latest information on Johnsongrass control for all areas of crop production and fallow land. We think this booklet is worth your reading if you have much of a Johnsongrass problem and plan to control it. Call the county agents office in Farwell for a copy.

area were originally designed for greater discharge and shorter pumping lift, he says. The water situation has changed so the cost per unit of water pumped is often unnecessarily high.

Old, worn pump bowls contribute to the problem. In some instances, Lyle says pumps were improperly matched to the wells when they were first installed.

### Efficiency Discussed

Seventy to 80 per cent operating efficiency is about the maximum attainable with deep-well turbine pumps even when they are carefully selected and matched to the well, according to the irrigation engineer.

Studies by the agricultural engineering department at Texas Tech indicate only a small percentage of the pumps on the High Plains operate in the 70 to 80 per cent efficiency range.

Their studies show some pumps are operating at only 20 per cent efficiency Lyle said.

"What price are you willing to take for your irrigation water?" Farmers need to consider this question to determine the amount of water they apply to a crop, says Economist John Shipley, with the Bushland Experiment Station.

Shipley is studying the yield difference from various amounts of irrigation applied on wheat in one of his projects.

Water applications at the tillering and boot stages are varied. Applications to water-up the crop and the dough stage are kept constant.

Larger irrigations naturally produce the best yields. For instance, Shipley says seven inches applied at tillering and eight inches at the boot stage produced 74.5 bushels of wheat per acre.

Irrigations of four inches at tillering and five inches at the boot produced 64.7 bushels per acre.

Both plots received a six-inch irrigation at the dough stage, according to the Texas A&M University researcher.

"These results aren't conclusive," Shipley said, "but I figure we netted less than six dollars for the extra six inches of water we used in the heavier irrigation schedule."

"Some fellows believe the extra water is justified by the added yield," he said. "My question is: Would you sell the water to me for one dollar per acre-inch if I paid the pumping cost?"

### Water Table Changes Outdated Many Pumping Systems

The decline of the water table has produced a situation in which High Plains farmers need to re-evaluate the efficiency of their irrigation pumps, says Extension Irrigation Specialist Bill Lyles, of Lubbock.

He is serving the chapter in the office of Marshall this year.

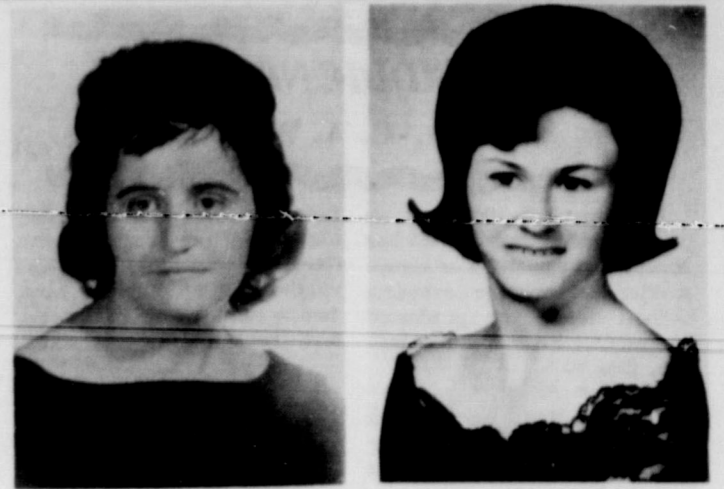
