In the global battle of people against paper, the people are steadily losing ground, Millions of filing cabinets are bulging with stuff - countless vaults are filled with it - untold acres of desks are overflowing with it thousands of postmen are staggering beneath it daily - and few post office boxes could survive more than 48 hours without being relieved of the load. . . . .

We keep records, countless records, and add to them daily - inexorably straining our files to the bursting point then adding more as we continue to make umpteen copies of everything and distribute them with monotonous regularity to every business firm and government agency with which we come in contact.

We destry no records for fear that the next Internal Revenue investigator will demand proof of one - and we carefully catalogue everything according to the manifold system of numbers social security numbers, license numbers, ZIP numbers, draft numbers and serial numbers, account numbers and telephone numbers - numberless numbers, each of which seems to propagage a prolific paper parade of its own.

But records aren't the half of it. There's the mail - personal mail, business mail, junk mail. And the stuff that comes by carrier - circulars, newspapers, catalogues. And the packaging paper - the wrappers, containers, cartons, sacks, sealers, and - yes - even stamps - trading stamps - that we seem to acquire every time we turn around. We're a nation of litter bugs, and we can't help ourselves - everything we touch turns to paper in one form Rev. McAnally or another.

So what can we do about it? Burn it? Not much, you can't. There are laws about that, Burn your records and you can land in jail - burn your draft card and you land on the front pages and help create a lot more paper than you destroyed - burn trash in your alley and the police and firemen will be looking down your throat.

And if, in final desperation someday, we attempt to burn all of it and leave room for the human race to breath in, the resulting holocaust would surely suffocate us all.

But Science has come to the rescue. The Scientists have the answer, and they may yet save the world and turn the tide in the People vs. Paper war. Scientists have just perfected a wonderful new paper which you can dissolve inwater - in 30 seconds or less - and then you can drink it if you choose to. It's non-

toxic. it's true. We got a sample in the mail the other day from Science Service, a Washington D.C. outfit. It was only a fourinch square of nice - looking white paper, but it had positively magical qualities. We tried it. We wrote on it with a typewriter, with a fountain pen, with a ball point pen, with Magic Marker, with a pencil. No sweat - everything worked. Then we dropped it into a glass of water and watched it dissolve, completely, before our eyes. We didn't drink .it, tho --- we've had to eat a lot of words in our business, but we don't plan to start drinking 'em.

But it did disappear - pouflike that - Or almost. Presto, no paper. Eureka, the world may be saved from its own folly. But there are indications that it hasn't caught on yet, even at the source. We tried to dissolve the accompanying letter from Science Service with absolutely no success. All we wound up with was a soggy mess of paper pulp which had to be disposed of. It shakes faith! #### At Home In Parmer County

GETTING ENOUGH MILK?

June is traditionally the "Dairy Month," and this is a good time to consider daily needs from this important source of food.

Why do we need milk? Well in the first place it is especially important for these three nutrients:

\* Calcium, needed throughout life for healthy bones.

\* Ribovlavin - a B vitamin, one of the essential nutrients for healthy skin and nerves. \* Protein-the main material needed for building and repair-

ing body tissue.

Many people get too little of these three nutrients for their best nutritional health. It's very difficult to get enough calcium and riboflavin, in particular, without a good deal of

One reason why milk is such an excellent food is that it contains many different nutrients in favorable proportions that can readily form efficient work teams for your body's nutrition.

How much milk is enough? Nutritionists consider mainly the calcium needs when they figure the amounts of milk for good daily nutritional needs. Here they are:

Children under 9 years - 2 to Children 9 - 12 years - 3 or

more cups. Teenagers - 4 or more cups.

Adults all ages - 2 or more cups.

and with picnics and many other activities where other beverages are being served (that contribute nothing but calories) the wise homemaker will need to plan carefully to see that this important milk food is not neglected when providing nutritious meals for each family member. An eight-ounce glass of milk costs only two cents more than other beverages. It's such a waste, nutritionally speaking, to neglect this very important food, milk.

Here is a good way to get more milk into the meals, try this recipe:

APPLE CUST ARD cup canned apple slices,

drained 3 tablespoons sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 2 beaten eggs

- 1/2 cups hot milk,

Arrange apples in bottom of four custard cups. Combine sugar, salt, and eggs. Add milk slowly. Pour over apples, sprinkle with nutmeg.

Set cups in a pan of hot water. Bake at 350 degrees F. (moderate oven) for 30 to 40 minutes, or until custard is

Also that long popular "Banana Pudding" is a good source of milk too. Another recipe thats full of good nutrition is: SOFT CUSTARD

1/4 cup sugar 1/4 teapsoon salt

eggs, beaten 3 cups hot milk

1 teapsoon vanilla Cinnamon or nutmeg

Add sugar and salt to beaten eggs. Gradually add the milk to the egg mixture.

Cook over hot, not boiling water and stir constantly until the mixture coats the spoon. Remove from the hot water at once. Strain. Cool: add the vanilla and sprinkle a little cinnamon or nutmeg on each serving. 6 servings. 1/2 cup milk per serving.
