The Sudan Hornets, who started their season about a half hour later than Plains did last Friday, this week prepared for an invasion by the Class AA Frenship Tigers, who last week were stopped 20-0 by Abenathy in their opener.

Sudan fell behind 20-0 at half-time and 27-0 at the end of the third period last Friday before QB Mike Smith connected on a pair of touchdown passes in the last quarter to give the Hornets a last-half margin in the 30-12 contest.

Plains was big and tough and Sudan's offense sputtered considerably for most of the game before it began hitting on most cylinders.

Plains outgained the Hornets, mainly on long runs, and had 16 first downs to 9 for Coach Henry Hall's crew. But indicative of how the Hornets came back is the fact that Plains had 9 first downs in the second quarter when Sudan had only 1.

Halfback Ronnie Elmore of the Cowboys broke open the scoring with a 62-yard sprint around right end less than 5 minutes after the game opened, and Plains led 6-0. After covering a Sudan fumble on the Hornet 38, Plains drove to a second touchdown, scoring early in the second period as QB Jack Lowe went 4 yards. Lowe kicked the extra point and it was 13-0.

Sudan toughened up a bit after that, although the offense still didn't click. However, Plains scored again as Elmore raced 24 yards across the stripe, and Lowe again converted.

Sudan then made three first downs on a drive that died with a fumble on the Cowboys' 28. In the third quarter, the two

teams battled on even terms until FB Joe Dan Cooke of Plains raced 49 yards to score, Lowe converted, and it was 27-0.

Coming to life, the Hornets drove to the Plains 22 and lost the ball on downs, but Tommy Taylor pounced on a fumble on the Plains 29 on the next play, and five plays later, Smith tossed a strike which end, Marcy Cantu took across the goal line for the first touchdown Sudan ever has scored on the Plains football field. Mike Bellar's attempted kick was blocked, and it was 27-6.

It was guard Frank Cantu who recovered a Cowboy fumble for Sudan about midfield a few plays later and started them on the way

Boyles, who blocked a field goal attempt, also did good work for Sudan on defense. For Plains, Cooke spent a considerable amount of time in the Sudan backfield mulling up Hornet offensive plays.

Smith completed 6 of 8 passes, and although three of these failed to gain, wound up with 33 yards net. Marsten was the top ground-gainer for Sudan, with 67 yards on 13 efforts, or an average of 5.2 per carry. Morgan carried 7 times for 21 yards, and Baker 12 times for 32 yards.

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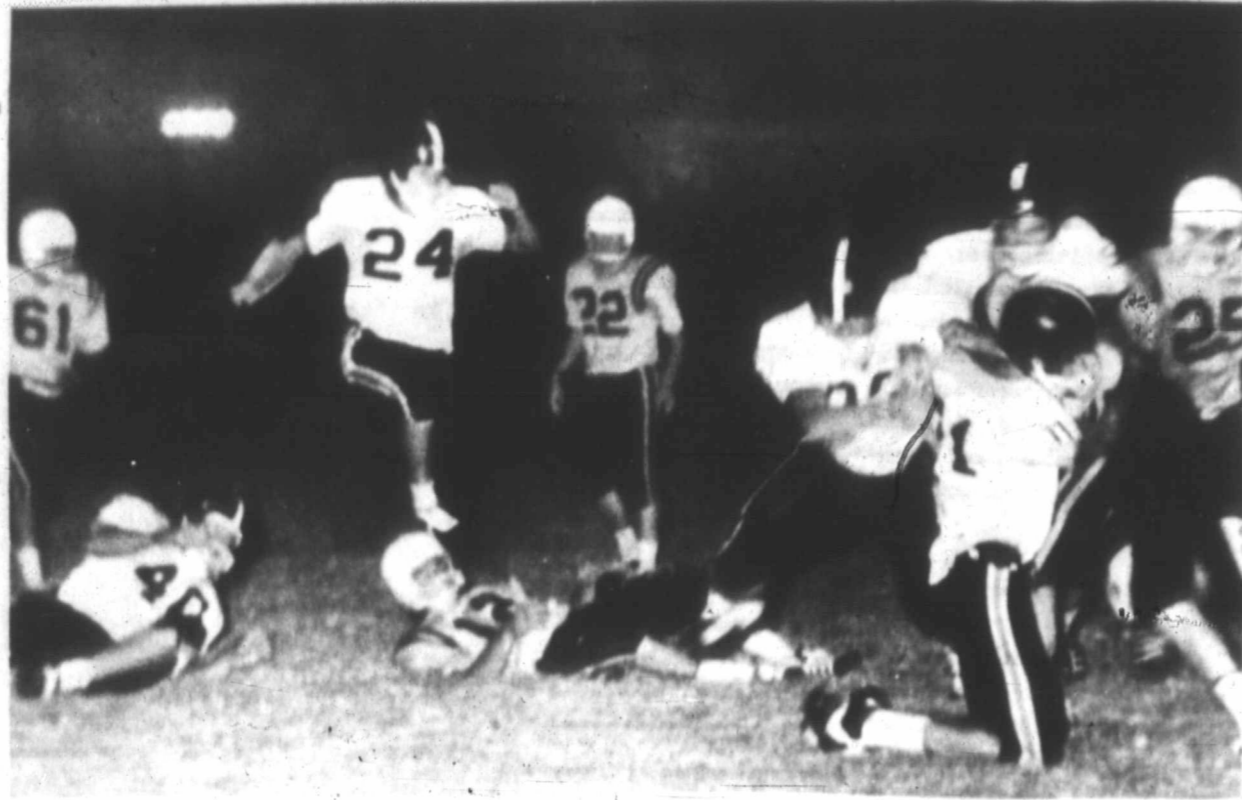
