Dear Mr. Congressman
This letter is concerned with issues which are vital to our particular section of the country. I have some very definite convictions about cerlain matters, and I would welcome the opportunity of discussing
these issues face to face if your schedule could be arranged to do so.
In my opinion the economic growth of West Texas has been retarded by the foreign investments of our federol government. Through the Oil Compact, Texas has been forced to absorb a great percentage of
foreign oil, while our own wells have been allowed to produce on the maximum of only 10 days a month. In my opinion, this is not fair to maximum
our area.

I believe that the cattlemen in our district have a just complaint over the importation of foreign beef, and that the farmers of our area have other crops because of foreign imports.
I am conceined that our district has lagged behind in the developmen of interstate Highways, and in industrial development until this political year.
