THERE IS A big fuss about a statue of Winston Churchill with a cigar in his hand. Seems that some folks don't think it's quite right to stick a likeness of Churchill out in front of everybody with that stogie prominently displayed.

We must presume that the objectors feel that such a display might lead to corrupt the morals of youngsters who might be undecided about whether to start smoking cigars or not. Apparently they feel that a portrayal of a man who has been smoking for nearly a hundred years with no apparent ill effects might be bad for the young.

Others say—and I feel they are right—that any realistic statue of Churchill would have to include the external cigar in his blunt fingers.

Offhand, I don't remember ever seeing a picture of Churchill actually puffing on his cigar, but neither do I remember ever seeing a picture of him without his cigar in his hand, providing the picture showed his hands at all.

They're going to take a poll to see if the people want to show Churchill with or without the cigar. Why don't they ask Churchill? Well, probably because there's little doubt about what he would say.

Showing Churchill without his cigar would be like showing Y. A. Tittle without his football, Chet Atkins without his guitar, or Dean Martin without his bottle.

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I READ RECENTLY that in 1877, Thomas Edison invented a "talking machine," the first phonograph. I'm not at all sure that this information is correct; as I remember it, it was Spencer Tracy who invented the first phonograph. But, anyway, this item said it was Edison, and that the machine's first demonstration played back the inventor's voice saying "Mary Had a Little Lamb."

It was perhaps Edison's misfortune that he was 80 or 90 years ahead of his time, for he could easily have had the first hit record. The whole deal had all the ingredients of success in today's musical world, but Tom made the mistake of playing it to a bunch of old fogies, instead of to the teenage set.

We note that the article indicates that he merely said the words, making no attempt to be musical. That would be point one in his favor. Also, there probably was considerable static, making it pretty difficult to understand the words, which would be point two in his favor today, if he wanted a smash hit record.

And, of course, the words themselves would attract the interest of many record-buyers, curious to learn the story behind the title, "Mary Had a Little Lamb." Certainly many of today's jaded listeners would want to know what events led up to this apparent biological impossibility.

## SCS NEWS

How much water ran off your field during the last heavy rain? How much topsoil washed off your sloping land along with the water runoff? Up - and-down rows on slopes not only drain off the water but also cause severe erosion. It is the water that soaks into the ground that helps tide your crops through a drought on dryland or saves an irrigation sometimes on irrigated soil.

If you have sloping land perhaps you should take a good look at it. Remembering that there is only 6 to 8 inches of productive top soil. In order to conserve soil and water all sloping land should be tilled on the contour and most should be terraced. These practices help to hold the water that falls in the spring when much of the ground is bare.

Paralled terrace systems are being designed where possible to facilitate farming operations.

Saving water that falls on your field and keeping the top soil in place is just as practical as putting money in the bank for hard times. Soil and water conservation of course will not eliminate all drought hazards. But it will help stabilize production so that you can depend on a source of income year after year.

Your conservation problems will vary according to the kind of land you have and according to your own particular situation. A conservation plan can be developed on your farm with the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service. Government cost-sharing assistance is available for most soil and water conservation practices.

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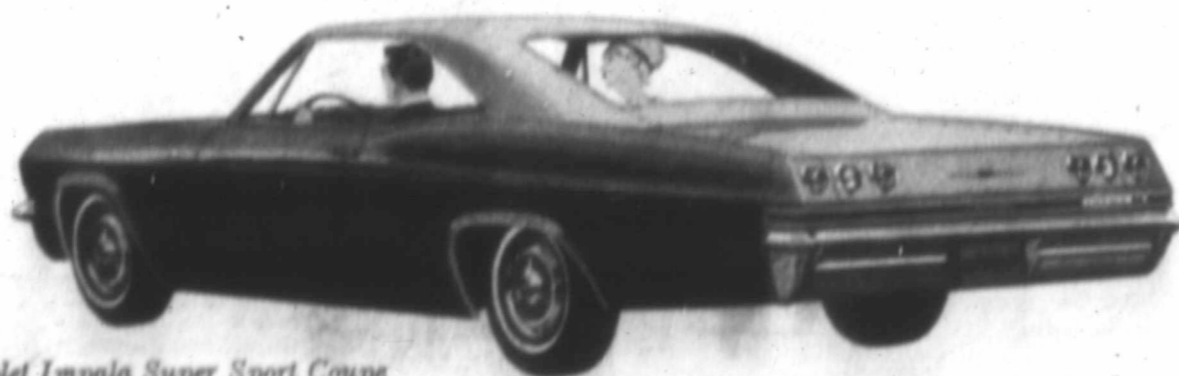
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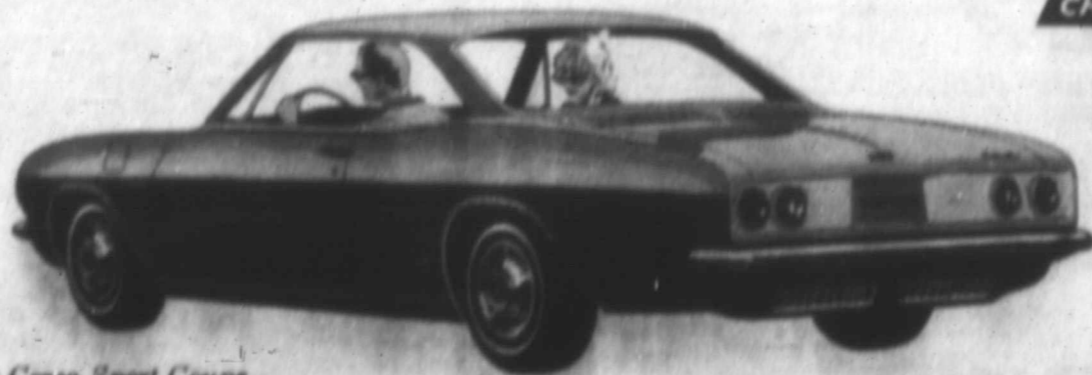

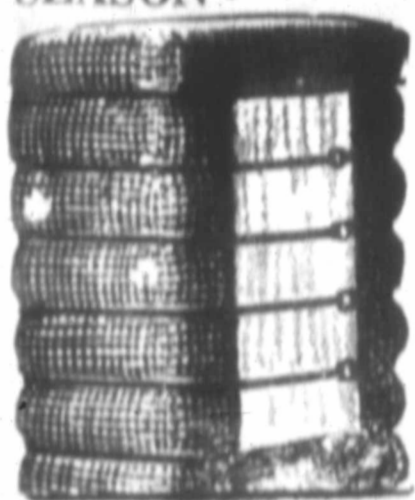
