and a savings account for my community," says Mindgett whose form is three miles west and three and one-half miles north of Sudan. When Mudgett moved to this farm in 1952, very little conservation treatment had been applied,

The land had a variety of soils and slopes, including a shallow lake. The soils varied from a tight clay to a coarse sandy soil, and slopes varied from 0 to 3 per cent which created quite a problem with surface irrigation and increased the erosion latered. With these conditions it was difficult to get proper use of the irrigation. water and to prevent loss of rainfall had damage from

water eveden. Mudgett mede a detailed under of his from and decided that a sprinkler system and other mechanical practices were needed to prevent erusion, conserve the rainfall and make the best possible use of his irrigation water, He sew that it was going to take a lot of planning and engineering work, so he contacted the Sail Conservation Service to help him with his plintning and lay-out work,

A complete conservation plan was worked out for the farm. This consisted of 12,890 feet of underground pipe, a sprinkler system for 179 acres, 180 acres of land levelled for a surface irrigation system. With this plan, Mudgett set up has schedule to do a pertojiji a-mount of work each year. He storted his work in 1984, and shalled more to branch year until he finished all his comervetten work in the spring of

Mudgiett, when asked what besteffts he had received from conservation work, stated that his sverage cotton yield went from three-quarters of a bale to a little over two bales per sere and about dib sausi-gar cent per acre for other crops.

In November, 1956, he was elected to the Lamb County Soll Conservation District Board of Supervisors, and he has served as a member in all the offices of the Board. He regularly attends the local area SCD monthings and has amended several etats SCD moetings.

Musicott did his conservation work with soupeal things in mind: to conserve the soll and utilize the rainfall, which helps save the littlgation water which will result in more uniform crops and even production; to uniline his orop residues and the use of burys, mulches, and barnyard manure, thus maintaining the organic matter of the soil and protecting it from

Mudgett has three children, two daughters and one son. At the present time the son, Mile, and one daughter, Candace, are attending college. The other daughter, Penny, will be a freshman in high school this fall. He and his wife find time from farming activities to enjoy their hobbles of fishing and boating. 


