MAYBE IT'S because I'm in the newspaper business that I get so interested about these incomplete stories.

There is one program on television which I have sworn never to watch again, only to catch myself looking at it because I got interested in the stories before I realize what it is. That's the Kraft Theater, I believe it's called, on Wednesdays.

This blasted show only rarely ends. Usually the story stops on some weird note which leaves you way up in the air wondering what the heck happened, anyway. And the interesting part of it is that the story usually is a pretty good one up to the ending.

There are other shows which do the same thing occasionally, but this one is tops in the guess-how-it-ended field. I finally have figured out how they plan this particular series. The writers just get down the story with no regard to how long it may take to present it on TV, and when the timer is up, they just cut it off.

As if we didn't have enough frustrations in our daily living.

Alfred Hitchcock used to have a series in which he specialized in the surprise ending, but usually it made some sort of sense. Even his stories didn't always, though, I like the traditional ending sometimes. I used to long to see one Tom and Jerry cartoon in which the cat won out.

The other day I read a novel which did the same thing. It was a most interesting story, and I read it avidly. It introduced all sorts of elements into the plot which the fertile imagination could imagine might have strong bearing on the story's outcome. Then it ended in such an abrupt way that I was not only astounded; I was extremely irritated to find I had wasted so much time. I even thought half-seriously of writing the author and asking his permission to finish the book for him. It was as idiotic and unsatisfying as a government directive.

Once upon a time all the stories started out with "once upon a time" and ended with "and they lived happily ever after." Folks got tired of this, finally, and the authors began ending one occasionally with the hero getting killed, or some such. This was okay with me for a while when it seemed that there were more stories ending unhappily than happily.

Occasionally I hear someone say about a movie: "That was the best darn—I just cited and cited." Maybe so, but it's this kind of plot that leaves the viewer all depressed and who knows how what he'll go home and hunt his kids or reverse his grandmother or something, just because this wonderful movie left him feeling there's no use in living.

I prefer a happy ending, still, I prefer a end ending to an ending at all. I just can't stand

Softball Teams To Be Organized

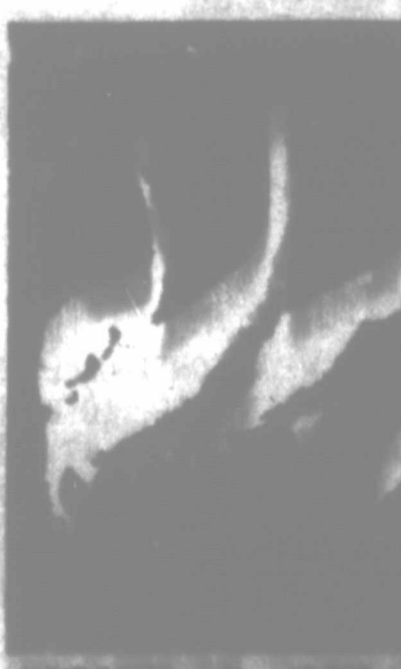

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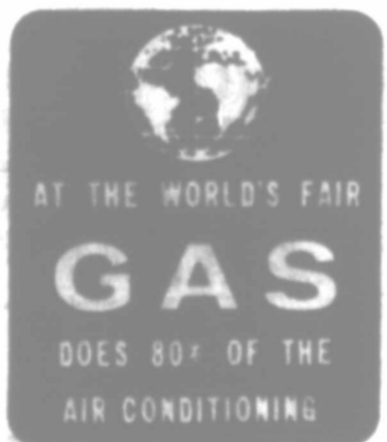

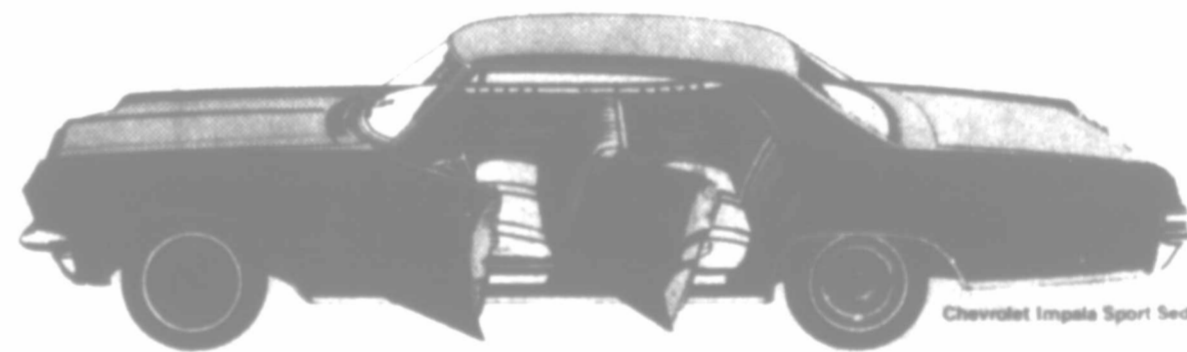
