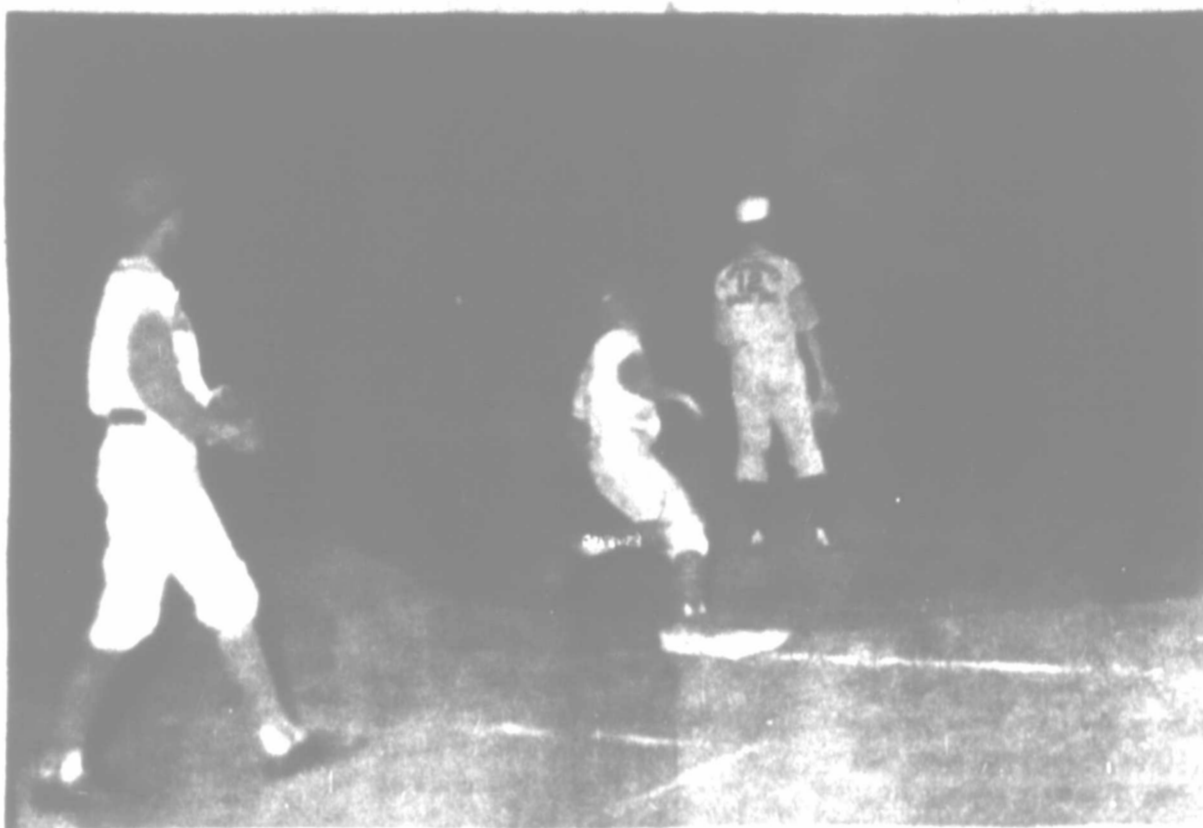
Kelley, who moved to Sudan from Lorens in 1930, died in South Plains Hospital Saturday afternoon.

Little League Loses Out In District Tournament

The Inter-City Little League All-Star baseball team played Olton in the district Little League tournament last Thursday in Plainview. Olton defeated the hard-hitting Inter-City team by only one point, eliminating the Sudan-Amherst from the single elimination tournament. The final score was Olton 3, Sudan-Amherst 2.

The Sudan-Amherst team occupied the bottom box first in the game that began at 6 p. m. Thursday in Plainview. Johnny King of the Inter-City team was the first player to get on base with a single-base hit during the first inning.

Larry Hanna, the star pitcher from Sudan, pitched the entire game for the Inter-City team.

In the bottom half of the first inning only one Olton batter got a hit from Hanna, but was unable to get further than first due to the fine defensive play of the team. Melvin team had scored a run at the close of the first inning of play.

During the top half of the second inning, Sudan-Amherst scored no points, although Roger Bellar and Eddie Moates got on base. In the bottom half Hanna pitched to six Olton players with Olton remaining scoreless.

During the top half of the third inning, Steve Edwards got a good hit to right field but was tagged by an Olton player. The fine defensive playing of the Sudan-Amherst team showed up in the bottom of the third to keep Olton scoreless. Twice Richey Miller made catches in center field.

Sudan-Amherst did not score in the fourth inning and the bottom of the fourth proved to be disastrous for them with Olton scoring three runs. Eight Olton players came to bat with three scoring. This was the only inning of the game that Olton scored runs.

Sudan-Amherst scored two runs during the fifth inning. The scores were credited to Roy Lee Young and Larry Hanna, with Johnny King and Roger Boyle slugging single base hits. Olton was unable to score a run during the fifth, making the score 3-2 in favor of Olton at the close of the fifth inning.

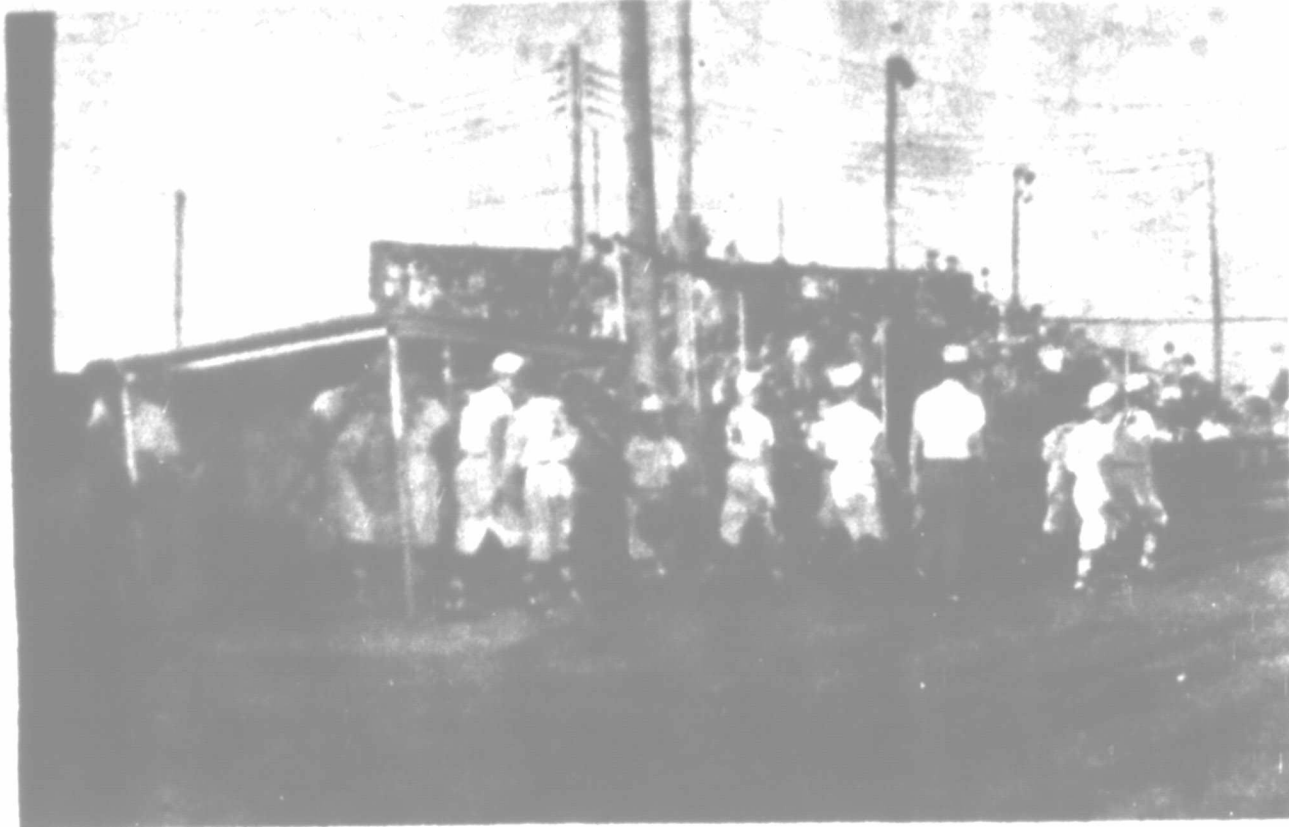
