The vest majority of enco-ayear anglers will find this fishing pleasant, but catches may be luon. To applet these felles, the experts at Moreury outboards, offer the following advice:

'Fish early-the crack of dawn is generally the most productive time, not because of surface activity that develops later in the day, but because water temperatures are at their st point

Topid waters at delight swimmers and water skiers are unsuited to game fish. So even without disturbances going on overhead, fish still will seek the more temperate depths. During night, as the water loses some of its heat, fish make feeding for ays into the food-filled shallows.

Pish late - for this reason, evening and night-time temperatures are most favorable to many species. Bass and walleye, particularly, are extremely active during the dark hours. This is the best time to fish for them in

Fish deep-if you do fish during midday, go down into the depths where temperatures and oxygen levels are more tolerable to the quarry. By drifting slowly with a bottom bumping minnow good catches may be taken.

Compared to other places and other seasons, resort area fishing in mid-oummer is boually quite challenging, agree the Mercury lade. But, they add, it probably wouldn't be much different if the resorts weren't there. Time of year and type of

Simple Tests Can Improve **Irrigation Water Management**

ment is the use and management of irrigation water, where the quantity of water used for each irrigation is determined by the moisture-holding capacity of the sell and the need of the crop, where the water is applied at a rote and in such a memor that the trups can use it efficiently and significant eresion does not

Simple soil tests can tell you when to irrigate. The first step is to estimate the amount of moisture in your soil and this is done by taking it hasidful of soil from a given root zone ares starting at the top 12 inches and working down, Squeeze the handful of soil from a given depth and if it is too dry to form a ball, it contains less than one-fourth the moisture that the blad liby lioe

If a ball is formed, toss it in the air, about one foot, and catch like a ball, if the ball of soil breaks with five tonnes or less. soil contains from one-fourth to one-half amount of moisture that soil will hold. If ball remains in tect, the moisture of the soil is above one-half. This test should help you to estimate the amount of water you need to fill up the soil in the root zone.

Amarillo fine sandy loam, a brown to reddish-brown sandy loam, is a typical soil of Lamb County, Available moistureholding capacity of this soil is: 1.5 inches the first foot, 1,9 inches the second foot, 1,7 inches the third foot, and 1,5 inches the fourth foot of depth. This is a

total of 6,6 anchos of water if your crop root zone has reached the four feet level. From the soil test of your

existing moisture and the amount your soil will hold, you should now know about how much water is needed for your crop.

Peak period consumptive use of cotton is about one-fourth inch per day and sorghums about inth per day. From this you should know about when another irrigating is needed.

Irrigation wells that pump about 450 gallons of water per minute will pump one inch of weter per acre for every hour pumpéd, A good 8 inch well should pump about two acre inthes of water an hour, From this you should be able to adjust your irrigation to the amount of water needed for your crops. The amount of water applied to the soil can be controlled by the length of irrigation runs, or furrow, and the amount of water applied to each furrow.

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Tornadoes Sighted Near Sudan

Sudan residents rushed to the outdoors last Wednesday to watch two tornadoes dip from a cloud that was located three miles west of Sudan, The twin tornadoes dipped to earth near the Burnis May farm and cut across the corner of the Ray Wood farm.

Ray Wood, Sudan farmer said that he was about 1/4 mile away from one tornado that twisted across the May farm. He said that at one time he thought the twister was going to hit the May house, but missed it, only tearing up weeds

As the tornadoes were reported in the Sudan area, the siren was sounded sending many residents to cellars and others to the open road to get a better view of the clearly visible tornadoes.

This reporter followed one tornado as it maked a path toward the southwest, but was unable to see it clearly because of the torential rain that fell about three miles southwest of
