## WOODWORK . BY BALTON

THE WHEELS of justice turn in some strange directions sometimes. We're all familiar with the ever-increasing cases of murder where the accused goes free even though practically everyone is convinced he or she is guilty. The word "practically" is, of course, the key here, for under our system the conviction is supposed to be cer-We must be absolutely sure of one's guilt before we punish them; else we may punish someone innocent.

This is good, I think, but it has its drawbacks. One of these is the suspended sentence, or light term given on acceptance of a plea of guilty to a lesser charge. Another is the common plea of insanity, or temporary insanity, which can get the defendant committed to a hospital for awhile, instead of to prison.

We have to give a defendant every chance. In our society, a man is supposed to be innocent until proved guilty (except, usually, in corporation court).

Still it seems strange that one person can kill another in cold blood and not even deny the act itself, and getperhaps five years (of which he actually may have to serve only about 15 months) and another can do the same thing and get the electric chair.

A man who killed three people week was given the death sen tence. His defense was tom porary insanity. He never had been in trouble before, and after eluding officers for some time, gave himself up volun-I'm not saying he shouldn't have been given the death penalty, but the next fugitive from a murder rap may remember this and decide there's no point in surrendering, " . . . I may as well go shead and kill all the people I can before they catch me. "

In Lubbock the other day, a man who admitted shooting his wife to death was given a fiveyear term. He originally was charged with murder with malice (He killed her, but really didn't have anything against her?). He also pleaded tempo rary insanity.

Sensible shopping is only half the story for looking your best. If you're like most people, you want to take the best pos sible care of what you have, as well as the new wardrobe. Clothing care tips suggested here can add years to the life

of your garments.
NOTHING DETERIORATES FABRICS like dust and dirt. Brush outer garments regularly. They'll live longer. (You may, too-brushing can be good exercise)

YOU MAY JUST LOVE that yellow dress-but give it a rest. Garments should not be worn continuously-in order to avoid too frequent pressing. If a garment is hung up properly for a minimum of 24 hours between wearings, it often will

regain its shape—sans ironing. SOME PEOPLE THINK pockets are to put things into out to clothes-conscious individuals, it's strictly taboo. Bulky pockets destroy the line

of a garment. More important -they add wear and tear. Invariably, the pockets also end up out of shape.

DON'T PUT OFF minor alterations. When a button pops off, new it back on as soon as possible to keep the garment in shape. Rips, tears and the like only get worse without rapid

STORE SEASONABLE CLOTHING when not in use Clean all garments first and then put them in clothing bags with a handful of Solvay para crystals, as directed. Available in local supermarkets and drugstores, para (called paradichlorobenzene by industry) is a powerful chemical agent whose vapor kills months, larvae and eggs. It also prevents mildew.

DON'T STARCH washable garments before storing. They may turn yellow. When hanging clothes, be sure that shoulders, sleeves and trouser legs are straight; collars and lapels in place, and hems turned down. Modern science still hasn't matched running hot water in a closed bathroom for removing wrinkles rapidly from woolen fabrics and restoring velvet or velveteen finishes. One word of caution: Too much steam can cause a garment to shrink. Allow it to dry completely before

An impector of the Weights and Measures division of the Tissue Department of Agriculture has already insured that the pound of ment she bought in the market was really a pound. And he made sure that the convents of that package of fronon food weighed as much as the

wrapper claimed. The inspector didn't stop there, however. He also checked the gas pixmp at her favorite station to guarantee that when she wanted three gallons she got a correctly measured three gal-

Assuring "a dollar's value for a dollar spent" is a prime duty of the Texas Department of Agriculture, according to Commisstoner John C. White, "Our inspectors are always slert for violations which may rob the connumer of a substantial amount from the family budget,"

Proof of the inspector's vigilance can be determined by three types of official seals used in this work. Eggs which are checked for quality will bear on the carton a blue seal with the word "Approved" printed above the signature of Commissioner John White, along with a written guarantee stating the eggs met the quality standards cla-

imed on the carton, Pre-packaged foods which are sold by weight, such as meat and most frozen foods, are certified as to correct weight by a red seal which also bears Commissioner White's signature, Gasoline pumps, grocery scales and all other commercial weight and measuring devices are approved as correct with a round seal, either yellow or white, which has the date of inspection punched out in a numbered code.

the picture above. The housewife would do well to watch for there week of quality and quantity when she makes a purchase at her local store.

Not all aggs or pre-packed goods will have the seals, however. White pointed out. The size of the store and the vest number of goods on the market make it imposeible for inspectors to check every package. Frequent spot-checks are made throughout the state on a regular basis to ferret out any inequitable transactions.

But every grocery store scale and gasoline pump is checked regularly by the department, White said. In fact, the weights and measures men inspect every scale, beam, meter and measure used in commercial transactions in the state to protect the customer even before he gets to the cash register.

Every one of these devices must, by law, be inspected at least once a year. Correct devices receive the round certification seal. Faulty scales or other equipment are condemned until they are repaired by a registered service man. A green condemnation tag is placed on there, and cannot be removed by amyone other than a qualified service man or department inspector under penalty of law.

Punishment for violation carries only a small fine, but the real power of the law is in activering public opinion.

The Weights and Measures division protects the honest merchant as well as the consumer. But the consumer should be aware that a scale may have been altered fraudulently since the last inspection. The consumer should notify the department of any suspect scale.

"Watch for these seals of protection," Commissioner White urged. "They are your guarantee of consumer protection at






