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Devotional

IN WHAT OR IN WHOM
DO YOU HAVE FAITH?

Scripture: St. Luke 5:18-25; I Corinthians 10:12, 13.

"And all the crowd sought to touch Him (Jesus), for power came forth from Him and healed them all." — St. Luke 6:19.

Jesus was teaching, and the Pharisees and the teachers of the law from every village in Galilee and Judea and from Jerusalem were there to listen. The multitude was so great around Jesus that the men who loved their Paralytic friend could not get to Jesus because of the crowd. So, they took the man up on the house-top and let him down on his bed through the roof and placed him before Jesus.

Looking at the scene anew, can you see the situation? Jesus was talking and teaching those who held places of high authority in the synagogue — the Pharisaic Order — but yet the men who had a friend came because they knew Jesus and His power to heal the sick, the lame, the diseased, and those troubled with "unclean spirits". The crowd did not stop them; the struggle to get their friend up on the roof-top was barely mentioned, and they brought

their friend before Jesus.

What did Jesus do? Was He impatient or embarrassed at the interruption of so great an occasion? Not at all, for the Scripture says "when He saw their faith, He said, 'man, thy sins are forgiven thee...'" Then Jesus said to the man, "Arise, take up thy bed and walk."

It is true that we are saved from all sin (Jesus has the power upon earth to forgive all sin) by God's grace, through our faith in believe. Then, after Jesus has forgiven us, we reveal to others that we are saved by the evidence of our faith, which is our Christian walk. Jesus looked at their faith; the men who believed and cared enough to bring their friend to Jesus, and the man who was paralyzed yet allowed himself to be taken to Jesus. But after Jesus forgave this man's sins —

What do you think would have happened when Jesus said "Arise and walk", if the man had remained where he was, making no effort to get up and try to walk?

When you asked Jesus to forgive your sins, make you God's

child, and help you to follow Him, did you just lie there on your bed amid all sinful thoughts and deeds which bound you? Or did you, at His loving call to "Come, follow me!", arise and walk? Did you give yourself, your soul, your will, your hands and feet and voice, to Him in response to His great eternal love for you? Did you learn what it means to walk by faith? Then you know in whom you have believed and trusted, and your faith and knowledge and love is growing by exercise.

Do you believe in the power of Jesus to save and keep you saved from all sin forevermore? Jesus' promise is that He will not allow you to be tempted above what you can withstand, by your trust in Him and His power to overcome the world.

Christ is alive, He lives, He arose! Have you too, arisen and turned from your sin which has bound you and held you fast? Can you walk today with Jesus? Are you paralyzed spiritually, or do you dare look at Jesus?

Let me take you this day and help you to come before Jesus. Look at Him, and He will forgive you and give you eternal life. It is not my promise, it is His word. Hear me, and turn from your sin now, for I pray you in Christ's stead, Be ye reconciled to God.

When Jesus saw their faith He said, "Man, your sins be forgiven you."

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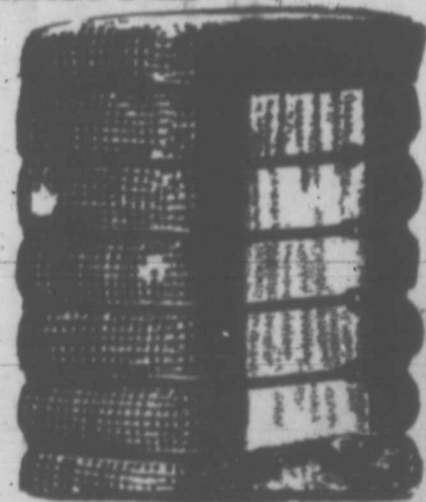
