Toll-Free Calls To Bula Discussed

Plans to promote toll-free telephone service between Bula and Sudan were discussed last Thursday night at a meeting of Sudan businessmen in a follow-up session to one held at Bula the previous Monday.

Mayor Joe Rone presided at the Thursday meeting, also attended by councilmen Wayne Brown and Marvin Tollett and members of the Sudan Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

After considerable discussion of the problems involved, a committee of five was appointed by CCA President Lester Shanks to work with Morton businessmen who are also trying to get toll-free calls from the Bula exchange to Morton. Those present at the Thursday meeting agreed that both Morton and Sudan would have a better chance of getting their aims achieved if they would push the project as one venture.

Customers on the Bula exchange already have toll-free service to Littlefield, a project completed a few years ago. This link-up cost the Bula subscribers about 75 cents more per month, and cost Littlefield subscribers on General Telephone an extra five cents per month. The Bula exchange is owned by the Five Area Co-Op, with headquarters in Muleshoe.

Many customers on the Bula exchange who live just south of Sudan have expressed a vi-

interesting in obtaining toll-free service here, Rone said. He noted that this is particularly true of those whose children attend Sudan schools, those who trade here or who otherwise have ties to Sudan.

One businessman noted that while it obviously would benefit Sudan businesses to have Bula customers calling direct to Sudan, it also would be of equally obvious benefit to those who live nearer to Sudan than anywhere else, yet can't place a call into town without paying a charge.

The more than 200 customers on the Bula exchange evidently are divided by geographical location as to where they would prefer to have toll-free phone service.

Some Sudan businessmen who attended the Bula meeting said it appeared naturally enough that those closer to Morton would like to be tied into Morton, and apparently many would be willing to make it a joint venture and be connected to Sudan also. A reciprocal feeling appears likely among Bula subscribers in the Sudan vicinity, he said. However, he added, people in the Pep area, already connected toll-free to Littlefield, apparently were solidly opposed to paying anymore on their phone bills for the privilege of toll-free calling to either Morton or Sudan or both.

He predicted that the Pep area subscribers would vote against the other Bula subscribers on a ballot which D. B. Lancaster, manager of Five Area Co-Op, indicated would be mailed to the Bula exchange patrons soon, seeking to determine the customers' feelings on extending toll-free service. Tollett questioned this, however.

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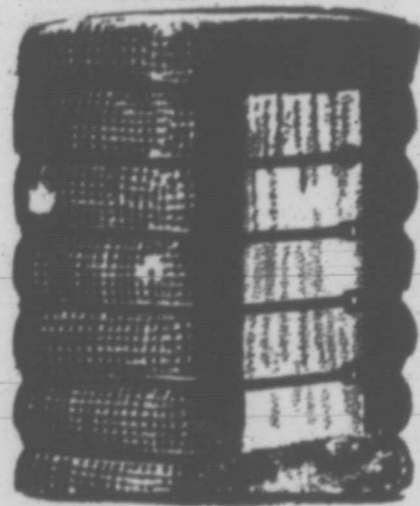
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Devotional

"DO WE HAVE FIVE LOAVES AND TWO FISHES?"

Scripture: St. Luke 9: 12-17; St. Mark 16: 15.

I wonder today as we go to worship... if we are in a desert place saying, "Send the multitude away"... But the multitude is not there to send away! Why? And where are they?

In fact, far too many church members used all kinds of reasonable excuses for not being in God's visible church Sunday to be with Him and His family of children. Some church members did not even bother to look for an excuse, having formed a habit of staying out of the fellowship of worship until they no longer could hear the "still small voice". They have also lost their spiritual appetite.

But, Praise God, there were some who did not attend in physical body, yet were in the fellowship because they not only

desired to be there, but joined the worshippers in the Spirit and in prayer.

Why? Many Christians and churchmen today are struggling to find the answer as to why persons have so great an opportunity, freedom to worship God and yet do not come to His church. So, we continue to pray and search for the answer—"And Jesus said unto him, foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man hath not where to lay His head."

Jesus went out into a mountain, into a village, into a city, down to the plain, into the desert, down by the sea; He taught His disciples, and He both spoke to and fed the multitude. But Jesus also, as his custom was, went into the synagogue on the sabbath day.

It is said, Christians, that if

we set our pulpits on fire, at least some of the curious would come in to watch them burn. But what kind of fire—and by what method can we start the fire? In the first place, do we want to start it? Do we want to become involved in all this, giving ourselves completely, or do we just want to continue our meetings and be comfortable? When Christians come, truly praying, the fire comes from heaven—from God Almighty.

So, what and to whom are we looking today? There is but One way—Jesus! I think, Christians, according to our Bible, to keep following Jesus in joy, delight, assurance, peace, faith and love, we must come together in fellowship and worship, and then go out everywhere to witness and tell the good news that Jesus Saves!

Christians do not come to church on Sundays because we like or dislike the preacher, either His sermon or in person. (But remember, the preacher is speaking as God's messenger!)

Neither do we come to church because we like or dislike the choir's singing, the hymns chosen for all to sing, or the order of worship. Christians do not come because they are forced to come by law—they come because of Love! To worship, to seek God our Father, to learn of Him, to grow in knowledge of Him. To share in prayer and praise and study and fellowship with Him and His other children, and to find our courage and faith renewed in this worshiping communion together. We need and we want to assemble ourselves together.

"For God so loved the world—" "While we were yet sinners, Christ died for us."

"We love Him, because He first loved us."

"And this is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in His Son." "He that cometh unto me, I will in no wise cast out."

Will you come? The Good news of the gospel is that Jesus Saves! He came to reveal the Father, and the purpose was to do the Father's will—to give Himself that all men might be saved from sin and death into eternal life! "Whoever will" may come—this means you.

"Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." So Christians, come, then go!

NEWSMEN PICK A QUEEN—Dale Evans, singer, song-writer, author, movie-radio-TV star and Queen of the Cowgirls, has been named Texan of the Year by the Texas Press Association. Announcement of her selection came from Don Coppedge, chairman of TPA's Texan of the Year Committee and publisher of the Waxahachie Daily Light. Uvalde-born Miss Evans is the wife of Roy Rogers, popularly known as King of the Cowboys. Rogers will accompany his wife to San Antonio where the newsmen will present the special award to Miss Evans during TPA's Mid-Winter Convention, Jan. 28-29. Winn Crossley, association president and publisher of the Madisonville Meteor, said this is the first time in the history of the state's largest newspaper organization that a woman has been selected as Texan of the Year.
