WHEN I was a student in high school and later, in college, I disliked the study of history. Somehow, it never was presented to me in a way which made it interesting. Consequently, I took only the required history courses, and most of the history I know is vague stuff I just picked up accidentally in one place or another.

If the kids nowadays are getting their history from accidental exposure, they're sure getting a distorted view of it. Our television programs and movies have made heroes of hoods and outlaws, handsome smooth-shaven characters out of guys like Daniel Boone and Kit Carson, and most of the things they do in the movies and TV shows are far removed from their actual experiences.

Of course, I've always felt that the history courses themselves were much to blame for this. In reading a United States history textbook or a Texas history book, it's often impossible to find more than a mere mention of the characters who are so played up in romantic fiction more or less based on facts.

Yes, Virginia, there really was a Daniel Boone. And a Wyatt Earp, Billy the Kid, John Wesley Hardin, King Fisher, William Cody, Wild Bill Elliott, etc. But it's a shame the history books won't take a little extra space to tell who they really were, something of their actual documented exploits (many of which were indeed exciting).

This not only would make the history class more interesting, but also would straighten out some of the gross distortions of the fictionalized version of some of these western characters' lives.

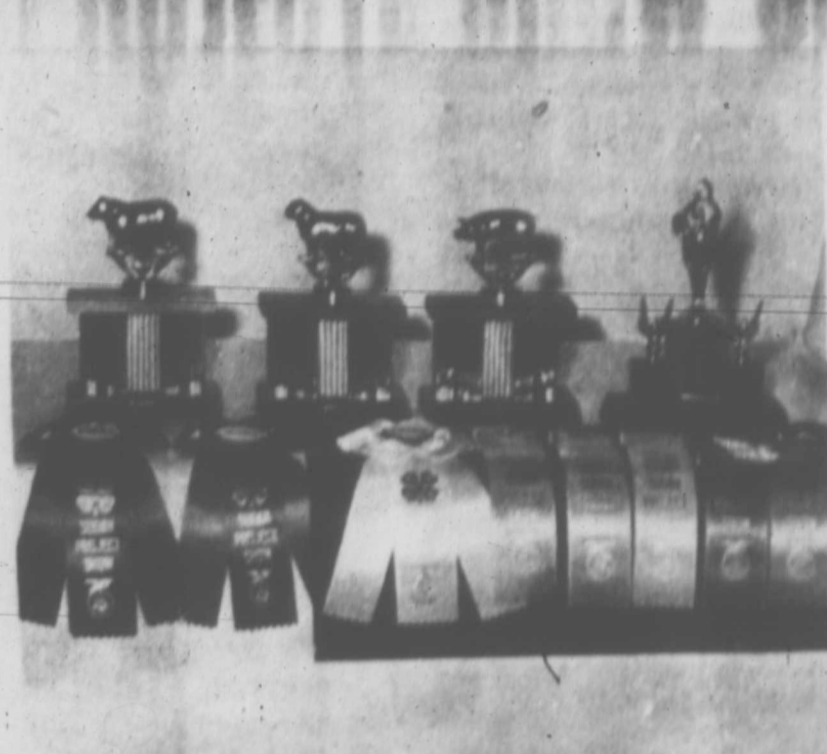

DO YOU WANT TO LIVE FOREVER

Scripture: Galatians 5: 13-26, 6: 7-9.

Be not deceived; God is not mocked; for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting.

Many times the above scripture is quoted in part, as a warning. But it is not merely a warning. It is a great promise.

This promise, so great that it staggers my thinking into an almost delirious state of joyful emotion, should be claimed by each and every one of us. For it is not the Father-Creator's

will that any man be lost. God wants to give you and me the abundant everlasting life.

Then let us search the Scripture and learn how to claim God's promises. How do we "sow to the Spirit"? First by accepting Jesus as our Savior and Lord; as "way" into life. Then we follow Jesus at His call. Living in the Spirit, we also walk in the Spirit. By forgiving an erring brother and restoring him to our love and friendship, remembering we also can be tempted. We walk in the Spirit by bearing one another's burdens, bearing also our own burdens without vain glory, proving our own faith in Jesus Christ in works of service. Those who are taught in the

word, share with him that teacheth in all good things. But, you may say, how can I do this sowing? I am weak, I am tempted to sin. How can I? Christian character is a process of God's Holy Spirit working within you, to mold you and make you after His desire and purpose. We who love God, with gratitude and humbleness for His loving us even before we knew Him, and who ask for His forgiveness of our sins — we are children of God. When our sins which are many have been forgiven, it is the Spirit of the living all-powerful God that gives victory over temptation and sin.

"For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh; and these are contrary the one to the other; so that ye cannot do the things that ye would. But if ye be led by the Spirit, ye are not under the law."

Then, how do we sow to the Spirit? By love! In love of God first, and love of our neighbor as we love ourselves. We ask for God's help, which He delights to give us continually if we will use it.

If we are led by His Spirit, in love for Him we turn away from the works of sin, the works of the flesh; adultery, fornication, uncleanness (when even unclean thoughts come unbidden into the mind, call on God and follow Jesus' example saying "Get thee behind me, Satan", and seek thoughts and deeds of love; I testify that it works!), lasciviousness (which means lustful, wanton, exciting lustfulness), idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies, envyings, murders, drunkenness, revellings, and such like.

But sowing to and seeking the fruit of the Spirit is how the Holy Spirit produces in us the Christ-like character which we so much desire. It is not by our own self-efforts, but in o-

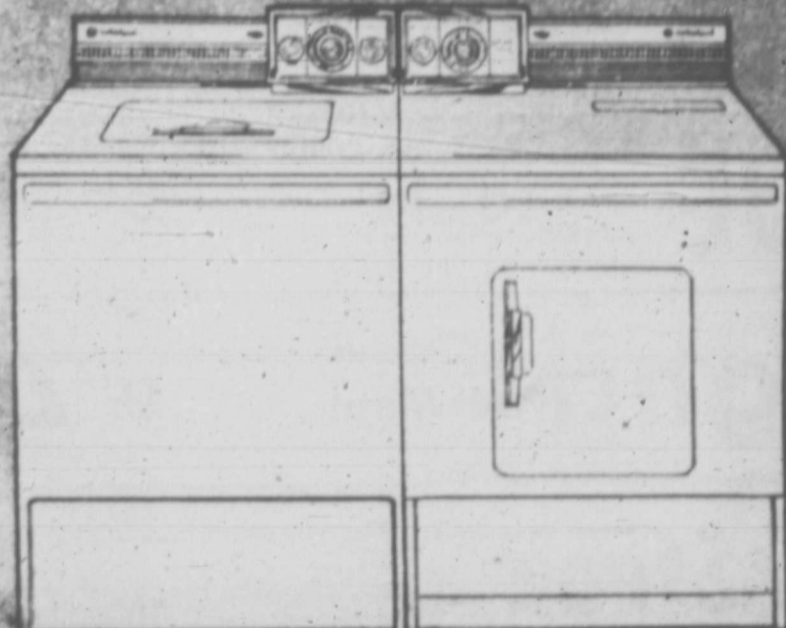
