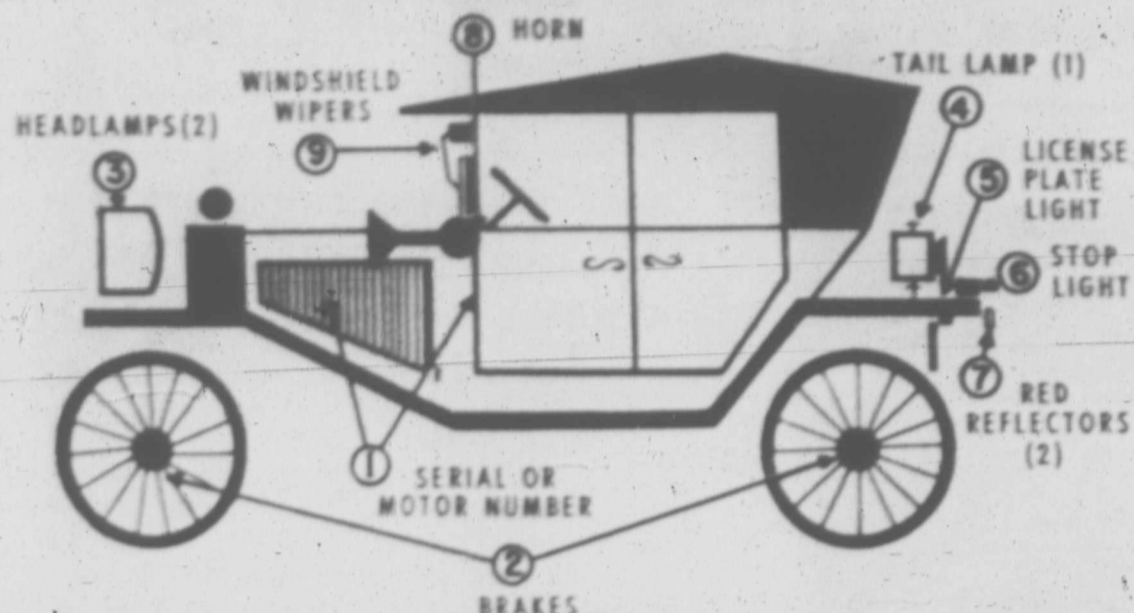

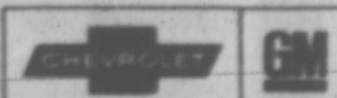

Catch Crabgrass Napping Before It Strangles Good Grass

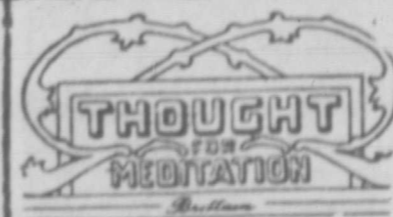

Post Office Demands Good Lookers



Attractive rural mail boxes, such as used by this roadside reader, have role in Keep America Beautiful campaign. Postal carriers will check appearance, condition, and mounting of estimated 18,000,000 rural boxes in U.S. during Mail Box Improvement Month in May for compliance with Post Office Regulations.

The rural mail-box plays a big part in the current "Keep America Beautiful" campaign. Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson, who has been in the forefront of this campaign, has agreed that "attractive mail boxes do enhance our nation's highways."

An estimated 18,000,000 rural mail boxes are in use serving almost 70,000,000 Americans. May is a red-letter month for them. It's the Post Office Department's Mail Box Improvement Month stressing compliance with postal regulations.

To pass inspection the rural mail box must be in good condition and weatherproof... securely mounted at a convenient height for the carrier. During Mail Box Improvement Month every mail box is inspected and patrons are advised of sub-standard conditions. Failure to comply may result in discontinuance of service.

A postal official points out that the name of the patron must be neatly printed on the box in letters not less than one-inch high... or a suitable name plate can be used as sold in many hardware stores.

There is also a safety factor in having properly marked boxes... the postal official declared. "Many new streets are not included in directories or maps. It's happened that people who failed to put their names on their mail box have experienced

undue delay in having emergency fire or medical care reach their home when minutes counted."

With the incentive provided by Mail Box Improvement Month and the Administration's beautification program, homeowners replacing old mail boxes will find a wide choice of colors available.

Jackie-Evans Mfg. Company of St. Louis, Missouri, nation's largest maker of R.F.D. boxes and posts reports that new boxes in colors now account for 25% of industry sales with demand continuing to grow. "Even city dwellers are using them to add charm to their homes."

"It's too bad," comments a mid-western postmaster, "but a good many boxes are neglected and get to look shabby. They downgrade the appearance of the property... even the neighborhood." With the cooperation of boxholders, he added, "Mail Box Improvement Month can help beautify the landscape and also help carriers make their appointed rounds more efficiently for better service."

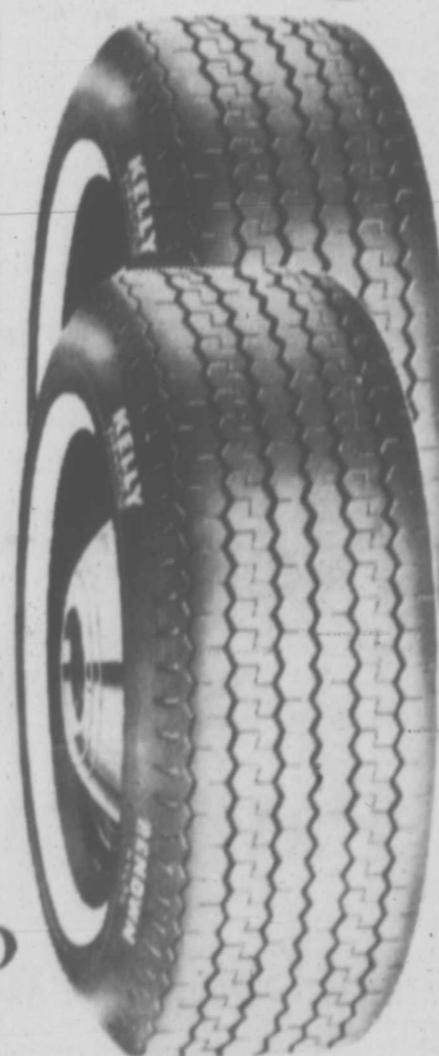

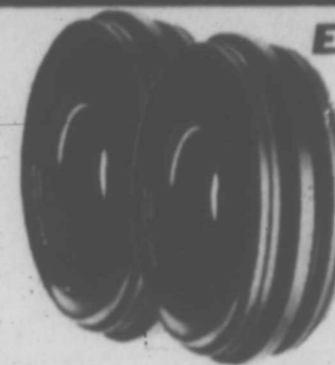

A Question of Timing

Few questions will irk a new investor more than investment timing. If everyone had his own genie to make the improbable possible, our worries would be few, indeed.

But genies belong to the never-never world of make-believe, and the fact remains that there will always be a right time and a wrong time for doing things.

However, in the world of investment, it need not be so cut and dried. There is, in fact, a way to diminish the spectre of a poorly-timed move. It is known as "dollar-cost averaging," a time-tested investment principle considerably less forbidding than its name implies.

While D-CA is available and practiced in various ways, there is probably no other medium in which it is more widely used than in the medium of the mutual fund.

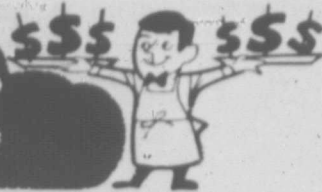
How does dollar-cost averaging work? It is simply the buying of fixed-dollar amounts of securities at regular intervals, regardless of price levels. By doing this over a period of time, it is a matter of simple arithmetic that in a fluctuating market more shares of stock are bought at relatively lower prices than higher ones.

Most mutual funds offer accumulation plans which permit the investor to buy shares periodically, in equal amounts, over a period of 10 or more years, thus effectively putting to good use the D-CA principle. Are such plans popular? Statistics say they are. Accumulation plans are growing at the rate of 30,000 a month and presently there are more



than 26 million such plans in force. Mutual funds today manage assets valued at more than \$35 billion. They do much more for the individual than just fret over time factors and the like. An investment in a mutual fund provides the individual with continuous professional management at reasonable cost and the sound principle of diversification, which, by spreading the investor's dollar over a broad list of securities, helps to reduce the risk inherent in all forms of investing.
