WOODWORK

KNOTHOLES in the Woodwork: Someday, perhaps by the time our own children are grown, medical science will have come up with the answers to many of the age-old killers like cancer and heart disease... but people will still die, if only from boredom... More Texas communities are discovering that they are legally wet for beer sales as a result of an old 1933 law which recently was re-interpreted. In almost every case, however, an election is immediately petitioned and the precincts voted dry... A lot of people who voted in the justice of the peace write-in deal at Sudan will have it all to do over, although it seems sort of ridiculous that a quirk of the law voids the entire election.

BILLY GRAHAM, in his recently televised sermons, commented at one point that adults are being led by youth, are, in fact, copying everything that the youngsters come up with, forcing the teen set to find some other gimmick which they can claim as their own.

According to a story out of New York quoting a research consultant on motivation (which I assume is a fancy name for some kind of psychiatrist), others agree with the evangelist. This man noted that adults took over rock'n'roll, adopted the Twist, Frug and Watusi, sliced hemst above the knee, and even talked about sexual revolution as much as the youngsters.

"Every step youth took to differentiate itself was followed by a copycat action on the part of adult society," he said.

He said that youth considers the adult society "as a pitiable, alienated, replaceable segment of the world's population," noting that one interviewed youth told him, "adults are the enemy."

Another said: "We're taking over sooner or later. We have to. We're the active generation. Yours is the generation of betrayal. You started out idealistic and wound up commercial."

The psychiatrist was fascinated to find that one of the basic things with teen-agers is putting their parents on--making them think things that aren't so.

One youngster explained: "We tell parents things just to find out what it takes to shock them... we don't really care."

The consultant also listed some bleak implications from his study, such as models in advertising to be younger and younger, package design to move more toward sensual materials and sexy forms, fewer young people to want to have anything to do with the bomb or development of weapons (which might be a good thing), and a big future for products which promise relief from anxiety.

In spite of all his findings, some of which are sadly and unquestionably accurate, I still believe there are quite a few normal, understandable youngsters in this part of the world today.

SWPS TO INSTALL NEW LIGHTS HERE

Southwestern Public Service Co. began work this week on the installation of new street lights in Sudan.

H. H. (Herb) Potter, local manager of SWPS, said that in the installation of this new lighting system, no light poles would be moved, but all business district and Main Street lights

would be changed from the pear-shaped globe to the highway type globe, and the bulb size changed from 15,000 to 20,000 lumen which will give a one-third increase. Both the bulbs, and shape of the new globes are designed to make Sudan a better lighted city, and will add much to the town's good appearance.

In the residential area of town lights will be changed, also, to make the new system all mercury vapor lights. Bulbs will be 7,000 lumen in this area.

Completion of the light installation work is estimated to be within 60 days or as soon as possible, Potter said.

BELONGS
TO GOD!

Scripture: Genesis 1:1; Job 38: 1-21; 40: 2; 41: 1-4, 10, 11; St. John 10: 17-18.

The "Power" of God is a word which has been read and spoken sometimes as lightly and politely as a "Good Morning" to a stranger. 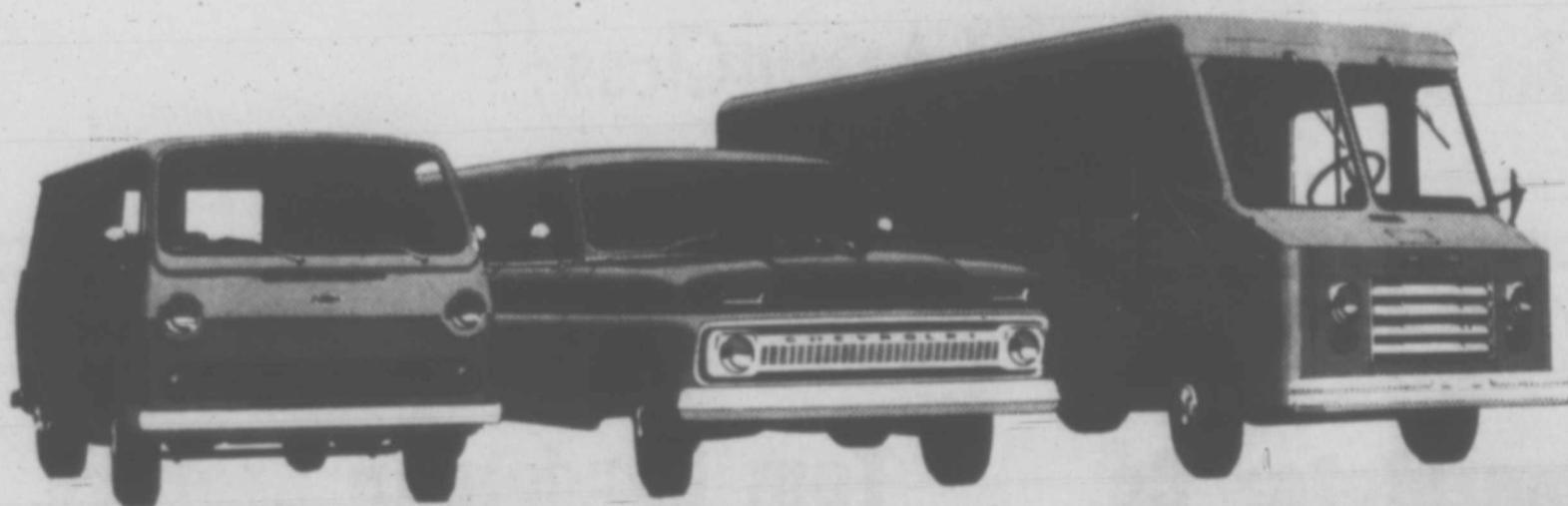

Cong. Rogers To Offer Water Amendment

Congressman Walter Rogers, chairman of the House Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation, said in a telegram Tuesday that he will offer an amendment to the Lower Colorado River Project legislation to include West Texas in studies to be made of future water requirements in the west and southwest.

Congressman Rogers also said "Water-short areas must think now about their future and consider all possible means to alleviate problems, including im-

portation of water from water-surplus areas elsewhere in the USA or adjoining foreign countries. There is simply not enough room for all of us to live on the banks of the creek, but all of us must have water."

He also stated that state responsibilities can not be avoided simply because the Federal Government is willing to help, and that the Texas Panhandle and High Plains should be included in the Texas State Water Plan.
