In the sanctuary, Mrs. Minyard presided over the pledge service, with each member making her individual pledge and taking it to the altar.

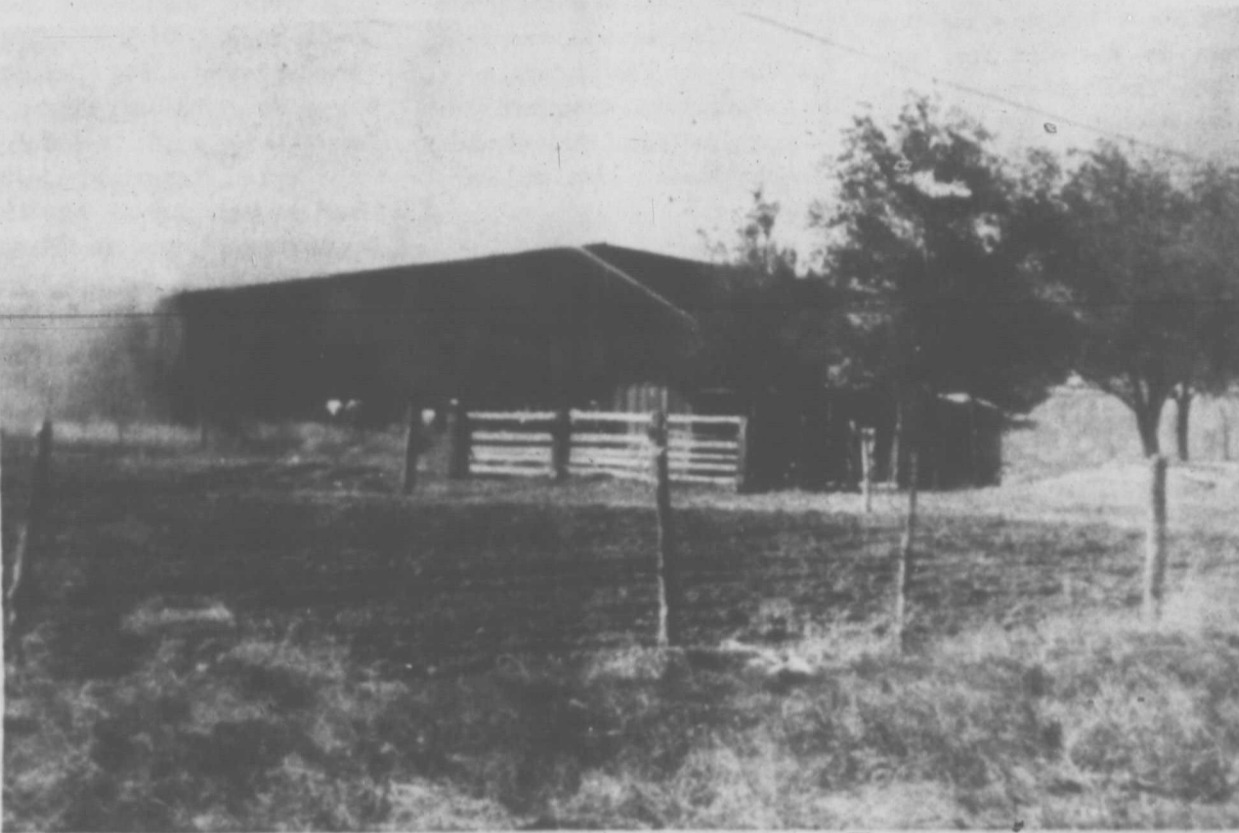
Rev. Jack Riley installed the officers for the coming year, having each officer as they came to take up a cross from the altar, with scripture references on the back of each cross for them to read at home.

ESTMATES ON COMPRESS FIRE NOT COMPLETE

The warehouse was badly damaged but Guy Nickels, manager and owner, reported that damage will not be as costly as first reported as many bales will be salvaged.

Damages have not been estimated for the 4-alarm fire here Wednesday at the Central Compress and Warehouse Inc. Spokesman Hoyt Roberson, stated that it is impossible to correctly estimate the cost of the fire until salvage of the cotton is completed, but that the damage will be far under the first estimates of \$1,000,000.

He further stated that the cotton has been removed from the completely destroyed warehouse and has been stacked in an open field where salvage crews are at work. The bales had to be watched for several days following the fire to prevent any further burning.

The destroyed warehouse housed between 74,000 and 75,000 bales of government loan and acquired cotton valued at over \$1,000,000. However, approximately 35,000 bales received only water damage. Surprisingly no bale was completely destroyed.

Firemen from Sudan, Little-

field, Muleshoe and Maple answered the alarm Wednesday and firemen remained on the scene throughout the night Wednesday night. Roberson stated that he and all compress personnel feel that the fire departments should be highly commended on their splendid work at distinguishing and maintaining the fire.

Cause of the fire has not been determined.

PETEQUETTE WHEN TRAVELING

Everyone planning on taking a dog along on vacation should firmly resolve to follow certain rules of pet etiquette en route.
