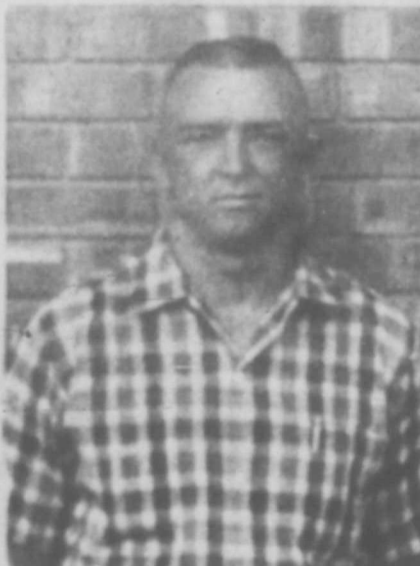
The city council has combined with civic organizations in establishing a city-wide recreation program for the summer months of June and July.

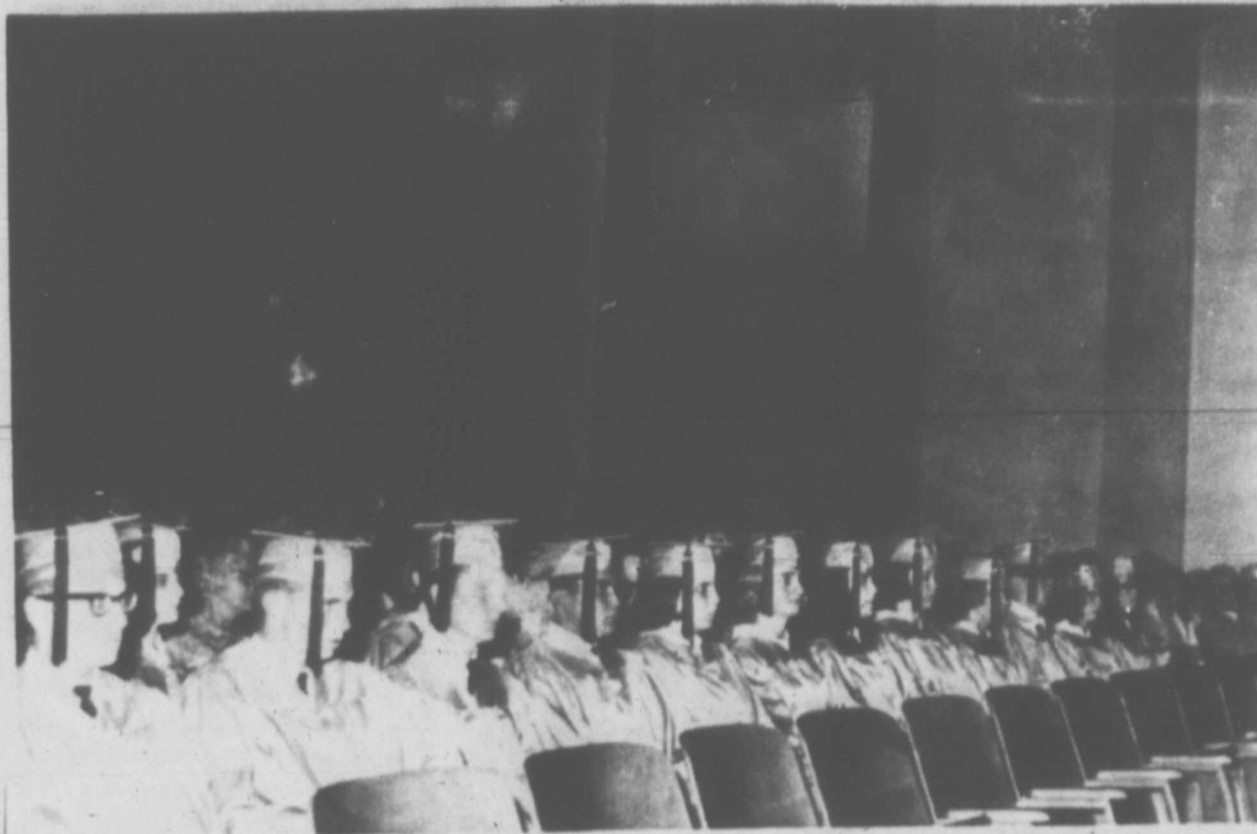

SURPLUS CITY OPENS HERE SATURDAY

Surplus City, a new business in Sudan, will have its Grand Opening Saturday, June 3. The discount type business is owned and

operated by Doyle Lamb of Amherst, who also operates the same type business in Amherst, and is located at 214 Main Street, in the building formerly occupied by Morris Hardware.

Lamb and his family, including his wife, Irene, two daughters, Beva, age 8 and Doyle, age 6, and son, Monty, age 17 months, have resided in Amherst for approximately 18 months, moving from Borger, where Lamb operated a discount store.

Surplus City is the first business of the discount type to be opened in Sudan and Lamb stressed that only high quality merchandise will be sold. He stated further that he plans to open a store in Earth and will make Sudan the center of operations for all three stores with his warehouse located here.

Included in the line of merchandise will be hardware, tools, auto supplies and accessories, sport-

ing goods, houseware, work boots, hats, guns and ammunition and will sell hunting and fishing licenses.

The new store will be open from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. six days per week. Johnny Enloe of Amherst will manage the store with one other employee being employed.

Scripture: St. John 13:35; 14:6; St. Matthew 7:14.

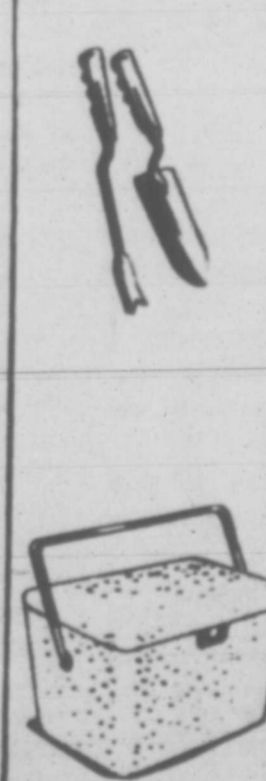

Drain pineapple; add enough water to pineapple syrup to make 1 cup liquid. Heat liquid to boiling; pour over gelatin in large bowl; stir until dissolved. Blend in marshmallow whip. Chill until consistency of unbeaten egg white. Chill evaporated milk in refrigerator tray until soft ice crystals form around edges (about 10 to 15 minutes). Whip very stiff (about 1 minute). Add lemon juice. Whip until stiff (about 2 minutes longer). Fold with pineapple into marshmallow mixture; chill 10 to 20 minutes. Fill and frost cake layers. Chill until serving time. Garnish with pineapple slices, if desired.
