Sudan Youth Named Outstanding Athlete

Jerry Bellar, son of Mr. and Mrs. Waymon Bellar of Sudan, won top honors as outstanding athlete in the Lubbock Jaycee Junior Track and Field Meet last Wednesday.

Bellar competed in the Prep Boys Division and won the 100 yard dash in a swift 10.4, captured first place in the 220 yard dash in 23.9, threw the shot put for a distance of 41' 6" for third place, and won third in broad jump with a 16' 6" leap. His 10.4 in the 100 yard dash was a record breaking time for the Lubbock Track.

Larry Hama, also entered in the Prep Boys Division, won fourth place in the 70 yard low hurdles and sixth place in the 220 dash.

Kathy Rice placed fourth in the 220 yard dash of the Prep Girls Division, followed by Frances Hama who won fifth in the same event.

The eight Sudan youth including Steve Martin, Roger Bellar, Pax Brown and Connie Lance, were sponsored by the Sudan Jaycees in the meet with approximately 300 South Plains youth participating.

In Andrews for the Permian Basin Relays last Saturday were Jerry Bellar, Mike Bellar, Steve Martin and Larry Morgan. They were accompanied by Coaches Jim Cain and Norman Nelson. J. Bellar placed second in the 100 yard dash with 10.6, leaped

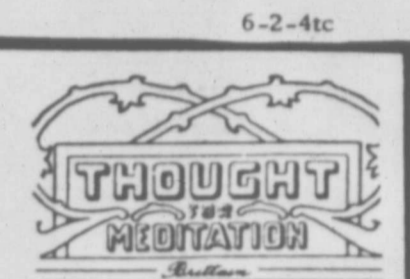
