NORWAY has a law which most workers, and especially housewives, in this country would probably appreciate, even if there is one angle to it which smacks of socialism.

The law says every employed person in Norway is entitled to four weeks holiday each year with pay. That is the law, and it applies to housewives.

It all is part of Norway's Holiday Act which established the Housewives Holiday Fund. Here is how it works:

Suppose a Norwegian housewife wants to get away from it all for a few weeks. Who will look after her children and household? The answer is the Housewives Relief, an organization that consists of well-trained women, specialists in child care and household management. Practically all communities in Norway are blessed with a branch of the Housewives Relief, financed by the local authorities (what, not the federal government?).

When a housewife gets fed up, she phones the organization, applies for her state-guaranteed vacation, and an acceptable worker to care for her household is provided.

This sounds like a great idea, huh, girls? Of course, I don't suppose the government provides the money to spend on the vacation, but I'm sure it would do so in the U.S.A.


