## CAGERS LOSE SEASON OPENERS

Sudan cagers did not get off to a very good start this season with all teams being defeated in opening games.

The Hornets gave the crowd a thrilling climax to their opener against Whiteface here Tuesday,

Nov. 22, by almost tying the game in the last second. The final score was not counted as the shot was made after the whistle blew. The final score was Whiteface 58-Sudan 56. Ronnie Hill led the scoring with

20 points, followed by Mike Bellar with 13, Danny Martin and Larry Morgan scored 8 points each, Gary Gatewood had 4, Harry Williamson 2, and Steve Martin L. Sudan sank 66 per cent of their free throws.

Although the Sudan High School Girls led 18-15 at half-time, Whiteface came back to defeat them 40-34. P. Mudgett totaled 13 points, Kathy Fisher 8, Jeannie Baker 5, Donna Heard 4, and Sharon Baker and Donna Gaston each had 3. Mrs. Harrison stated that the guards, including Margie Bellar, Frances Hanna Susan Jones, Kathy Minyard, and Jackie Noblett, did a fine job in holding the accurate shooting Whiteface girls to a low score.

The high school varsity boys and girls teams were defeated in Dimmitt Friday night. The boys, led in scoring by Danny Martin with 16 points were defeated mostly on free throws, scoring only 30 per cent while Dimmitt sacked -up 77 per cent of their throws. Halftime score was Dimmitt 33, Sudan 20, but Sudan only scored 14 points during the last half while Dimmitt equalled their first half scoring of 33 points. Other Sudan Players scoring were Mike Beller 7, Gary Gatewood 6, Ronnie Hill 3, and Larry Morgan 2.

The Sudan Hornets also lost

to Dimmitt 61-48 but seemed much improved. Penny Mudgett led the scoring with 23 points, followed by Donna Heard with 15, Sharon Baker with 8, and Donn Gaston with 2. Free throws again counted as the margin of the game with Dimmitt scoring 25 points on FT while Sudan put only 8 through the hoop. Coach Glynna Harrison stated that the team has improved and are becoming more accurate in their shots while also developing more team work.

Junior high teams had no better luck in their season opener Monday against Springlake. The seventh grade girls lost 61-24 with Pax Brown as high pointer with 14 points.

Other team members are forwards: Susan Gaston, Linda Bellar, Gloria Sloan, Cynthia Scott; guards: Noralee Womack, Ginger May, Velma Legg, Gwen Churchman, Glenda Williams.

### Telephone Company To Reduce Rates

Reduced long distance rates for most station-to-station calls within Texas will become effective January 1, 1967 for customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, according to E. H. Danner, president.

State-wide reductions on three minute calls vary from five to fifteen cents on most station

to-station calls over 56 miles in distance within Texas. Reductions for calls over three minutes are even greater, according to Danner. The reductions apply to calls made during the time when "day rates" are in effect as well as to all intrastate (within Texas) station-to-station calls made during the "night rate" hour after 8 p. m. and all

day Sunday.

The new tariffs reflecting the reduced rates will be distributed to all offices handling long distance calls at the earliest possible date, Danner stated.

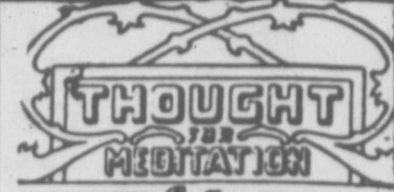

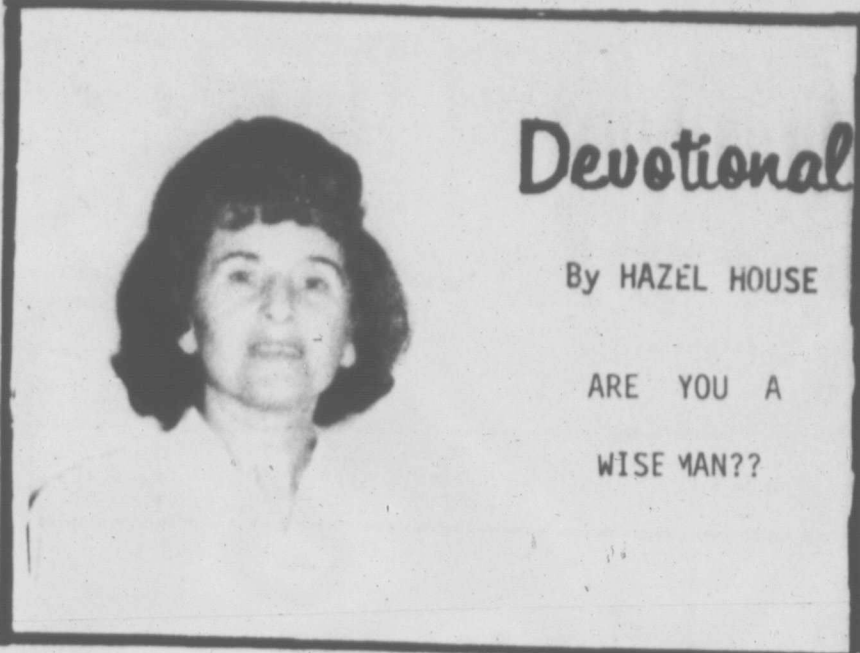
