A GROUP OF lawyers, a special commission of the American Bar Association, last weekend recommended direct popular election of president and vice president and abandonment of the 177-year-old electoral college system.

We agree entirely. The practice of delegates and having them vote sometimes makes it possible for a candidate to win—lose—although a plurality of the people voting would have it go the other way. The electoral college was rightly described by the commission as "archaic, undemocratic, complex, inefficient and dangerous." This description also would fit some people I know.

CAGERS SPLIT WITH BOVINA

The Cagers from Sudan and the Cagers from Bovina split the wins when they met Tuesday night to open conference play in this district.

The Hornets took an early lead and led at the end of the first period 25-10. The final score

read Sudan 79, Bovina 60, with three Hornets scoring a double figure. Mike Bellar was high point, scoring 29 points, while Ronnie Hill put 14 points through the hoop and Danny Martin scored 10 for Sudan.

Randy Jones was highpoint for Bovina with 24 points.

The Hornets got off to a good start in their game and led 25-17 at the half. But the fired-up Bovina fens came back in the second half and swiftly cut the lead from beneath the rattled Hornets, who only scored two points in the third quarter compared to Bovina's.

The Sudan girls were plagued by fouls in the fourth period when Bovina went into a stall. Bovina has two forwards over six feet to aid their cause in stalling the ball and making hook shots.

The final score went to Bovina 42-40. Penny Mudgett scored 20 points for Sudan and all three forwards for Bovina scored in the double figures.

The Sudan girls B-team won their game 30-16 in what seemed a rough but easy victory. Jeanne Baker was high point with 13, followed by Sheryl Watts with 10.

The Hornets also won second place in the Amherst tournament played last week. They defeated Nazareth 39-37 in the first game, although they had a hard time getting started. Kathy Fisher was the heroine when Mudgett fouled off and she went in and scored the tie-breaking basket

to win the game.

In their second game, they took an early lead from Spade and went on to win the game 57-36.

In the finals against Whiteface Saturday night, the Hornets again ran into foul trouble. Sudan led 16-15 at the half, but panicked when Whiteface went into a stall in the fourth period forcing the Hornets to lose on free throws made by the Whiteface forwards.

The Hornets did not fare as well although they won their first game 50-42 against Bledsoe with Bellar scoring 20 points to lead the pack. They fell to a sharp-shooting quintet from McAadoo in the second game, led by a chap who scored 48 points for McAadoo. The boys also met a team from Whiteface for consolation and brought home the trophy. Sudan had four boys scoring above 10 points to make the score 70-59. Free throws dominated the scoreboard with Sudan making 22 of the 53 they attempted.

The eighth grade girls defeated Bovina 24-10 last Thursday with Donna Hill scoring 12 points for Sudan.

The seventh and eighth grade teams (boys and girls) will meet Springlake here Thursday afternoon.

The freshman team will participate in a tournament at Dimmitt beginning today, Thursday.

Local Citizens Review Business Situation Here

As one local citizen recently stated, "It is time for Sudan to sit up and take notice of the business situation here." In a following discussion the conclusion was what to invest in a town that seems to be dying on its feet. However, things are not always what they seem.

Merchants here report that in comparison, business is off only slightly from last year. Compared to the nation's rate of business Sudan has maintained their average rather well.

Guy Walden, resident of the First National Bank of Sudan reports that deposits lower at the end of the year with \$2,942,458.49 on deposit Dec. 30, 1966, compared to \$3,241,652.02 on Dec. 31, 1965. However, he stated that deposits have been rising steadily during the month of January.

Local business changes which have occurred recently include the retirement of Mr. and Mrs. Ves. Patterson, who have been in business here for some 40 years. They have operated, primarily a canvas and shoe repair shop the last few years, but in times past, all types of leather goods and clothing were featured merchandise. Patterson stated that canvas irrigation merchandise made by him, may be purchased at Heard's Grocery.

Shanks department store, formally closed its doors for business this week. Also the variety store, located next door to Shanks is now in its last week of business with the stock to be moved this weekend.

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PIONEERS
OF
YESTERYEAR

"Author's note: Family background and history of the late Joe G. Wilkinson and his wife, Mrs. Mary (Cummings) Wilkinson, is submitted by Mrs. Wilkinson who not only has kept the family history but has compiled a scrapbook of early Sudan and its people. After forty-four years, she has seen many changes in both the town and her family. She has lost two children and her husband in death, and has seen the other eight children marry and make homes elsewhere; but, according to Mrs. Wilkinson, she still has her good neighbors and friends."

The late Joe G. Wilkinson, well known Sudan barber and pioneer, was a native of Oklahoma, born

Feb. 10, 1901, in the Indian Territory near the present day town of Reck. The family lived at different places in the Indian Territory and in 1907 moved to Beaver County where Joe started school.

Highlights of his early school days was attending school in a half-dugout where each child had to provide his own desk, these were home-made from boxes.

After attending school in Beaver County, Joe along with the Wilkinson family moved to the present day Duncan, then known as West Liberty where in 1915 he attended Red School.

In Duncan the family lived one-half mile from a family named Cummings, whose daughter, Mary, was the future Mrs. Wilkinson.

Mary, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cummings, did considerable moving about with her family during her childhood.

Born May 10, 1901 at Charlie, Texas, Mary Cummings was still a baby when her parents made their first of two moves to Beavers Crossing, Nebraska. However, most of her schooling was obtained in Oklahoma and she attended Stony Point School at Apache and high school at Duncan.

In Beaver County, Feb. 13, 1921, she married Joe Wilkinson.

After one year of farming the young couple decided to make a move together, this time to West Texas, near a country village called Sudan. Also deciding to move to this frontier of ranchland being broken out for farming were his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alexander G. Wilkinson, who were also Sudan pioneers.

In October of 1922, Joe Wilkinson and parents loaded two wagons with the two families' belongings and headed out for Texas. Mrs. Wilkinson remained behind awaiting the birth of their second child, another daughter, born in December. Her husband returned in time of Christmas and he and wife, with two babes in arms, boarded a train for Sudan, one wintry day in January, 1923. In Amarillo they missed train connections by one hour and had to remain over for one night. Mrs. Wilkinson remembers thinking Amarillo was the coldest place on earth.

PERSONAL
FORTY-FOURTH ANNIVERSARY OF ARRIVAL IN SUDAN
JANUARY 21, 1967

About noon, Jan. 21, 1923, with the snow falling, the train arrived in Sudan and there to meet them in a wagon containing the welcome sight of quilts to wrap up in, were other members of the Wilkinson clan, including Joe's father, his two brothers, Willie and Charlie, and his brother-in-law, Allen Smith.
