The U. S. WEATHER Bureau at Lubbock recently has been putting that city in the news as the coldest place this side of Montana with official reports of temperatures frequently 3 or 4 degrees lower than Amarillo reports.

Lubbock has had the low reading to the state, colder than Dabhart quite often lately, and it seems evident that something is wrong with the instruments or the reporting system.

## LIVESTOCK SHOW SCHEDULED SATURDAY

The 1967 Sudan FFA 4-H Livestock Show will get underway Saturday, Jan. 21 at the local Agricultural Livestock Barn, with 70 animals, twice the number entered last year, to be on exhibition by 11 a.m. Judging

by assistant Lubbock County agent Cook will begin at 4 p.m. Animals entered include 7 steers, 6 heifers, 26 barrows, 8 gilts, 5 sows, and 18 lambs. There will be five classes in the swine division, two in beef and

four for the sheep divisions. Trophies and ribbons, donated by interested persons, will be awarded in all classes. The Grand Champion trophy was donated by Lumpkin Foods. Also a showman award will be awarded to a boy or a girl for the best showing of an animal. Clean pens will also contribute to this award.

Louis Fields, show superintendent, announced today, Thursday will be Work Day at the show barn. All interested persons are needed to ready the barn and

show area. Also bleachers will be erected for the comfort of spectators. The Young Homemakers organization will sponsor the concession stand. Other show officers include Kenneth Burgess, beef; Houston Black, swine; S. A. Farmer, Don Ham, FFA supervisor, stated that the show is expected to be a tremendous success and stressed that the quality of animals to be before.

Everyone is urged to attend and support the youths as they enter. This is strictly a local show with only Sudan Youth entered and all residents are urged to attend the show and support the FFA and 4-H members as they enter competition.

## Basketball News

The Sudan Hornets lost their first district basketball game of the season against Springlake Tuesday night. The varsity girls also suffered a defeat by the Springlake girls.

The boys' game was tied at half, 32-32, and the score remained close throughout the game with Springlake coming out on top with a two point margin, 59-57.

The Hornets stand 1-2 in conference play after losing to Springlake 69-23 in one of their off nights. The girls only made 35 per cent of their free throws and just couldn't seem to pour the ball through the hoop. Penny Mudgett led the scoring for the home-town lasses with 12 points.

The conference victory for the Hornets came Friday night when they came from behind in the last half to down Kress 26-20.

The Sudan girls B-team was defeated by Springlake 42-33 although Jeanne Baker put 23 points on the board for Sudan.

The varsity teams travel to Whiteface Thursday night, while the B-teams will be engaged in the Dimmitt tournament and the junior high teams play Farwell here, beginning at 4 p.m.

## SCHOOL CENSUS BEING CONDUCTED

The annual count of all school age persons in this school district is now in progress, according to W. E. Hancock.

All persons between the ages of 6 and 17, (inclusive) on Sept. 1, 1967, are required to be counted by the state.

Hancock stated that the census is off from the count last year with only 600 registered so far. It is very important that all school age children, regardless whether they are attending school or not, are registered because part of the schools income from the state is based on the per capita basis of the census.

Forms have been sent home with the students and all parents are asked to supply the needed information on the mimeographed sheet attached to the census card and return at once.

If parents do not have children in school now, but will have one in the required age bracket before Sept. 1, 1967, they are asked to notify the school secretary, Mrs. Lucy Kent before Jan. 31. Registration forms may be obtained at the school office daily from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m.

...commitment, sur-

## PIONEERS OF YESTERYEAR

HAIL STORMS, PRARIE FIRE  
HIGHLIGHTS OF EARLY DAYS

The Wilkinsons farmed near Sudan  
in 1923 and 24, but were  
hauled out several times, which  
led to Joe's changing his profes-

sion to barbering. In 1925 he  
went to work for Dan Long, who  
operated a Barber Shop in the  
first Sudan business building.  
This building stood where the  
former garage and tire shop were  
on the corner of main street and  
was built by Mr. and Mrs. L. E.  
Slate. By then the Slaters had  
built another building and were  
operating a mercantile store. It  
was there the Wilkinsons traded,  
as well as got their mail; as it  
also contained the Post Office.  
If a person so desired he might  
even buy lumber, a wagon, or a  
spool of thread without leaving  
the premises, as well as the  
weekly supply of groceries.

November, 1924, the Wilkin-  
sons moved into Sudan as soon as  
there was a rent house available.  
The house was built by the late  
E. E. Ivy, whose wife, Viola, now  
resides in Littlefield. It was lo-  
cated behind what is now Mel-  
sons Cleaners.

Main Street, Sudan 1924, was  
quite different than today. Peo-  
ple who had cows, staked them  
around in different places to  
graze; several had hogs that ran  
loose, as well as chickens. The  
mud holes in main street were  
used by the hogs for wallows after  
a rain.

The City Park had a windmill  
where some of the people obtain-  
ed their water, hauling it to their  
homes. Later water was piped  
from the windmills to the differ-  
ent houses.

In the spring of 1923 there was  
a terrible prairie fire from the  
northwest which burned off all the  
country. The Bar 77 ranch was  
west of the Wilkinson home and  
the fire killed a good many small  
calves. The cause of the fire was  
a steam engine being used to  
break land.

All able-bodied people helped  
to fight the fire with equipment  
such as wet sacks, brooms, and  
it was remembered one of the  
Kerkendall boys used a leather  
coat to fight the fire and, need-  
less to say, when the blaze had  
been brought under control,  
there wasn't much coat left either.

There were not many people  
here in 1923 and the men folks  
would gather at the Wilkinson  
home on Sunday morning, or  
during bad weather, for a hair  
cut.
