WOODWORK Track Teams Win Trophies

WITHIN a few years, we're told, we not only will have machines that can do all the things that people do, but that also look like people.

I've read science fiction stories about androids--robots who look and act like people--and now, if I can believe what I read these things soon will be more science than fiction.

Androids, said an Associated Press yarn last week, the product of "man's progress toward duplicating himself, took a spectacular step forward this week with a demonstration in an electronics laboratory of a lifelike, life-size dummy that breathes, has a heartbeat and pulse, blinks its eyes, open its jaws to disclose teeth, tongue and vocal cords, and even responds to drugs the way a man would.

(My wife immediately wondered if it could sit down on New Year's Day and watch six football games in a row on television).

The 6-foot-2, 195 pound and android was created in skin-colored, skin-textured plastic. It is called "Sim One." One of its creators predicted that within two more models of Sims, the androids would be able to bleed and sweat. (Though I personally can't see any advantage in that.)

They also can be made to walk and talk, but right now, say its makers, there's no commercial demand for this type.

Somehow it seems to me they are going at this thing the wrong way. Instead of making machines that bleed and sweat and talk, why not make humans that don't do these things?

Incidentally, if you want one of those critters, they will likely cost around \$100,000, which might be cheaper than having people around, at that.

A JAMES JOYCE novel, "Ulysses" for a decade was forbidden in the U. S., but now not only is permitted, but has been made into a movie, complete with its original four-letter vulgarity and erotic scenes. It has been getting rave reviews in New York and smashing box-office records elsewhere.

This story may have a good plot (I've neither seen the movie or read the book, and don't intend to), but it still seems to me that any writer worth anything at all could tell a story without being obscene.

The Sudan track teams brought home the "bacon" in the form of trophies, from two separate meets this weekend. 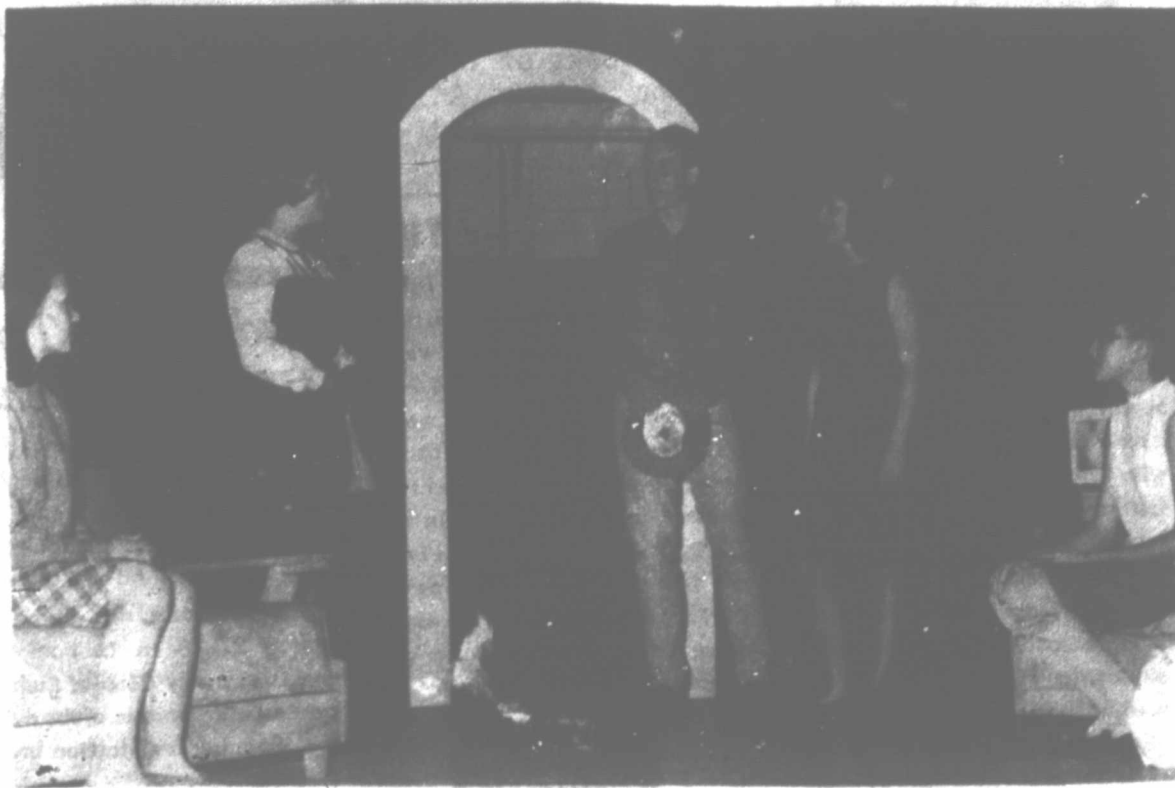

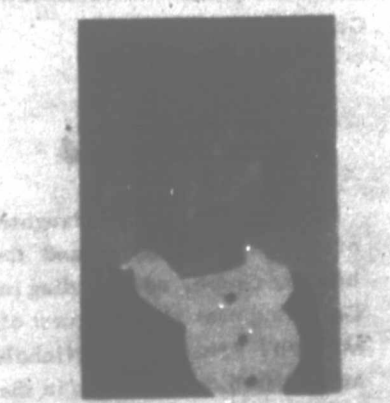

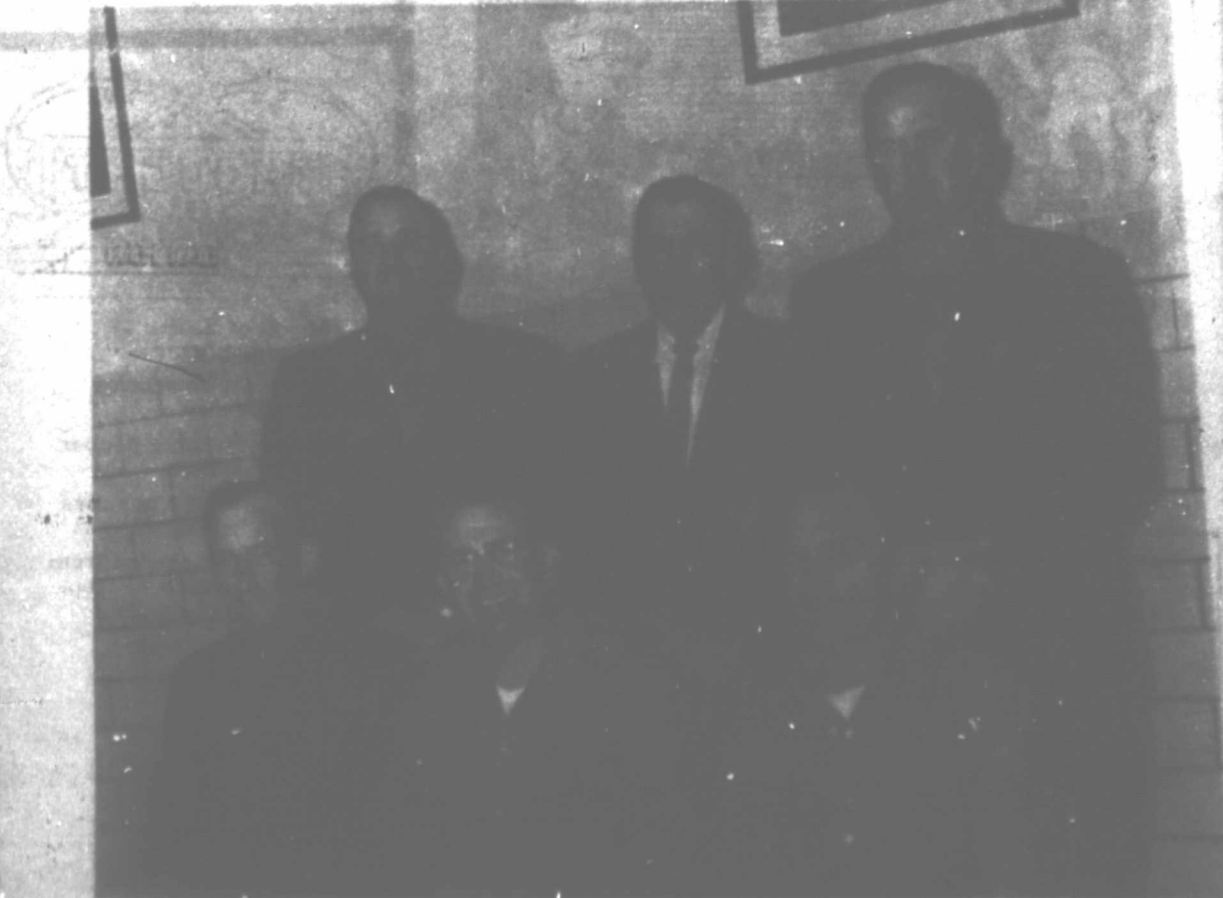

EXPLOSION DAMAGES PHILLIPS 66 STATION

At approximately 10 a. m.
Thursday, March 16 an explo-
sion occurred at the Nichols 66
Service Station, which caused
severe damage to the building.

An attendant, Joe Trevino,
who was washing a car belong-
ing to Frank White, received
second degree burns on his arms,
face and chest. It is thought that
a spark from the car washing
machine caused the combustion
explosion as the car was being
washed in fluid to remove as-
phalt and road matter.

the time, but stated that the

plate glasses were blown from
the front of the building and the
garage doors on both stalls were
damaged. Also it is reported that
the explosion moved the west
wall of the concrete building
approximately two inches which

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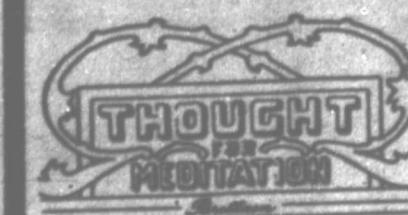

**BARNEY L. WOFFORD
AND WIFE CORA (JOHNSON)
AND FAMILY IN SUDAN 1924**

(Writer's note: The following story is concerning Barney L. Wofford and wife, Cora (Johnson) Wofford and family which moved to Sudan in 1924. The material for the story was submitted by their daughter, Ruth (Wofford) Bates, a graduate of Sudan High School and a beautician, who operated a Beauty Shop in Sudan for a number of years.)

Barney Wofford and wife, Cora (Johnson) Wofford and children moved by wagon to Sudan in 1924. In 1925, Barney purchased land from a Mr. Clements (at the present day site of Central Campus) and built the family a two room, slant topped house.

Barney worked as a carpenter and farmed near the present day colored town. He was the son of J. W. Wofford who was born in 1849, coming to Texas from Missouri in a covered wagon. Making the trip with him was a brother and tradition is the brothers had a disagreement, parted company and the brother of J. W. changed the spelling to Wofford.

Barney's mother was named Skelton and like another Skelton, the famed entertainer, they two were noted for red hair and dimples. J. W. and wife settled at Shammon, Texas (near Henrietta) bought two laborers of land, some of which is still in the Wofford family estate. He died in 1942, as the son of the year.

Cora L. Johnson was born at Weatherford, Texas Jan. 20, 1896 and was the daughter of

Joe H. Johnson and Roxie Atwood, who were married in Hood County, Dec. 26, 1891.

Cora attended Oklaunion High School and married Barney Lee Wofford in 1914.

The couple lived on a ranch near Crowell before moving to Sudan.

The death of Barney Wofford in 1927 cut short his life as a Sudan pioneer. He died from a ruptured appendix at the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

Following the death of her husband, Cora Lee Wofford ran for, and was elected to the post of Public Weigher. The office in which she worked was located in the area of where the City Hall now stands. She worked there and weighed feed for 10¢ per load until she married, G. C. Briscoe, August 3, 1931. Mr. Briscoe died in 1938. By this time all the Wofford children were grown and married.

Of a patriotic nature, Cora Wofford Briscoe joined the WACS May 2, 1944 (during World War II). She was stationed at Fort Riley, Kansas and Fort Benning, Ga. She served as a cook and a Mail Orderly T-5 and received an honorable discharge Dec. 9, 1945. Medals bestowed upon her included the American Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, and the Good Conduct Medal.

Following her discharge from the WACS she worked at the lunchroom, the local variety store and the dry cleaners. August 1, 1952, she assumed duties as a postal clerk in the local post office, where she was employed until her death while on duty, July 9, 1959.

Solutions to feed lot waste disposal problems are promised through research being conducted by Texas Technological College, cattlemen were told.

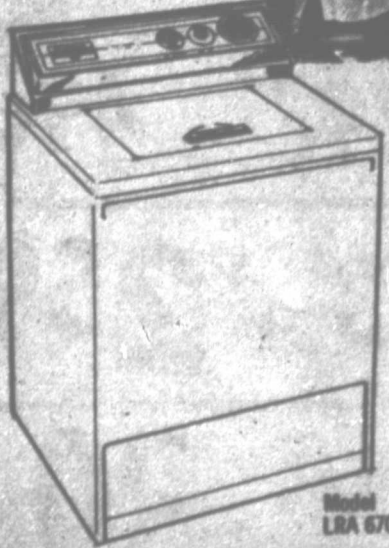
The research, which is being made possible through a grant by the Cattle Feeders' Division of

Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association was announced by the 90th Annual TSCRA Convention in Houston.

Primary purpose of the research project, which is divided into four phases is already underway at Tech. It is scheduled for completion early in 1968.

Cattle feeding within the state has more than tripled in the last decade and expansion has been particularly great the last two years. On March 1, 1967, Texas cattle feeders had 679,000 head on feed. It is estimated that cattle feeding volume in Texas in 1967, would reach 1,750,000 head.
