IN CALIFORNIA, the state Senate Transportation Committee has voted to give serious consideration to a proposal to bar all gasoline-consuming cars from California highways by

The committee did this after an air pollution expert testified that a single car uses up more oxygen in a 45-minute drive than all the millions of people in the Los Angeles area can breathe during that same period. The witness, a retired California air pollution chief, told the committee that oxygen is destroyed so fast by the internal combustion engine that human comsumption is dwarfed in

comparison. More publicity on such figures as these are likely to spur efforts of the auto industry to come up with either an all-electric car, or some more efficient means of getting rid of the air pollution problem caused by gasoline

Certainly the oil companies must be working on that angle themselves. If all else fails, they may just try to get rid of all the air pollution experts. \*\*\*\*\*\*

AS PART of a research program to determine the effectiveness of serial spray in controlling mosquitoes, Hale Center, Abernathy and Plainview recently have been sprayed regularly with a U.S. Air Force plane flying very low over the rooftops.

Many residents were startled the first time or two the plane sounded like it was going through the house early in the morning (about 6 a, m. or so).

The result has been great; no more mosquitoes and folks who live in those towns hope the program will be continued next year. It would be nice if they could include this city next year, too, but I guess we could not be that lucky.

The kind of insecticide used and the method of its application have been given credit for eliminating the mosquitoes in the test towns, but I think they

TEXAS HIGHWAY PATROL LISTS COUNTY ACCIDENTS

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 14 accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of June, according to Sergeant Thruman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in five persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$9, 150, 00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1967 shows a total of 47 accidents resulting in three persons killed, 16 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$62,970,00.

The number of traffic deaths

in Texas continues to rise. For the first six months of 1967 there have been 1, 476 traffic deaths compared to 1,396 traffic deaths for the first six months of 1966.


