WOODWORK

READING a story about cockles reminded me of doodle bugs the other day. More on cockles later, but first a look at the doodle bug situation:

What puzzles me is this: If doodle bugs live in the sand, how come there aren't any in West Texas? Certainly we have more sand than nearly anybody.

I'm not even sure just what a doodle bug is, or what role it has in society. So I looked it up in the dictionary and it had more than one definition. One was "an unscientific device for locating gas, oil or water underground." This didn't seem to apply, but another definition is "one who won't stand up for his convictions."

SO FAR as the cockles are concerned, I read the story because I was just as hazy about cockles as I am about doodle bugs. The cockle is a kind of shellfish, dug out of sandbanks, which is what reminded me of doodle bugs.

SUDAN RIDES OVER BOVINA, 33-8

The Sudan Hornets 33-8 victory over the Bovina Mustangs Friday night put them in the win column for their first conference game of the season. A good strong defense and a first-class passing attack by QB Ronnie Hill and his receivers were the combination that gave the Hornets this victory.

Only one minute deep into the game, the Hornets went into action when Hill connected with E. Shawn Potter on a perfect 62 yard pass to put the Hornets on the Bovina 4-yd. line. Fullback Larry Hanna plunged the four yards for the TD. Jerry Bellar, HB, kicked the extra point, and the Hornets were out in front, 7-0.

Early in the second quarter, Bovina QB Darryl Kirkpatrick passed to End Rodney Murphy for a 15-yard touchdown. Kirkpatrick carried the ball over for two points, and the Mustangs took the lead, 8-7. The Hornets moved down field to the 11-yard line, then lost the ball on a fumble. Regaining the ball later in the quarter, the Hornets again were faced with a 4th down play. Shawn Potter then booted a beautiful 45-yard punt and Steve Martin, End, with a diving plunge, killed the ball on the 1-ft. line.

The Mustangs again were unable to move the ball and were forced to kick. Sudan took over at mid-

field and with only six seconds showing on the clock, Hill connected with HB Gary Gatewood for a 42-yard touchdown pass. Gatewood took the pass and, outrunning several Mustangs, went down the sideline all the way for the 6 points. Hill passed to Martin in the end zone for two points, and at the end of the first half the Hornets were leading, 15-8.

The third quarter play began with the Mustangs fumbling the ball on their 21-yard line, and Hornet linbacker, Billy Ford, was there to recover it for Sudan, setting up their next TD. Hill passed to HB Billy Gore who ran the remaining 10-yards for the touchdown. Hanna carried the ball over for two extra points, and the score was 23-8. Minutes later, Hill and Martin teamed up for a 26-yard gain, but when the Hornets failed to make the first down, Bellar came in and kicked a 21-yard field goal to add three more points to the Hornet lead.

In the fourth quarter, Hanna made a 26-yard run to take the ball down to the Bovina 11. The Hornets capitalized on this play getting down to the one foot line where Hill took the ball in for the touchdown. Bellar kicked the extra point, and the game ended with the Hornets over the Mustangs, 33-8.

THE STATE OF TEXAS: COUNTY OF LAMB: RESOLUTION APPROVING AND ADOPTING ESTIMATES OF THE COST OF IMPROVEMENTS, OF AMOUNTS TO BE ASSESSED FOR IMPROVEMENTS IN THE NATURE OF GRADING, LAYING CURB AND GUTTER AND PAVING PORTIONS OF STREETS, HIGHWAYS AND AVENUES IN AND ALONG THE BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY OF LITTLEFIELD, TEXAS, FIXING THE TIME AND PLACE FOR HEARING OF THE OWNERS OF ABUTTING PROPERTY, AND OTHER PERSONS INTERESTED IN SAID PROPERTY AND DIRECTING THE CITY SECRETARY TO PUBLISH NOTICE ON BEHALF OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LITTLEFIELD, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Littlefield, Texas, has heretofore ordered that portions of the streets, highways and avenues be improved by grading, installing concrete curb and gutter and paving with 6" caliche Base and 1 1/4" asphaltic con-

crete surface together with incidents, and appurtenances and arrangements therefor have been made and entered into by the City of Littlefield, Texas, with PIONEER PAVERS, INC., and WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Littlefield has caused the City Engineer to prepare and file estimates of the cost of such improvements and estimates of the amounts per front feet to be assessed against abutting property and the owners thereof, and such estimates have been approved and examined;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LITTLEFIELD, TEXAS, by which is meant the governing body of the City,

Section 1. That the estimates prepared by the City Engineer, McMorris & Associates, be and they are hereby adopted and approved.

Section 2. NOTICE

TO THE OWNERS OF PROPERTY ABUTTING UPON THE HEREBELOW MENTIONED PORTIONS OF STREETS, HIGHWAYS, AVENUES and/or ALLEYS AND TO ALL OTHERS AFFECTED:

The governing body of the City of Littlefield, Texas, has heretofore ordered that the following portions of streets, highways and avenues in and along the boundaries of the City of Littlefield, Texas, be improved by raising, grading and filling and installing concrete curbs and gutters and installation of sewers and drains where necessary on streets, highways, and avenues hereinafter designated, and it is hereby found and determined that the costs of improvements on such portions of said streets, avenues and highways are the amounts set out in the respective following paragraphs covering the units therein described, and the amount per front foot in each unit proposed to be assessed for such improvements against the abutting property and the owners thereof on the portions of said streets, avenues and highways is \$4.00 per front foot in Units 1-67 and 2-67; and \$2.49 per front foot in Units 3-67 and 3A-67; said properties and units being as follows, and the estimated cost of improvements being the figure following the unit description, to-wit:

UNIT 1-67, Lake Avenue from SPL West 6th St. to NPL West 7th St.; \$2,800.00

UNIT 2-67, Smith Street from Ash to Beech Ave.; \$2,795.84

UNIT 3-67, Highway 54 West from Monticello Ave. to Sunset Ave.; \$8,911.55

UNIT 3A-67, Highway 54 East from Highway 385 to Highway 84; \$10,043.42.
