MISSIONARIES TO HAVE CHRISTMAS SALE

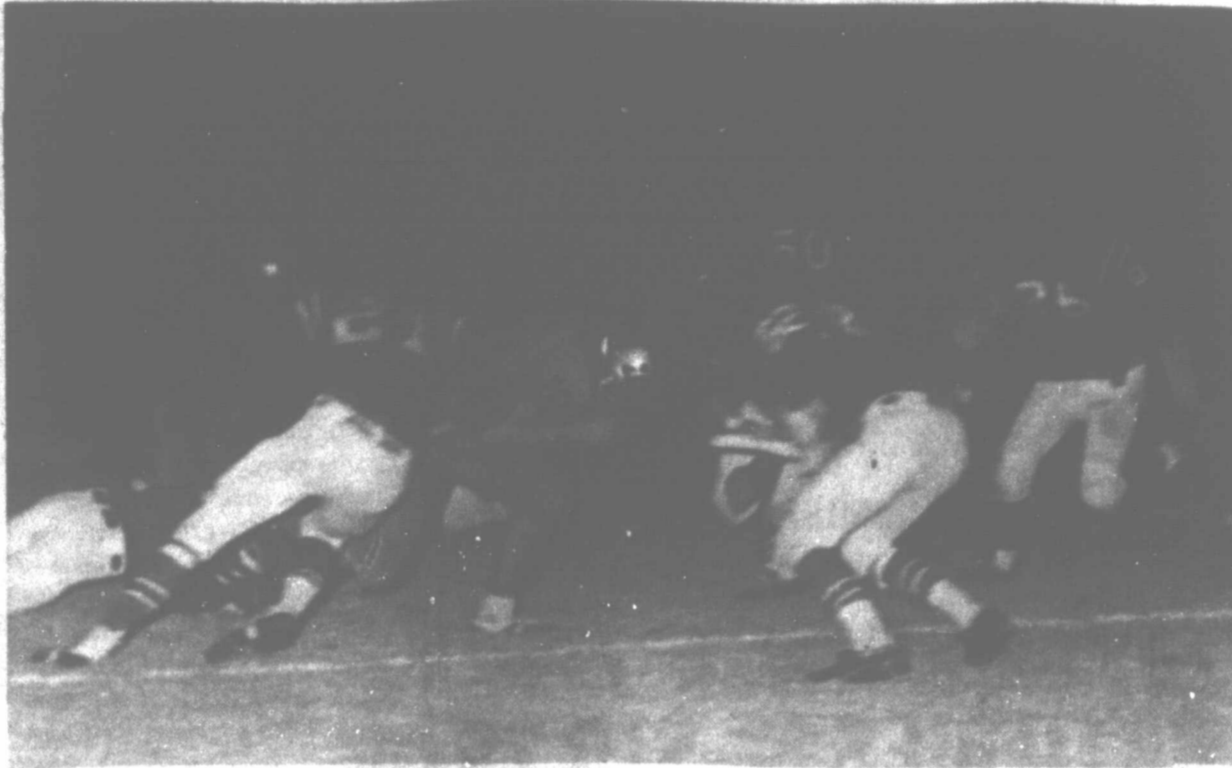

The Regional Champion Hornet Team went down fighting hard as they were defeated by the Seagraves Eagles Saturday night, 14-0. There were some 4,500 fans present at this class A quarter-finals game in Lowery Field.

At the end of the first half, the score was 0-0, with the Hornets leading in penetrations, 2-0. As time went on, these two penetrations looked more important, and our great defensive line made up of Robin Davis, Van Seymore, Monte Roberts, Billy Ford, Dex Baker and Tim Nix kept the Eagles bottled up until the Eagles' Dalton Taylor intercepted a Sudan pass late in the third frame on the Hornet eight yard line, being tackled there by Ronnie Hill. Steve Martin and Shawn Potter did a fine job at End. Hill was top ball carrier for the Hornets with 41 yards, Jerry Bellar had 35 yards, Billy Gore had 25, and Gatewood had 3 yards rushing.

The entire first half, as we have indicated, was a defensive battle. First real offensive play for the Hornets came when Hill recovered an Eagle fumble on the Seagraves 22 yard line. But they gave up the ball on downs, failing to score. Late in the second quarter, Seymore covered another Eagle fumble on their 38, and the Hor-

nets moved on down to the 10 where they lost the ball on a fumble, and with only 1:40 left in the half. The Eagles then moved to the 40, where they fumbled and Bellar recovered the ball just before time ran out.

The Hornets came back in the third quarter, made two first downs, then fumbled on their 43, and the Eagles recovered. They drove to the Hornet 23, but had to give up the ball on downs. Then came the Eagle pass interception by Taylor, who carried to the 6 yard line. This was the first Eagle penetration, and HB Dean Taylor went on over for the Eagle TD. Their try for two extra points failed, as the Hornet defense stopped them short of the goal line. The third frame ended with the Eagles out in front 6-0.

Several plays deep into the fourth, the fired up Eagles scored again, with HB Dean Allen going in from the nine. He also carried the ball over for two points, and the game ended with the score, Seagraves over Sudan, 14-0.

The 1967 Sudan Hornet Football Team is certainly to be congratulated on their successful season, for winning District, Bi-district, Regional, and Quarter Final Runner-up Trophies, going further than any other team in Sudan School history. This writer and newspaper offers congratulations to the boys on their very fine team, their excellent sportsmanship, teamwork, and their cooperation with both the coaches and referees in every game. Congratulations, also, to the Hornet Coaches Cain, Adams, Chitty, and Laceywell on a job well done in their training of a good team, for the great fighting spirit they have inspired in the Hornets, and for a clean leadership program in good sportsmanship of which all of us can be justly proud.

The four seniors on the Hornet Varsity squad, Ronnie Hill, Van Seymore, Robin Davis, and Gary Gatewood, have done a fine job as leaders and captains of the team this year, and will certainly be missed when we start planning our 1968 football season. So, congratulations on a good season, and best wishes for your future.
