At the end of the first half, the score was 0-0, with the Hornets leading in penetrations, 2-0. As time went on, these two penetrations looked more important, and our great defensive line made up of Robin Davis, Van Seymore, Monte Roberts, Billy Ford, Dex Baker and Tim Nix kept the Eagles bottled up until the Eagles! Dalton Taylor intercepted a Sudan pass late in the third frame on the Hornet eight yard line, being tackled there by Ronnie Hill. Steve Martin and Shawn Potter did a fine job at End. Hill was top ball carrier for the Hornets with 41 yards, Jerry Bellar had 35 yards, Billy Gore had 25, and Gatewood had 3 yards rushing.

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
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

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
