# Texas To Register 7 Million Vehicles

State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall announced that Texas will register approximately 7. million vehicles during 1968. "This is the largest number in our history, " Dingwall said.

Of the estimated 7 million vehicles to be registered, the Texas Highway Department believes that 4.75 million will be passenger cars and 1, 9 million will be commercial trucks and truck-tractors. Trailers and motorcycles will account for the balance.

The most dramatic increase is expected in the motorcycle category, based on the past two years' experience,

Motor vehicle owners can avoid long lines by registering during the month of February, rather than waiting until the March rush, Owners should bring four items to the Tax Collector's office when registering vehicles: certificate of title, 1967 license receipt, current resident address,

State law requires each owner to register his vehicle in the county in which he resides and to present his certificate of title

and zip code.
