Texas To Register 7 Million Vehicles

State Highway Engineer J.C. Dingwall announced that Texas will register approximately 7 million vehicles during 1968. "This is the largest number in our history," Dingwall said.

All 1968 Texas license plates have been delivered to the 254 County Tax Assessor-Collectors

for issuance during February and March of 1968.

Of the estimated 7 million vehicles to be registered, the Texas Highway Department believes that 4.75 million will be passenger cars and 1.9 million will be commercial trucks and truck-tractors. Trailers and motorcycles will account for the balance.

The most dramatic increase is expected in the motorcycle category, based on the past two years' experience.

Motor vehicle owners can avoid long lines by registering during the month of February, rather than waiting until the March rush. Owners should bring four items to the Tax Collector's office when registering vehicles: certificate of title, 1967 license receipt, current resident address, and zip code.

State law requires each owner to register his vehicle in the county in which he resides and to present his certificate of title as evidence of ownership.

During the 1967 session the Texas Legislature amended the Texas Registration Law by changing passenger car license fees and establishing a minimum fee of \$7.00 for all vehicles, including boat trailers.

The new rates for passenger cars are as follows: Up to 3,500 pounds, \$12.30; 3,500 - 4,500 pounds, \$22.30; 4,501 - 6,000

pounds, \$30.00; More than 6,000 pounds, 55 per 100 pounds.

"Please bring your title when you come for your car tags", Herbert Dunn, County Tax Assessor-Collector said this week. He reminded car owners that Texas law requires that a person present his title to the tax collector when he registers his car.

The Texas Highway Dept. also has requested that vehicles be registered only from the titles this year.

SCHOOL BOND VOTED IN BY 168-92

The \$250,000 School Bond was voted in Saturday, Jan. 27, by a comfortable margin.

Joe West, bond election judge, stated that 260 votes were cast, with 168 for the bond and 92 against.

The Sudan School Board of Trustees held a meeting Monday

night, canvassed election returns, and went into conference with bondsman, W. E. Hancock, Superintendent of Schools, stated that the board conducted all business necessary to get the bond issued and into the hands of the Attorney General in Austin for approval. Also, plans were discussed with the architect who was present at this meeting.

The superintendent said that members of the board were to make a tour Wednesday of other schools in the area who have been in a remodeling and building program, especially at Crosbyton and Floydada.

Price Seeks Re-Election

U. S. Representative Bob Price announced today from his Washington office that he would be a candidate for reelection to Congress, and at the same time mailed his filing fees and applications to each county of the 15th district.

"My first year in Congress has been most gratifying," Price said. "I am convinced, especially by recent visits to Panhandle communities, that people are expecting more dynamic leadership in Washington, and I believe that members of this second session of the 90th Congress are more than ever aware of that feeling."

"As a freshman member, I have attempted to give the Panhandle the kind of representation in Congress I believe the people wanted."

"The nearer government can be kept at home, the more responsive it is," Price said. "If this constant expansion of the Federal bureaucracy and direct Federal grants-in-aid are continued, our communities and schools will soon be nothing more than subdivisions of the Federal Government."

Gladden Seeks Lt. Gov. Office

Don Gladden, a Fort Worth attorney, paid his filing fee this week to become a candidate for Lieutenant Governor.

Gladden, a four-term member of the Texas Legislature, stated he would carry his campaign directly to the people of Texas, by-passing all special interest and pressure groups.

Gladden further stated that his chief opponents will be the lobby-controlled machine in Austin that tries to hand-pick the elected officials of this state.

The Fort Worth lawyer stated that this machine opposing his campaign "are the same people that keep auto insurance rates high; the same people that would do away with our farm road program; in general, they are the people who want to use the government for their own selfish interests."

Gladden, who favors retaining the farm road program and lowering auto insurance rates, stated he considers himself an independent who believes the government should be used for the people and not against them.

program 100 per cent, some 2,250 farmers, and feed grain about 80 per cent.

Yield is the major factor in the lowering of Lamb County's total cotton payment and this same rate already has been set for 1969, Aten said. However, cotton price support is up \$12.24 for 1968 as compared to \$11.73 in 1967.

A farm will maintain full history when any price support is earned. Skiprow cotton will be the acreage actually planted. For example, two rows cotton and one fallow is 66 2/3 per cent, while two rows cotton and two fallow is 50 per cent. Skiprow diverted acreage must be at least four rows.

A 100-acre allotment, 500 lb. projected yield, divert 35.0 and plant 65.0 would bring \$5,147. With 5.0 diverted and 65.0 to 95.0 acres planted, total would be \$4,247, in this case price support is paid only on the 65 per cent.

In the cotton program, total payments will be down about nine per cent in 1968 from in 1967.

IN THE 1968 Feed Grain Program, county loan rate is \$1.59 per cwt.; mandatory diversion, 20 per cent, no payment; additional diversion, up to 30 per cent at 54 cents per bu. X yield; price support payments, 50 per cent of feed grain base at 29.69 cents per bu. X yield.

A 100-acre base and 70 bushel yield, divert 50.0 would pay about \$2,163; divert 20.0 and plant 80.0 or plant 80.0 and interchange with wheat, \$1,039.

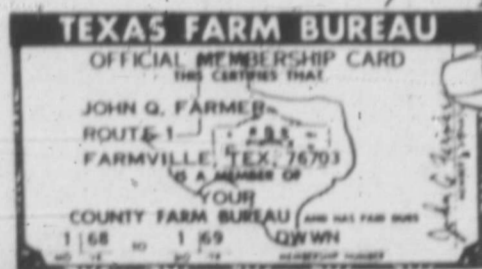

J. R. "Dick" Brown, 41-year-old Hartley County farmer and businessman, today announced that he would be a candidate for U. S. Representative, Texas 18th Congressional District, in the Democratic primary election.

Brown, no newcomer to area politics, is Democratic party chairman for the 31st Texas senatorial district and has long been

active in Panhandle politics.

He is a native of Hartley County, operates a farm near Hartley, and manages a farm supply and elevator business there.

He is the first candidate to formally announce for the 18th Congressional District place.
