School Board Holds Teacher Election Here

The Sudan School Board of Trustees held their regular meeting Monday night with 11 members present.

Dinner was served to the board members by the school's Home-making department under the direction of Mrs. Kenneth Burgess who is Home Economics teacher.

Teachers for the 1968-69 Sudan School Faculty were elected at this meeting, with list of names not available at this time but they will be announced at a later date, Superintendent of Schools W. E. Hancock stated.

At the February meeting of the Board, they re-elected the Administrative Staff which includes Superintendent Hancock, both high school and elementary school principals, Kenneth Noles and Bernard Wilson respectively, and Jim Cain, head coach and athletic director. The administrative staff then presented the list of faculty names to be voted on and elected in the March meeting.

All members of the Sudan coaching staff were recommended to the board by Coach Cain, and all were re-elected.

Also the superintendent announced that word had been received this week from the board counselor in Lubbock that the recently voted Sudan School Bonds have been given an "A-Rating", which is very high for a school of this size, according to Supt. Hancock. He explained that this kind of rating means a better selling market for the bonds.

FOUR CHARGED IN KNOX MURDER CASE

Four area young men have been charged in the robbery and beating of John E. Knox, 71, on Sunday night, March 3.

Knox died later in an ambulance enroute to a hospital in Littlefield, after he tried to give Deputy Sheriff Homer McLaury a description of his assailants.

Investigating officers McLaury and Texas Ranger Raz Renfro

brought about the arrest of two of the suspects Friday and another picked up in Muleshoe about midnight Friday night. The fourth suspect was picked up by the Bailey County Sheriff's office Sunday about 3 p. m.

The four who have been charged in this case are Richard Duain Rush, 22, and Owen Odell Howard, 19, both of Muleshoe and both reported on probation for a prior conviction, Cecil Lee Mooney, 23, Sudan, and John Wayne Hall, 18, of Needmore.

Hall, who was the last of the four to be picked up, has made no statement, according to Deputy Sheriff McLaury. All four boys were taken to the Lamb County jail in Littlefield. Hall was placed under \$5,000 bond which was paid and he was released. The other three remain in custody.

McLaury said the first clue which caused the sheriff's office to suspect these boys was a knife found in the floor at the Knox residence which was said to belong to C. L. Mooney, Mooney and Rush made statements which implicated the others, who were taken into custody later. Howard also made a statement, but Hall has made no statement at all to date.

A Preliminary hearing will be held soon but no date for the hearing has been set.

PATTERSON GETS SERVICE AWARD

Sp-4 Billy J. Patterson, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert A. Patterson, Rt. 1, Sudan, is a heavy equipment operator in the earth-moving platoon of Company D, 93rd Engineer Battalion, that has now completed more than half the earth work required to enlarge the airfield near Long Thanh North, Vietnam.

The enlargement consists of a 1,500 foot runway extension, a 2,000 foot parallel taxiway and a 400 by 1,500 foot parking apron. He and his comrades are responsible for stripping poor soil from the area and building it back up with laterite, a compact soil formed of decomposed rock. The platoon's scrapper vehicles haul more than 10,000 cubic yards of soil a week from a nearby laterite pit.

Sp-4 Billy J. Patterson, US 54 371 204, United States Army, for meritorious achievement, in connection with military operations against a hostile force. Specialist Patterson distinguished himself by his vital contribution to the timely and professional completion of the mammoth task of constructing a regimental cantonment area for the "Queen's Cobra" Volunteer Regiment of the Royal Thai Army.

Specialist Patterson's outstanding skill as an Equipment Operator and his dedication to the mission set the example for other members of the work crew. He was always one of the first on the job and directed all his efforts toward the successful accomplishments of the task at hand. The fact that his equipment functioned despite axle-deep mud and long hours of operation is a tribute to Specialist Patterson's outstanding maintenance program. When conditions precluded the operation of his equipment he led the way to help with hand drainage of the area. His close cooperation and "can do" attitude have gained him the respect of all those who came in contact with him during this operation, and has strengthened the bond between the United States and Thailand.

Patterson's meritorious achievements were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.

PARROTT BOOK NOW ON SALE

Evelyn Parrott Scott, Lamb County historian recently published her second family history, "The Parrott Family". Information in this book includes the line back to 1100 A D in Wales through England to Virginia in 1623.

In this book a number of area family names are traced as allied families into Texas including White, Wood, Wallace, House, Bennett, Jones, McNeese, Allcorn, Johnson, Wilson, Allbritton, Kemp, Baker, Harper, Kelley, Hardy, Alexander, and many others.

The first family history published by Mrs. Scott relates to her mother's family, the Coopers, and many Lamb County family names have been traced to Texas as allied families including Guinn, Adams, Harrison, Harris, Welms, Newman, Robertson, Johnson, Wood, Hemphill, Cannon, Alstyn, Keenons, Arden, Harrington, McDaniel, Hill, Stanford, Jennings, Chandler,

and numerous others.

Mrs. Scott has worked in the fields of Journalism since 1954 and is a member of the Lamb County Historical Survey Committee as well as a number of genealogical and historical societies.

Copies of the two family books, Cooper Family Notes and Parrott Family History, may be purchased at the Sudan Beacon News.

Mrs. Scott is author of historical columns in Lamb County Papers and is presently compiling a history of the county, which will go to the printers the latter part of this summer.

She has numerous pioneer family biographies compiled. This will be the first history of Lamb County to be printed.

The edition will include material on early day ranches, cattle brands, actual data copied from records filed in the County Clerk's office. Charles Jones is being most helpful with the search of these records, such as early land grants, probate and other records that are of unusual interest.

A student who needs financial assistance should also apply to the financial aid officer at the college of his choice for any help for which he may be eligible. This advice came from Dr. C. V. Galbreath, Higher Education Director for Region VII of the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. The region includes Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, and Oklahoma. Dr. Galbreath pointed out that Federally supported programs of loans, grants, and jobs are available through the colleges, but that many students are either not aware of them or do not realize that they should apply for them as soon as possible.

"The financial aid officer at a college frequently will put together a 'package' of aids for financially needy students," Dr. Galbreath said. "Early planning helps the student know just where he stands, and it helps the college plan wise use of its resources for students." The four major Federally supported programs, available for students in any field of study, are: The National Defense Student Loan Program, the College Work-Study Program, the Educational Opportunity Grants Program, and the Guaranteed Loan Program. Most colleges and universities participate in the National Defense Student Loan Program, under which students borrow directly from the college they are attending. Since the beginning of the program, authorized by 1958 legislation, more than a million

students have borrowed over \$1 billion. An undergraduate student may borrow up to \$1,000 each academic year to a total of \$5,000. Graduate students may borrow as much as \$2,500 a year. The maximum for both graduate and undergraduate education is \$10,000. Repayment and interest do not begin until after the student has ended his studies and may be extended over a 10-year period. Borrowers who become teachers may have all or part of their debt cancelled. The Federal government's next major forward move for students came with the College Work-Study Program authorized by the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. Any student who needs a job to help pay college costs is eligible to participate.

The Educational Opportunity Grants Program, which began operation in the fall of 1966 under the Higher Education Act of 1965, provides outright grants from colleges to students in such extreme financial need that without the grants they could not attend college. The grants range from \$200 to \$800 a year. The Higher Education Act of 1965 also authorized a loan program for college students. The National Vocational Student Loan Insurance Act of 1965 authorized a similar program of borrowing for students in business, trade, technical, or other vocational schools.

Under these programs, students borrow directly from their bank, credit union, savings and loan association, or other eligible lender. If a student's adjusted family income is less than \$15,000 a year, the Federal government pays the entire interest (6 percent) during his school years and half the interest (3 percent) during the repayment period, which begins 9 months to a year after studies are terminated and may extend up to 10 years for college loans, six years for vocational loans.

Federal Crop Insurance Improvements Made

Improvements in the All-Risk Federal Crop Insurance program on irrigated grain sorghum in Lamb county for 1968 were announced recently. W. E. McDaniel, FCIC representative from the District Office at Lubbock, says the program has been readjusted to more adequately reflect the demands of farmers and the insurance experience here. On a 33-county basis where the changes have been made, readjustment for grain sorghum has resulted in an eight percent average increase in the hundred-weight guarantee while premium rates have been decreased 7.6 percent on the average. McDaniel is now in the county for a limited time explaining provisions of the FCIC insurance programs to farmers and taking applications. Insurance also is available on irrigated cotton.

"About 185 insured farmers in the county shared during 1967 in more than \$2 million in Federal Crop Insurance payments made in Texas for losses on cotton, grain sorghum and wheat crops due mostly to drought, flood, excessive moisture and wind." "This added an estimated

\$300,000.00 to the county farm economy and helped to offset financial losses due to poor crops", McDaniel says. The All-Risk FCIC insurance plans guarantee farmers an established amount of good quality production based on yield history of the land, amount of risk insured only production costs or the farmers' investment in his crop. When crop production falls short of the guarantee due to drought, excess heat, flood, too much moisture, insects, disease or any other natural cause, Federal Crop Insurance picks up the tab paying a cash loss sufficient to meet the guarantee. Some additional benefits gained by Lamb County farmers through the insurance, McDaniel says, include premium discounts for good experience, use of the protection as additional collateral to assist in securing the credit financing so vital in today's farming and added stability to individual farming operations.
