## HEARING SET TODAY IN KNOX CASE

The date has been set for the examining trial of the four boys charged in the John E. Knox case, and was to be held today (Thursday) 10:30 a. m. in the Court House, Littlefield.

J. N. Bowen will be the presiding judge, and Jack Young, the district attorney. Those charged in the case are Richard Duain Rush 22, Owen Odell Howard 19, Cecil L. Mooney 23, and John Wayne Hall 18.

Knox, who was fatally beaten and robbed on Sunday, March 3, died enroute to a Littlefield hospital.

An autopsy was performed and the report has been received by the sheriff's office. It reads: "Cause of death: Severe head trauma." Details of the autopsy report included - severe head and facial trauma (wounds), with hemorrhage in right side of the head, facial contusions, etc., ending with the statement on the cause of death.

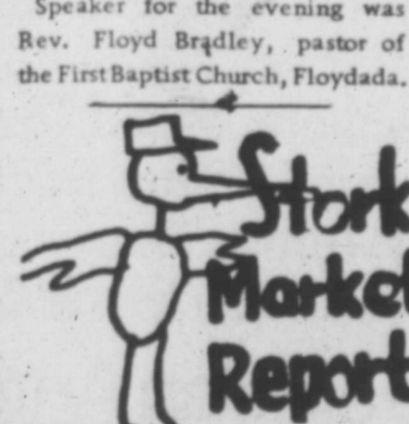

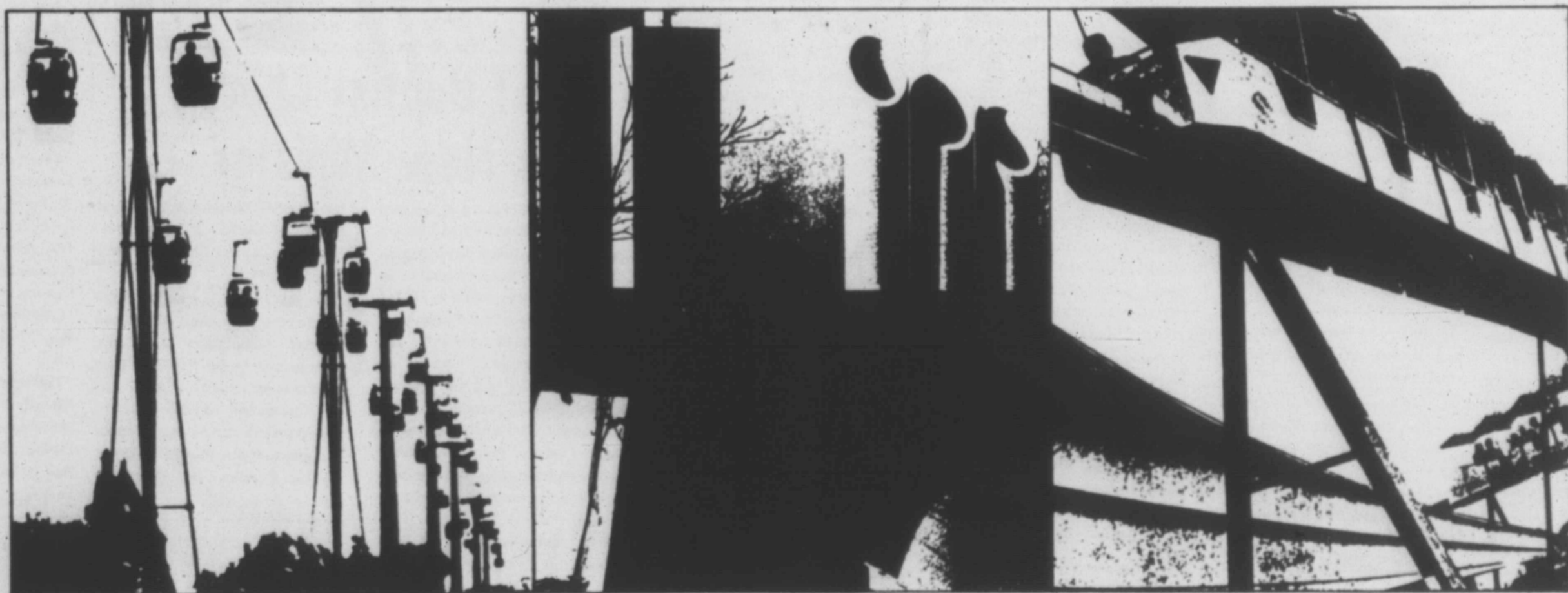
THE SPIRITUAL NIGHTINGALES--A sextet from the Galilee Baptist Church Edward King, left, of Sudan is booking agent for the group.

## Devotional

Scripture: St. John 1: 3-5; 9: 5-7, 35-38.

"One thing I know, that, whereas I was blind, now I see", the man who had been born blind said to the pharisees after Jesus had given him sight.

The man did not know who Jesus was, but he believed in Him because He could now see. Light had come to him where there had only been darkness. Do you know who Jesus is? Do you really know Him?

Are you in darkness? Are you

blind? You are, if you cannot see the Light in the darkness around you. For all the darkness in the world cannot put out the Light. Could it be that you are deliberately blind?

How did Jesus give sight to the man born blind? He could have just spoken, but He told the man to do something. And as the blind man was obedient to go and do at Jesus command, the Scripture says he "came seeing".

But Jesus did not merely give sight to the blind man, and then go away and leave Him forever. The man witnessed to others that some man named Jesus had given him sight, and said he believed in this man as a prophet of God, whoever he was, and said "Since the world began was it not heard that any man opened the eyes of one that was born blind". Then when the pharisees cast him out, Jesus came and told him who He was, and the man believed and worshiped Him. The man began to know Jesus personally.

Then Jesus stated his mission in the world in terms of seeing and not seeing.

Perhaps, like the Pharisees, some of us would claim blindness - unawareness of sin, but Jesus said it was not so. He told the Pharisees that if they were blind (spiritually) they should

have no sin, but now they said "we see", so their sin remained.

Jesus is the Light, and if you have not seen yourself, your sin, in this revealing light, you cannot claim blindness but you have only closed your eyes to this light of truth.

Here is the Light which the blackest darkness cannot put out - Jesus! And He said in John 10:

"I am the door: by me if any man enter in, he shall be saved... I am come that they might have life... My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me... and I give unto them eternal life; and they shall never perish."

Do you have eternal life? You will if you accept Jesus and follow Him, as He said!
