WHAT PRICE LAZINESS? In Phoenix, the designer of a coin-operated parking lot downtown apparently believes in P. T. Barnum's "sucker born every minute" philosophy. Or maybe he realizes that people would just rather do anything than take extra time, like preferring to pay 20 cents rather than driving a half block.

The parking lot extends across half a city block from a fairly busy street to one that is not so busy. If a motorist uses the entrance on the busy street side, he pays 50 cents; if he drives half a block further and enters from the other street, the charge is 30 cents.

I have to admit Glass isn't cracked. What he says is true, and could apply equally to fancy boats, camping equipment, television sets, and the vast majority of things most people spend most of their incomes on.

So, when an agent turns that set over to a TV repairman, he'd better not tell the agent it needs a new tube for \$40 or \$50, or a new transformer, or a new expensive whoozit of any type. They have caught some unscrupulous repairmen this way, and the legitimate responsible repairmen must love it almost as much as the consumers must.

The same sort of operation should be tried on washing machines and autos. But in some of these fields, if you weeded out all the crooked dealers, you'd have to wait two years to get anything worked on by the few surviving honest ones.

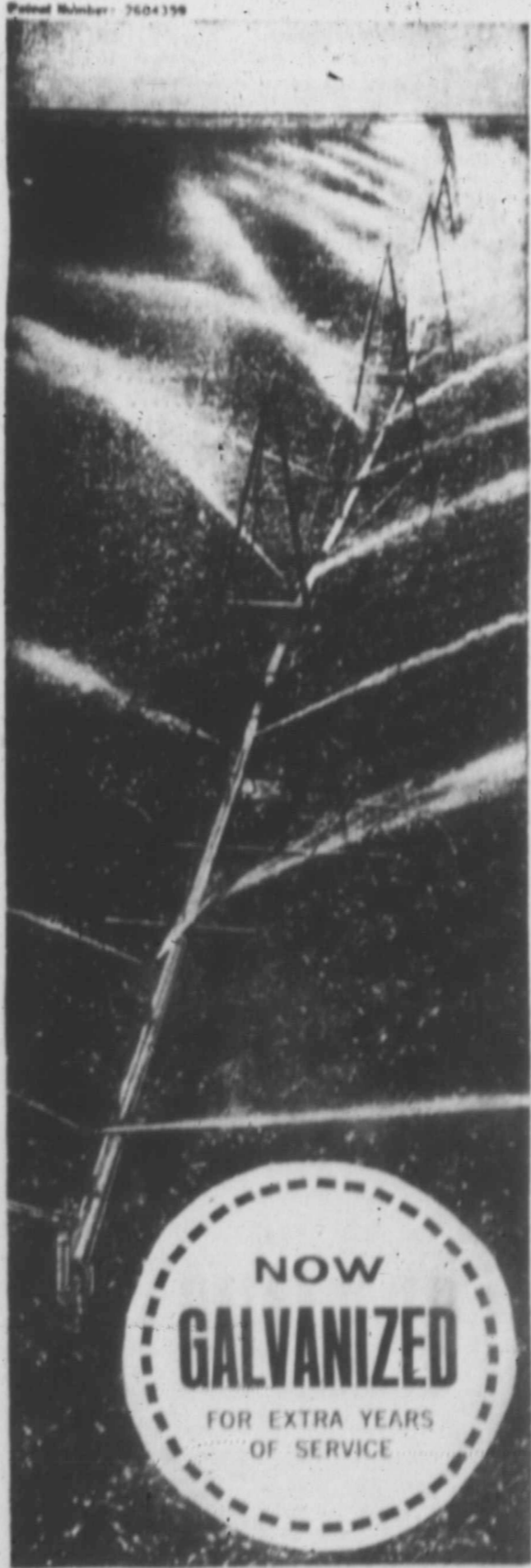

## Nickels Attends Cotton Meet

Guy Nickels of Sudan was among the leadership of the Texas ginning industry taking part in a review of new developments for cotton April 23 and 24. The group represented the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association in conferences with representatives of the Department of Agriculture and the National Cotton Council at Memphis, Tenn., and Stoneville, Miss.

The Ginners' Association representatives saw the first public demonstration in a government classing office of an instrument evaluation system for cotton. The system is a pilot project of the Department of Agriculture and is installed at the Memphis, Tenn. classing office. Evaluations of trash content, color, leaf content, fineness, strength and span length of fibers are being tested.

Stanley Rademaker, director of the USDA Consumer Marketing Division's cotton division, said there was no estimate when, or if, such a system would be used in the Smith-Doxey classing offices. But testing work will proceed with a second pilot project to be installed at the Lubbock classing office this year, Rademaker said.

Clifton Kirkpatrick, director of field service, and M. K. Home, Jr., economist, with the National Cotton Council discussed the latest developments in research and cotton utilization at a special conference with the ginners group.

Cotton Council staff members reviewed major areas of interest of the organization's work in market research, utilization and production research, promotion and farm programs.

Kirkpatrick and the staff members emphasized that new promotion activities by the Cotton Producers Institute promise to expand utilization of cotton.

In an all day session at the Department of Agriculture's Ginning Research Laboratory at Stoneville, Miss., the ginners delegation reviewed work being done on a wide range of technical projects. Staff members headed

by Vernon P. Moore of Stoneville, demonstrated various trash handling systems and a recently developed unloading system for gins. New developments in preserving cotton quality also were emphasized in the discussions.

Moore said all the work emphasized more economical and efficient ginning operations under present labor and crop conditions.

Several members of the Texas group will report on the various conferences and discussions at the Texas Ginners' Association board of directors meeting in Dallas May 18. Bill Thompson, Association president, explained that the tour by industry leaders to confer with leaders of other segments of the industry was part of a continuing program to keep the ginners of Texas up to date on developments in the cotton industry. "I certainly join with others in the industry in expressing appreciation to these men for taking the time to stimulate interest in cotton and to help influence the decisions which make our industry grow."

**LEGISLATIVE COURAGE**—In recommending fiscal restraint by the Federal government, Rep. George H. Mahon, (D-Tex.), Chairman, House Appropriations Committee, said, "I do earnestly hope that the House today will show that it is going to tend, whenever reasonably possible, toward not going in 1969 above the level of spending in 1968, and that we will even hold the amounts below fiscal 1968 whenever we reasonably can. We are on trial as a nation as to whether or not we have the discipline and the courage and the leadership to pay our way."

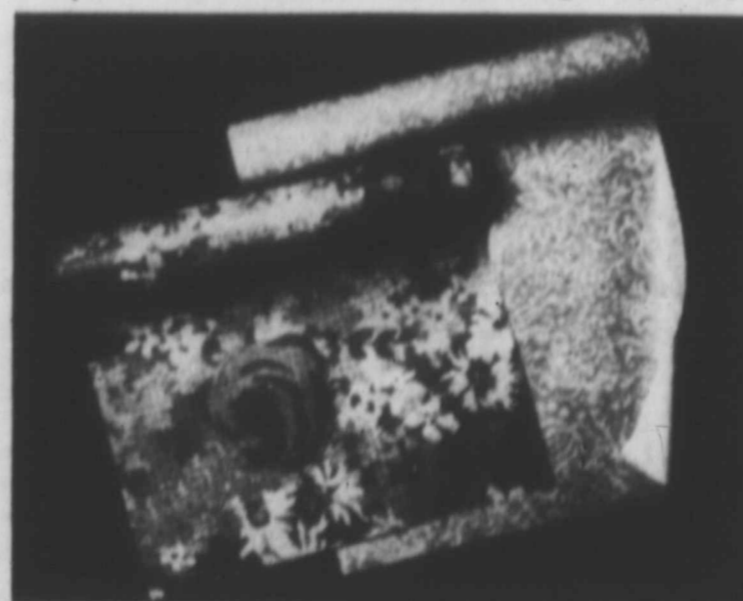

On July 10, a TV program will be presented over Channel 13 between 6:30 and 7:00 a. m. Vickey Ray and John Pitts will present the program.

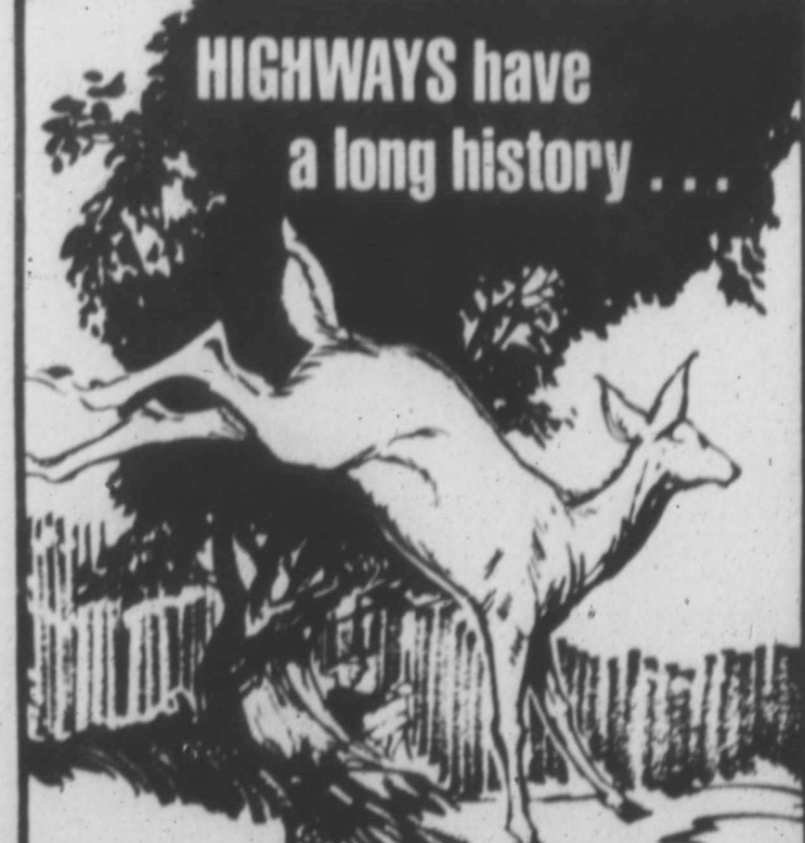
The date for the annual Rally Day was set for June 24. Final plans will be made at the next meeting. Records will be due in the agents office by July 26.
