APPENDIX C

Sample Weed Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND PROMOTE THE PUBLIC WELFARE OF THE CITY OF SUDAN, TEXAS, BY PROVIDING FOR THE FILLING UP AND DRAINAGE OF LOTS THAT SHALL HAVE UNWHOLESOME PLACE OR PLACES WHERE STAGNANT WATER MAY ACCUMULATE THEREON; THE CLEANING OF ANY BUILDING OR PREMISES OF FILTH, CARRION OR OTHER IMPURE AND UNWHOLESOME MATTER; REQUIRING OWNERS OR OCCUPANTS OF LOTS IN THE CITY OF SUDAN TO KEEP SAID LOTS FREE FROM WEEDS, RUBBISH, BRUSH AND OTHER UNSIGHTLY OR UNSANITARY MATTER; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE TO BE GIVEN TO OWNERS OR PREMISES IN CASE OF FAILURE OF OWNER TO MAKE LOTS AND/OR PREMISES SANITARY AND SIGHTLY THAT THE SAME MAY BE DONE AT THE EXPENSE OF THE CITY OF SUDAN; PROVIDING FOR THE FIXING OF A LIEN AGAINST SUCH LOTS FOR SUCH IMPROVEMENT; PROVIDING FOR A FINE OF NOT MORE THAN TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00) FOR VIOLATION OF ANY PROVISION THEREOF; DECLARING EACH DAY OF VIOLATION TO BE A SEPARATE OFFENSE; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT.

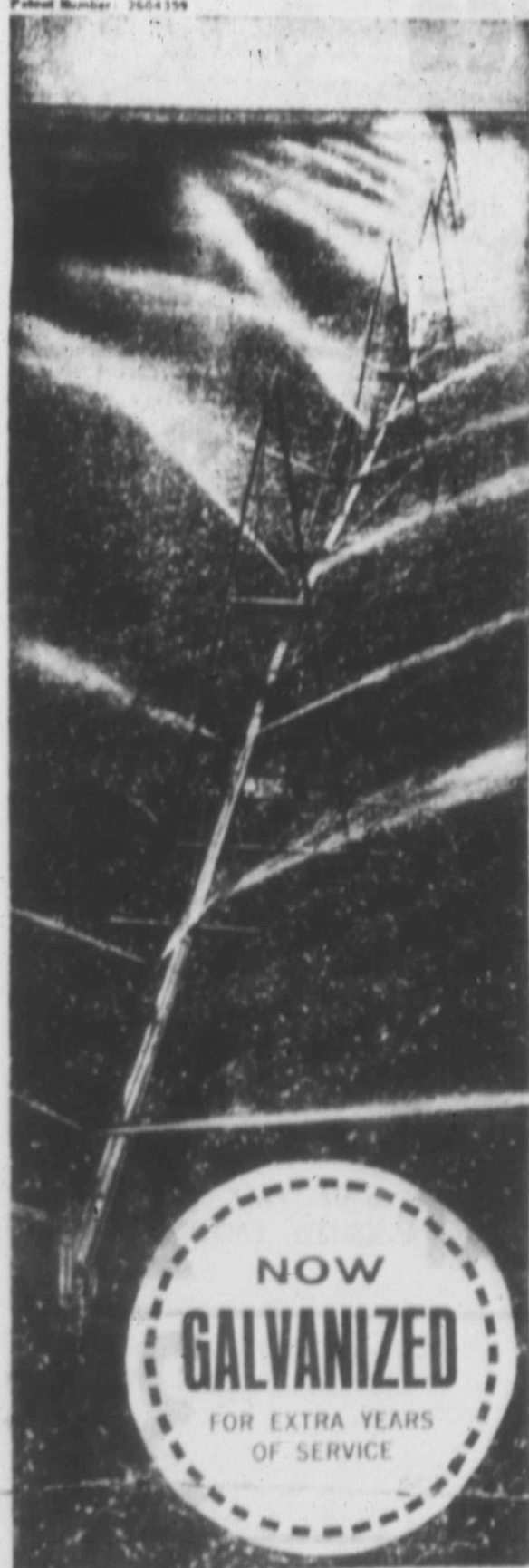

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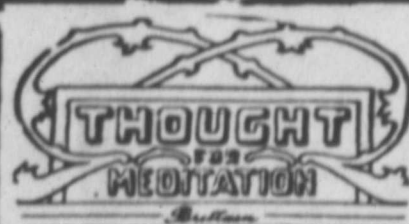
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
