## SCHOOL HIRES NEW TEACHER

Sudan Superintendent of Schools W. E. Hancock announced this week that one new teacher had been hired since school dismissed, and at the same time announced the resignation of Coach Troy Chitty.

Coach Chitty resigned this week to accept a job with a pharmaceutical company. He and his family will be living in Amarillo.

Mrs. Georgeann Byerley is the new teacher to be added to the teaching staff here. She is an elementary major with a degree from West Texas State University. She has had five years experience and will be teaching the

third grade.

Resignations previously have been accepted by the school board of five other teachers who were members of the faculty last term. They are Mr. and Mrs. Larry Magness, Mrs. Marvin May, Jerry Tonroy and Patsy Seymour.

Daily attendance in last year's term of school was down to the extent that the school is to have three teachers less for the 1968-69 term than the number of teachers last year. This also requires some re-organization, Hancock said, in the upcoming school term in order to adapt the program schedule to fewer teachers.

The superintendent stated that, with Coach Chitty's resignation, there are still two vacancies to be filled on the teaching staff, a reading and art teacher is needed for the 4th, 5th and 6th grades and a social studies teacher and Junior High coach.

The Sudan Schools opening date has been tentatively set for Sept. 3, dependent on the building being released by the contractors at that time.

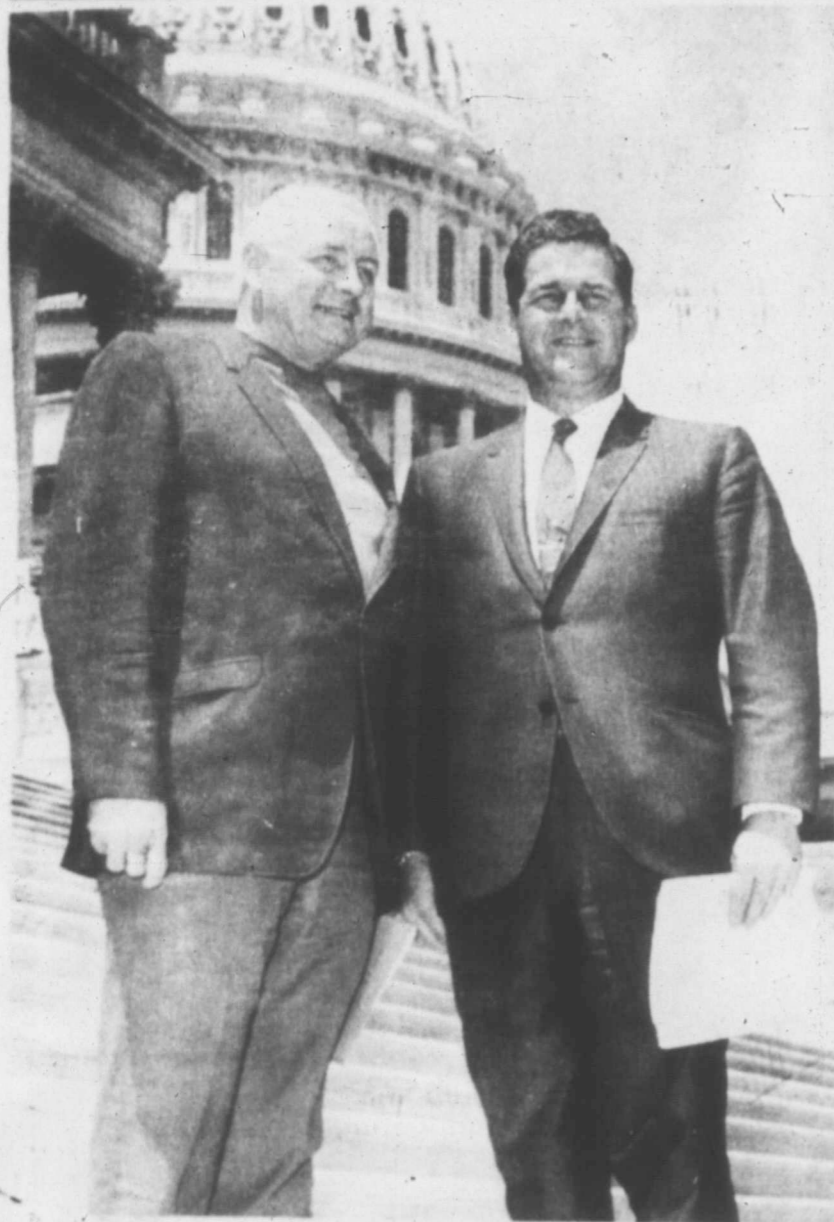

Scripture: St. Luke 5:18-20; 1 John 5:1-15.

"And when they could not find by what way they might bring him in because of the multitude... When in meditation and prayer we do not understand God's answer, 'Try Reading Directions'. God has given us His Word, His directions, for living day by day, for walking with Him all the way through this present world and into Heaven. He wants us to pray until we are able to hear His answer. He expects us to read His Word which He has recorded and preserved for us. And if we do this earnestly seeking His way, He will teach us and guide us and He will stay with us, His Spirit abiding in us. Then we are to go obediently at His direction.

Just as the friends of the man, who was ill with palsy, could not find a way to bring him to Jesus because of the crowd, even so today we are blocked by the 'crowd', the multitude of worldly, brilliant, educated and uneducated, glamorous and popular persons, in our efforts to bring our friends and loved ones to Jesus. Sometimes we hasten in our desire to bring them to Jesus if we see a time 'gap' in the multitude of things or through the crowd. And sometimes, we must be patient (always telling in word and deed that we have found the Savior and ask them to 'Come and See'), and wait, while our loved one tries things of this material world, until 'all else fails and they are helpless (sick with a palsy) before we can bring them to Jesus. But there is a way, if we keep climbing and with all our strength keep trying to 'get on the housetop' and let them down, helpless and humbled before the matchless purity of Jesus as the crowd looks on.

But, Christians, in exultant joy, I ask you to read your directions and look at what Jesus did. 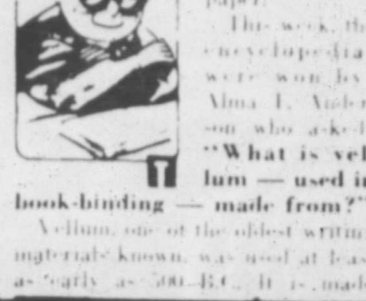

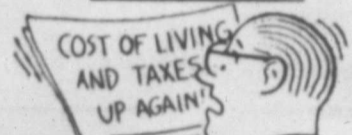
