Methodists Elect New Bishop; Assigned To This Area

The Rev. Dr. Alsie H. Carleton, 58, became a bishop of the United Methodist Church on the 13th episcopal ballot taken July 25 at United Methodism's South Central Jurisdictional Conference July 24-27 in Oklahoma City.

Bishop Carleton received 280 votes, with 221 needed for election.

Since 1964, the new bishop has been professor of church administration and director of field education and conference courses of study at Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas.

Upon announcement of his election by Bishop Noah W. Moore, Jr., who was presiding, the bishop-elect was escorted to the

conference platform by two Dallas bishops under whom he had served. They were Bishop William C. Martin, retired, and Bishop W. Kenneth Pope of the Dallas-Fort Worth Area. Mrs. Carleton was escorted to the platform by Mrs. Pope and Mrs. Paul E. Martin, wife of the bishop of the Houston Area.

A native of Texas, the bishop was educated at McMurry College (bachelor of arts), Abilene, Texas; Southern Methodist University (bachelor of divinity), Boston University and the University of Chicago. Texas Wesleyan College, Fort Worth, awarded him an honorary doctor of divinity degree in 1951. He was ordained to the Methodist

ministry in 1938 and his pastorates included St. John's Methodist Church in Lubbock, First Methodist in Big Spring, and University Park Methodist in Dallas. He was superintendent of the former Dallas Northeast District from 1961 to 1964.

Bishop Carleton was appointed to the new Area, named the Northwest Texas-New Mexico Area, and assumed the duties of resident bishop upon his consecration Saturday noon, July 27, in St. Luke Methodist Church in Oklahoma City. He and his wife, the former Artha Blair Crutchfield, will be moving to Albuquerque about the middle of August.

Scripture: St. Luke 23:42; St. Matthew 7:23; 10:32, 33.

"A good, moral person", apparently, is said of many people. But any man or woman who is truly good; is good only in Christ Jesus. The heart of man is above all things the most deceitful.

One may be morally clean, in action, and even kind on occasion. But, to clarify what I mean about being good — your action, good or bad, is not what will get you or me into heaven.

How long — oh how long will it take for all of us to realize that God, being a Holy God, only can give us credit for doing His work in His service (for when one does good it is God's work for He is the Maker of good) through

Jesus' testimony of us. God knows us only as His children through Jesus Christ — until we accept Jesus (because that is the will of the Father for us so to do) He will say, "I never knew you, depart from me, ye that work iniquity." Any person who will not accept Jesus as the only begotten Son of God is the only acceptable offering to God in payment for my sin and yours.

As the thief on the cross next to Jesus said, "Lord, remember me," he was not saying remember my good deeds or bad deeds, but he was saying "remember me, for I do believe you are the only begotten Son of God with power to save me — to save all mankind — from death and hell into eternal life." The thief evidently had nothing much to brag about, even to offer Jesus in return for His love, and a great deal to be sorry for. Most of us are like that, but, regardless of all that, it is our faith through acceptance of Jesus as Lord that saves us, for then His shed blood covers, blots out, our sin and God remembers them against us no more. And then, loving obedience to follow Jesus is all important.

So, one may do ever so many good deeds, and get only the satisfaction and praise of man (which is fine but goes no further than the grave), for God does not know us, except as we believe and do His will, which is that

"no man be lost" and have faith to accept Jesus as Savior and Lord.

One Way — Jesus Saves! No works, no good deeds, no achievements of mine or yours can save us, only as our sins are covered by the shed blood of Jesus — and by faith we take Him! How about you? Are you enjoying that uneasiness one feels in the midst of the "for a season pleasures" of sin? Or do you want a peace and joy and assurance and love forevermore, that makes physical death only a stepping stone to a higher realm of life?

In other words, if you're going to tell fish stories, you'd better talk like a fisherman. To foster improved relations between novices and old hands, the folks at Mercury outdoors have come up with a few suggestions that will get any beginner off to a good start.

Certain words always ruffle the feathers of the pro. Pole heads the top of the list. Poles are something you would fly flags from or push a boat with. Except for the cane variety, which is an unmentionable in some quarters, poles have nothing to do with fishing. Substitute rod and you're safe.

Fish smash, strike, bust or hit a plug, but never bite it. Bites and nibbles immediately reflect the use of bait — never recommended when spinning a yarn.

Call your outboard rig her. It's the only other gal in the lives of men to which wives seldom object.

Use local fish names only. A speckled trout in Florida is considerably different than a speck in Ontario. A lake trout becomes a mackinaw in the west, and a togue in the northeast. And you'd better call bream "brim" or be denounced as a carpenter.

So choose your words with care, advise the lads at Mercury outdoors. You may not be able to make other fishermen believe you, but at least you can hold their attention.

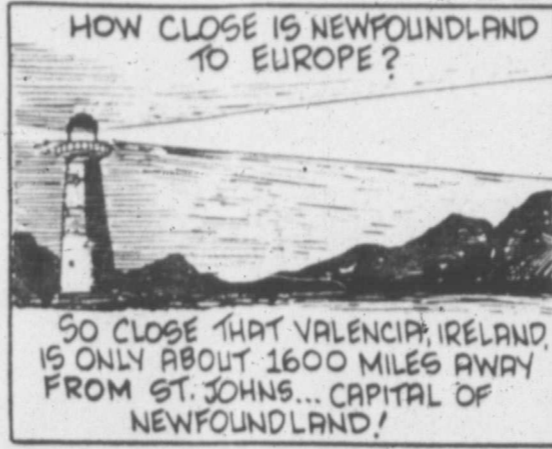

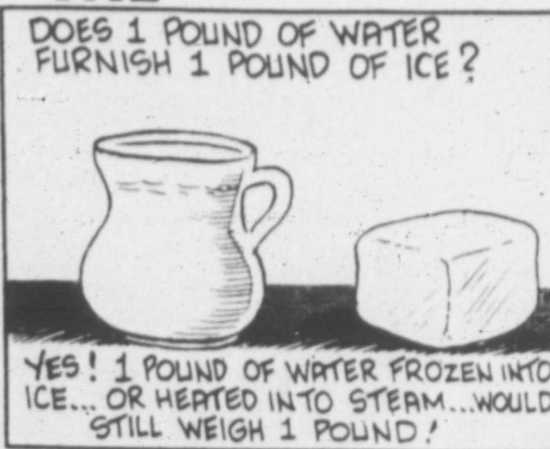

PHONE COMPANY REDUCES RATES

A reduction of long distance rates goes into effect for General Telep'one Company of the South west customers August 1 as a result of the recent ruling by the Federal Communications Commission which ordered the American Telephone and Telegraph Company to reduce interstate long distance rates by \$20,000,000 annually.

The reductions will be 5 to 10¢ from the charge for the first three minutes on daytime weekday station-to-station calls. These are calls placed between 7 a. m. and 5 p. m. Monday through Friday.

This is the 23rd time interstate rates have been cut since coast to coast service began in 1915. During that time, the cost of transcontinental calls has dropped to as little as \$.75 (station-to-station between midnight and 7 a. m.) from \$20.70 in 1915.

Long distance rates have been cut in half since 1945 in contrast to 77% rise in the consumer price index.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not

in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital.

"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution.

"This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized herein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJRA)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law, and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension, retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; provided, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

"AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Student Council Workshop Held

Four Sudan High School students spent what they said was a most enjoyable and profitable five days last week on the Texas Tech campus at a Student Council Workshop, sponsored by the University.

The 1968-69 student council officers attended the workshop with Kenneth Noles, their sponsor. They were Dick Black, pres.; Connie Lance, vice-pres.; Sharon Wilson, sec.-treas.; and Rex Boyles, parl.

C. W. Edwards from Monterey High School in Lubbock, served as workshop director. Earl Reum from Denver, Colo., was consultant for the week. He is known nationally for his abilities in working with student council members. This was his first visit to Texas; so his gift from the workshop was a Stetson hat.

Reum helped point out different ideas on making each student council a better one, and the workshopers discussed various problems to be dealt with in their own high schools. Each day a new subject was presented by the consultant. They included "A Chance to Get Involved", "A Chance to Choose Purposes and Projects", "A Chance for Group Organization", "A Chance for Group Discovery", "A Day for Achieving Leadership", and "What to Take to Your Home Council".

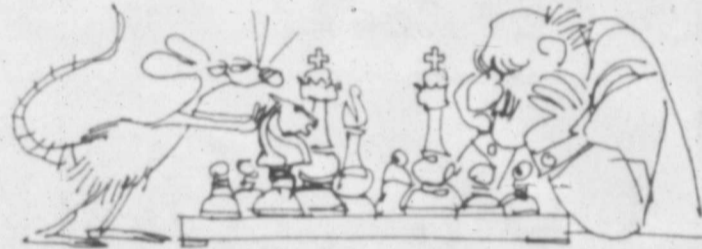
Crossword Puzzle

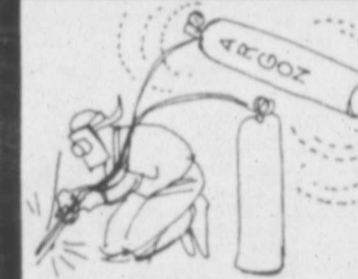
SCIENCE SKETCHES



YOUNG RATS that enjoy an "intellectually enriched" environment grow bigger and better brains, a University of California researcher reports. He said "convincing" differences were found between rats raised in isolated, barren cages and those provided "the best, most expensive education available to any young rat at the university."



FOOD made from crude oil may help sustain India's hungry millions in the future, reports a University of Southern California authority on petroleum engineering. Research on extracting proteins from crude oils is being conducted in that country.
