THE ELECTION is over, and by the time you read this the wire services will be launched on an endless series of post-mortems about why so-and-so won and how come what's-his-name lost.

The political speeches will be ended for awhile, at least so far as those by candidates seeking election, but they'll be resumed to varying degrees in the next year and the one after that, and especially four years from now.

The thing that bothers me most about the just-ended campaign was the heckling which all of the candidates received. There should be a law against heckling political speakers, and it should be enforced with stiff jail terms.

It doesn't matter who is speaking; he should be accorded the courtesy of either a silent or appreciative audience. Those who disagree with the views of the speaker should stay away or get up and quietly walk out.

There was a time when the sort of heckling, campus uprisings by students, violence in the streets, etc., that this nation has experienced in recent months was practically unknown in the U. S. A. It was the sort of thing you expected to read about Europe. But this nation, too, has allowed the dissenters to run wild.

There are lots of speakers I don't like, but I certainly never would stand out at the edge of the crowd and try to drown them out, or throw bottles or apples at them.

A group of Rotarians in Tucson, Ariz., the other day walked out on a hippie speaker, and a university vice president who also was a member of the club, scolded the others. Said he: "I don't agree with him, but as our invited guest, he is entitled to be heard courteously, and instead of hearing his story, we have abused him."

This guy was only half right. I'd back the walkouts 100 per cent; it's better to walk out than to shout insults or throw things, or to the other extreme, just sit there and pretend to agree.

The thing is, they shouldn't have invited the guy in the first place.

The Sudan Hornets battled the weather and a determined

Springlake-Earth football team Friday night to a 34-8 win over the Wolverines.

Rain and hail really came down just before kickoff time, and light rain continued throughout most of the first half of the game. The ardent fans took cover under the stands, in the booth, and anywhere they could find shelter from the hailstones. However, out they came as soon

as the downpour slackened and were there to cheer on their team on both sides of the stadium.

Sudan quarterback Steve Martin started the scoring early in the first quarter with a 55-yd. touchdown run. Halfback Jerry Bellar, with a wet football, tried to run the two extra points, but was short of the goal line. The Hornets held their 6-0 lead for only a few plays, as Wolverine QB Hoyt Glascock took the ball in to score on a 51-yd. run. Fullback Terry Bridge was successful in his try for two points, and Springlake-Earth was leading, 8-6.

The second quarter was a defensive battle. Only once was there a threat to score from either team, when the Hornet guard Mickey Gilbert recovered a Wolverine fumble on the 46 yard line, and the Hornets moved on down to the one yard line. But a penalty cost them 5 yards, and they failed to make it in four attempts. At the sound of the horn at halftime, the Wolverines were out in front of the Hornets, 8-6.

All the Hornet team seemed to need was to get accustomed to being all wet and muddy, for they came out fighting for a score in the second frame. Hornet tackle Harvey Willeby recovered a Springlake-Earth fumble on their 18 yard line, and a few plays later Larry Hanna carried the ball in from the 4. Try for two points failed as Martin slipped on the wet field and was down. But Sudan was now in the lead, and late in the third quarter Steve Martin recovered another Wolverine fumble on the 43. They marched on downfield, and Hanna again went into the end zone from six yards out. Bellar ran the ball over for the two points, and Sudan was leading 20-8.

Early in the 4th quarter, Hanna made a 40-yd. run to the Wolverine 10, where the Hornet worked on down to the 4, as Hanna plunged through for a 3rd TD. Martin ran over for two points, to boost the Hornets to a 28-8 lead. A few plays later Rex Boyles covered another Springlake-Earth fumble on the 30, where they moved down the 10 and HB Billy Gore carried the ball for another six point try for two extra points failed and the score was Sudan vs Springlake-Earth 34-8. The Wolverines fumbled again their 30, and Monte Roberts was there to cover for Sudan. Failed to make a first, the ball was over to the Wolverines on the 25. But when time ran out, the Hornets had won over the Wolverines, 34-8.

The Hornet offense scored points in the second half, as the defense held the Wolverines to 3 first downs and only yards total in that frame.

Outstanding on defense for Sudan was Hanna, David Weaver Roberts, and Billy Ford. Hanna was also out front for yards rushing with 145, followed by Bella with 122 yards.

The Hornets, with a 7-1 record for the season, will play there Friday. Game time in the Kress stadium is 7:30 p. m.

Brenda Joy Harper Rites Held Monday

Funeral services for Brenda Joy Harper, 17, who died Saturday in West Plains Hospital, Muleshoe, from injuries suffered Tuesday in a car-train collision near downtown Muleshoe, were held Monday, 2 p. m. in the First Baptist Church.

Rev. Walter Bartholf, pastor of the First Christian Church in Muleshoe, and Rev. Jack Garrett, pastor of the First Christian Church of Brownfield, were the officiating ministers. Burial was in Sudan Cemetery directed by Singleton Funeral Home of Muleshoe.

Miss Harper, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Harper of Sudan, was an employee of the Sudan Beacon News and was a senior in the Sudan High School.

She was a member of the Future Homemakers Association, news editor for the school paper, and was manager for the girls basketball team.

This was the 75th fatality in 1968 resulting from traffic accidents on the South Plains. Miss Harper's sister, Joan, 15, was also seriously injured in the crash.

Survivors include the parents and sister, and a brother, Gregory, of the home; her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Harper of Sudan and Mr. and Mrs. Henry Sager of Littlefield; and other relatives.
