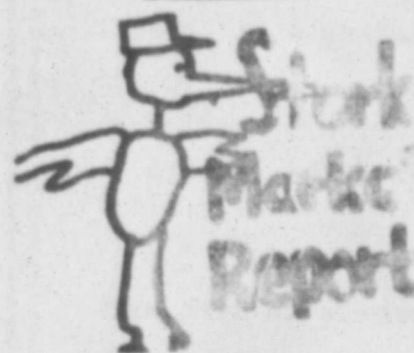
### FFA Sweetheart

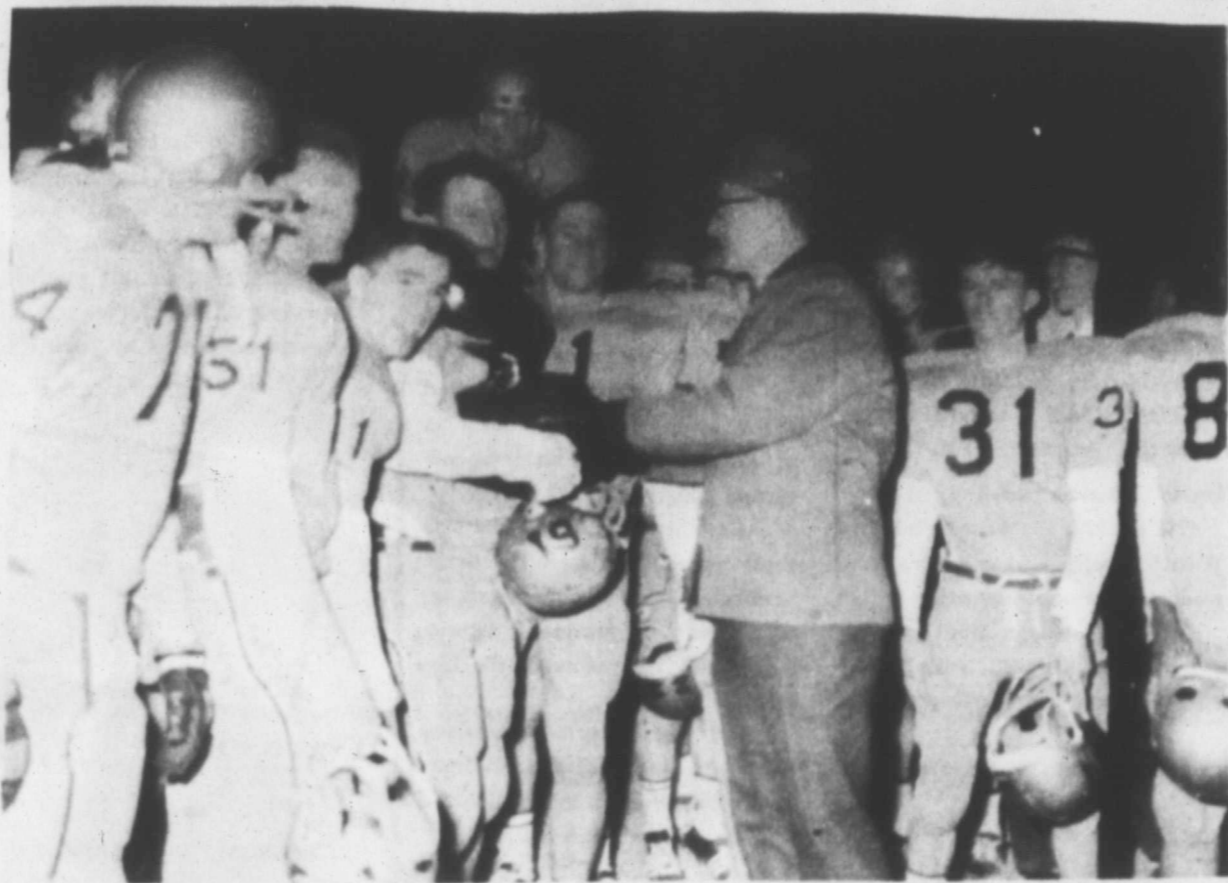

## HORNETS WIN REGIONAL TITLE

Football Coach Jim Cain's Sudan Hornet team won the regional title Saturday at Borger by downing Gruver in a cold, windy, rugged game, 20-14.

The Hornets will play Sonora Friday night, 7:30 p. m., for the Quarter-Finals crown at Odessa in the W. T. Barrett stadium, near the Junior College. Going into Odessa Via Seminole-Andrews Highway (385), continue on Main Street to 27th St., turn right for 3 to 4 blocks and you will be at the stadium. Sudan is the home team and will be seated on the west side. Tickets are on sale now at Supt. W. E. Hancock's office -- \$2, and \$1 for students.

Sonora won their Regional title by defeating Coahoma in San Angelo last Saturday night, 7-6.

In the game against Gruver, the Hornets and the Greyhounds started off in a defensive battle during the first quarter with neither team able to score.

Gruver moved the ball to the Sudan 8 early in the second quarter, where the Hornet defense held them on downs, and Sudan took over on the 8 yard line. They moved the ball downfield 69 yards on seven plays, with QB Steve Martin passing to End Joe Hines for 40 yards, and Martin went over from the 1 yard line for the touchdown. HB Jerry Bellar kicked the point and the half ended with Sudan leading 7-0.

Early in the third quarter, Sudan fumbled twice, but Bellar recovered one fumble, and Dex Baker recovered another. Midway the quarter, Bellar took a Gruver punt on the Hornet 25, found an opening to the left side, received good blocks from his teammates, eluded the last defender at the 30 yard line,

and turned on the speed for a 75-yard run for the TD. He kicked the point and gave Sudan a 14-0 lead. The Greyhounds took the kickoff, and moved downfield 53 yards in five plays, with QB Ken Jones scoring their first touchdown from 5 yards out. Jones carried the ball over for two extra points, to cut the Hornet lead to 14-8.

Gruver was faced with a 4th down and 6 to start the last quarter, and they made it to keep their drive going. They marched on down to the 1 yard line, where Jones went into the end zone for another 6 points. The Gruver kick was off to the left, and the score was tied 14-14 with Gruver leading 3 to 2 in penetrations.

Sudan, with only 5:45 remaining on the clock, took the ball with 70 yards between them and the goal line. Bellar, Martin, and FB Larry Hanna all making yardage on the ground, and they moved down to the 2 yard line. Two minutes remained, and a determined Hornet team worked as Hanna carried over on a third down play for the TD, and the try for two points failed. Bellar kicked off into the end zone, and Gruver had the ball with 1:27 minutes remaining. The Hornet defense really hit hard, and stopped Gruver cold and short of a first down. Sudan took the ball and ran out the remaining 41 seconds to end the game in victory, 20-14.

Bellar was top ball carrier with 117 yards rushing. The football team, with coaches Cain, Bill Adams, Tommy Laceywell, and DeWayne Gray will leave by chartered bus at 1 p. m. Friday afternoon. A chartered bus for the fans will be going to the game Friday, if the fans want it. Anyone wanting to go by bus may call 227-3751 by noon today (Thursday).

### In Viet Nam

ANHOA, Vietnam, Nov. 19-- It was a sad-day for enemy soldiers who started a firefight with a squad of Leathernecks.

As Co., 3rd Bn., Fifth Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division swept toward a tree line, estimated platoon of North Vietnamese (NVA) soldiers took them under fire.

B-40 rockets whirred toward the Leathernecks, Lance Cpl. Rudy Nava, 18, of Wilson, Texas and his assistant, moved their machinegun into position. Nava silenced the enemy rocket launcher with a burst of automatic fire as the fired missiles exploded harmlessly in front of the Marines.

Shortly thereafter, the Leathernecks opened up with mortars

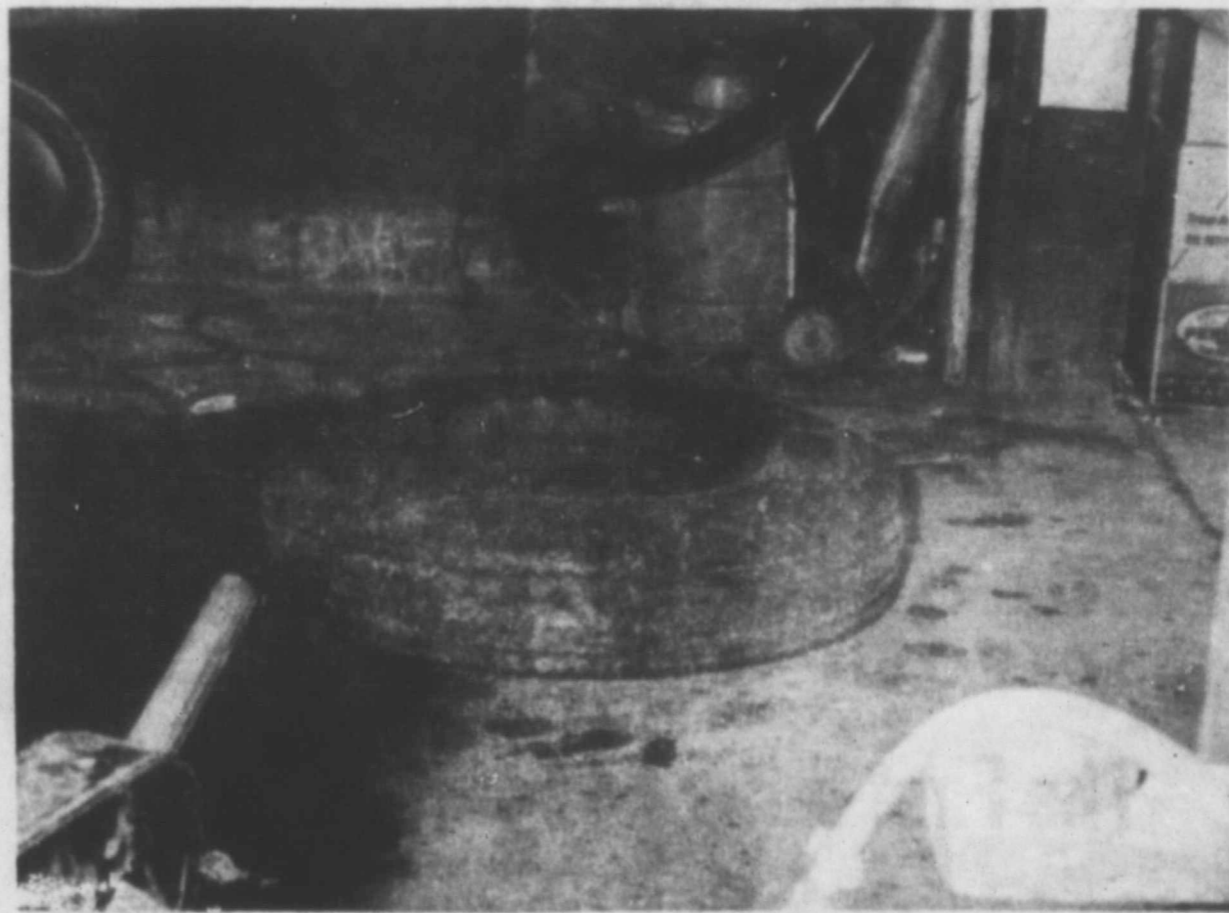
"It was ridiculous," recalled Nava. "It was almost as if they didn't even expect we'd return fire. Once we did, they didn't want any part of the battle."

**COTTON CLASSING REPORT**

The three Cotton Classing Offices of the USDA in this area classed 216,000 samples of new crop cotton last week ending Friday, Nov. 29, 1968. This brought the total for the entire season to 695,000. Five hundred six thousand (506,000) samples had been classed on the South Plains this time last year.

Predominant grades were Strict Low Middling, Middling Light Spotted, and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted. These three (3) grades represented 70 per cent of the total classed.

The average staple length from the South Plains area last week was 1-inch.

Micronaire readings by percentages were: 3.5 - 4.9, 42

per cent; 3.3 - 3.4, 13 per cent; 3.0 - 3.2, 28 per cent; 3.7 - 2.9, 15 per cent; and 2.6 and below, 2 per cent.

The average Pressley tests, which is the breaking strength of the fibers, for the Lubbock area was 83,000 pounds per square inch, for the Lamesa area was 84,000 pounds, and for the Brownfield area was 85,000 pounds.

Prices reported to the Consumer and Marketing Service of the USDA at Lubbock ranged from \$5.75 to \$10.00 per bale over the Government loan value for White grades, and \$7.50 to \$12.50 per bale over the loan for Light Spotted grades in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range.

Average cottonseed prices paid to producers was \$49.00 per ton.

**HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL**

**AUSTIN Tex.**--When Preston Smith becomes governor on January 21, it will be to the tune of marching bands and at least five dance orchestras. Smith has revealed plans for a gala inauguration reminiscent of the 1950's.

A big Congress Avenue parade will follow his swearing-in at noon that day, and after a brief rest Governor and Mrs. Smith will lead off the dancing at a grand ball. They'll be honored with at least four other balls during the evening.

Last time the capital witnessed such a celebration was when Price Daniel took office in 1957. Then more than 20,000 well-wishers danced 'til dawn. But inaugurations have been rather sedate since then. Governor Smith said he'd reveal more details of his inauguration in a couple of weeks.

**SMITH PREPARES FOR OFFICE**--Gov.-Elect Preston Smith says Harold K. Dudley will be his top assistant and that he will beef up the Texas governor's staff dealing with federal programs.

Dudley, 44, Smith's chief campaign organizer, was manager of the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce.

Smith said he "will have to have some additional" staff members to work with rapidly-expanding federal-state relations issues. He revealed that Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge, who is Governor Connally's Washington liaison man, can stay on if he wants to (as can several other middle-echelon Connally aides), but that the Washington office must be expanded to do an effective job.

Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo may also be tapped for government duties in the new administration, Smith indicated -- though probably not as secretary of state. He is considering "three or four" for that post.

Smith pledged to continue his "open door" policy as governor and to hold regular weekly news conferences.

Governor-elect Preston Smith recently announced the appointment of Jerry Hall of Austin as his press secretary.

Hall, a veteran of almost 20 years of newspaper work which began at the Avalanche-Journal, Lubbock, is Capitol Bureau chief for Newspapers, Inc., including the Austin American-Statesman, Waco News-Tribune and Times-Herald and the Port Arthur News. Appointment of the press secretary was Lt. Gov. Smith's second major appointment since his election. He has named Jim Oliver of Austin as budget director.

Hall, 42, a native of Stanton in West Texas, has been with the Capitol Staff of Newspapers, Inc.

Hall and his wife, the former Mary Frances Vestal of Dublin, live at 3400 Enfield Road. They have three children, Martha, 15, Dick, 14, and Julie, 8.

The new Press Secretary has won many awards for distinguished reporting, including a first place award for newswriting from the Associated Press Managing Editors, a special citation from the Headliners Club for a series on County Government, and several other Headliners awards.

Hall is a journalism graduate of Texas Tech. He was editor of the University newspaper while at Tech.

Hall started his professional

career with the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal in 1949, doing stints as reporter, copy editor and telegraph editor.

He joined the copy desk of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram in 1956. Hall served on the Washington staff of Congressman George Mahon of Lubbock in 1957-58.

He returned to the Avalanche-Journal in 1958 as a special assignments reporter, political writer and city hall reporter. He remained in Lubbock until joining Newspapers, Inc. at the statehouse.

Hall is a World War II veteran of the Air Force.

He is a Presbyterian and active in Boy Scout work.

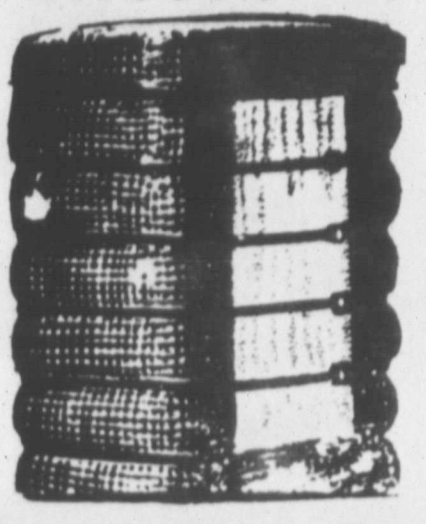

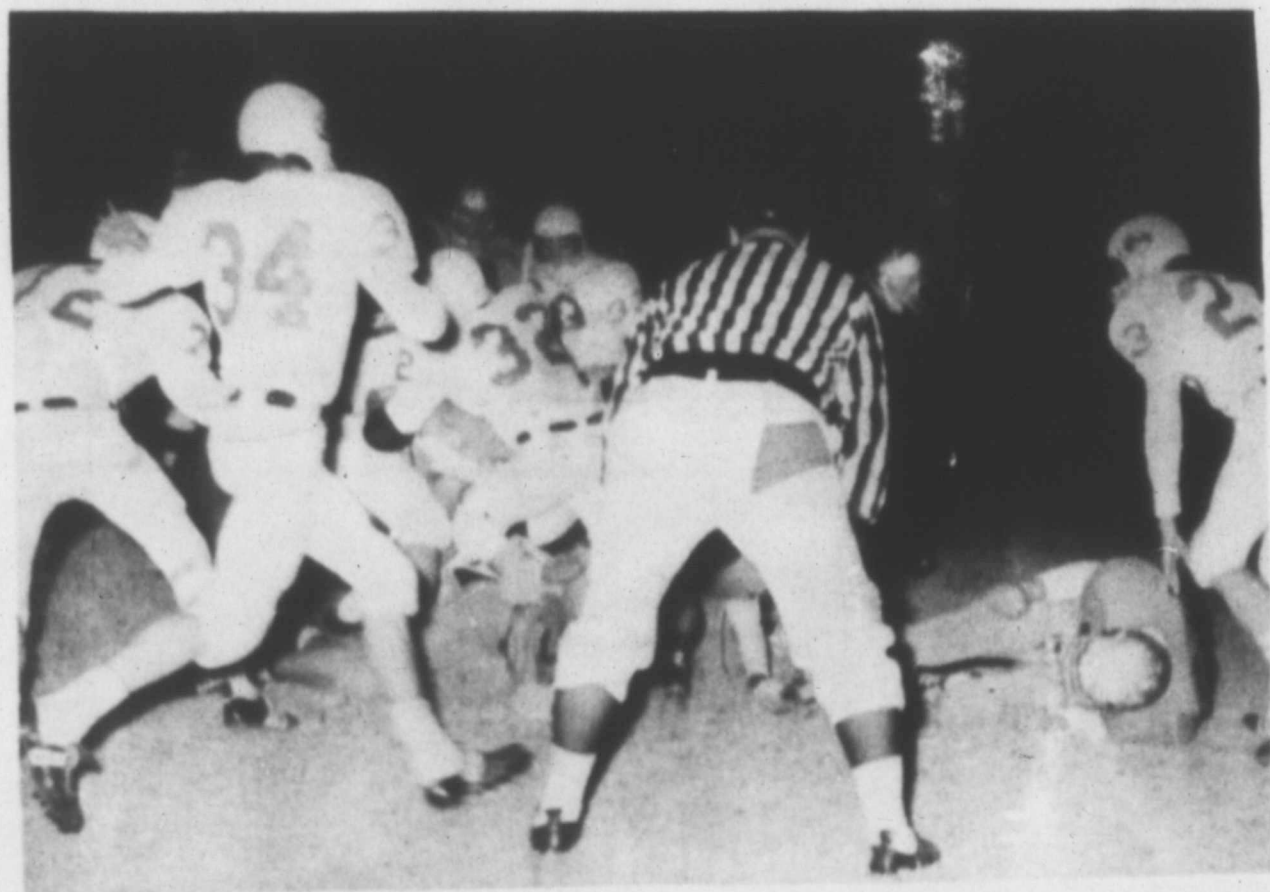

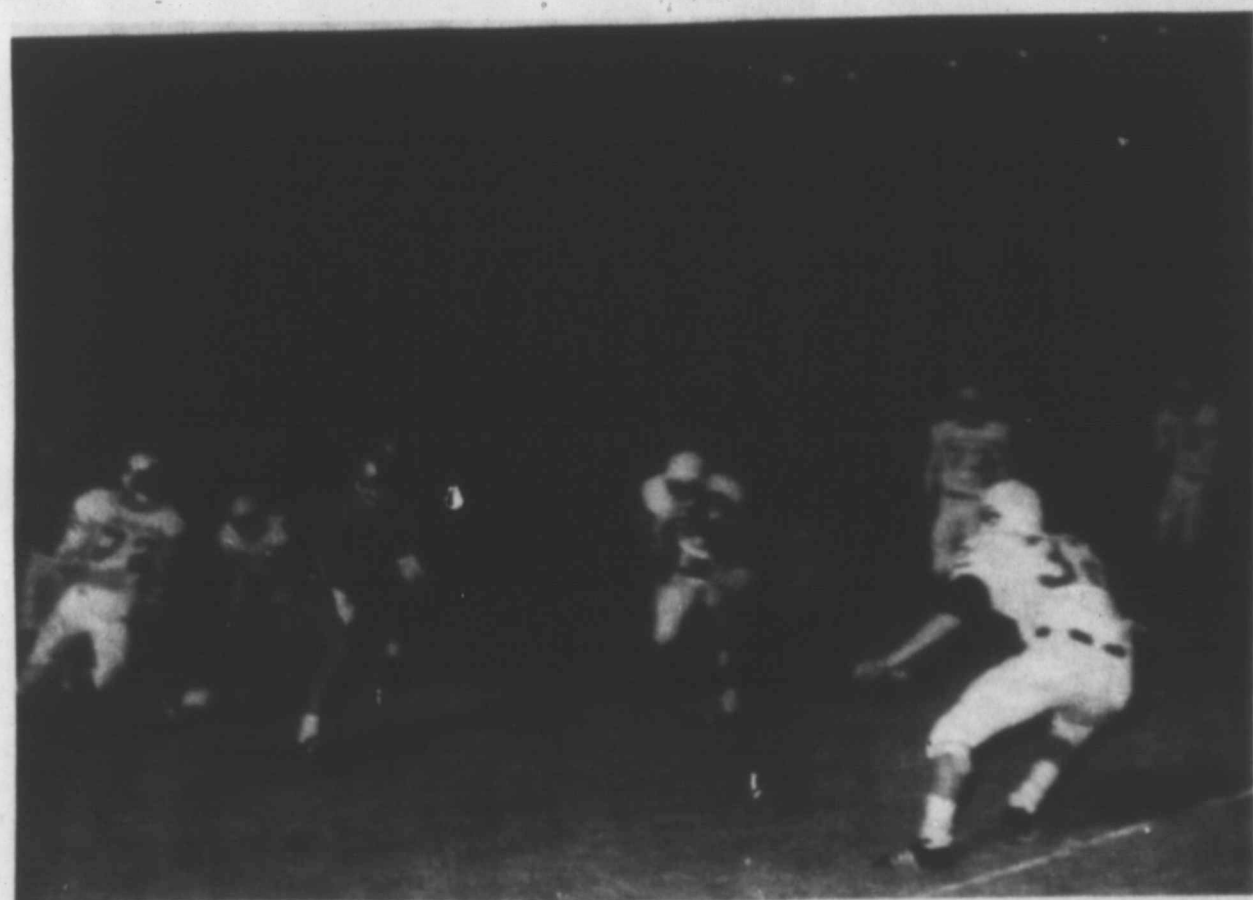
