Plant In Works For Hereford

Texas Meat Packers, Inc., of Dallas have announced plans to construct a \$2 million meat packing plant to be located at Hereford.

Initially, the plant hopes to employ 150 people, and slaught-er around 8,000 head of cattle per week.

The company's Dallas plant, whch employs 500 people, will do all of the processing and shipping. Whole carcasses will be shipped by rail to Dallas. Texas Meat Packers is jointly owned by Archie Sloane and Joe Spiritas. It has been in operation about 25 years.

Wilson and Co., Inc. had previously announced options on land near Hereford with intentions of building a packing plant. That company has since merged with Ling-Temco-Vought, Inc. (LTV), and it is not known how the merger will affect Wilson's Hereford plans, along with the announcement by Texas Meat Packers the past week.


Mrs. Everitt **To Amarillo**

Social Security **Credit Possible Despite Losses**

Farmers who have a loss from their farming enterprise can get social security credit for as much as \$1600 per year. This is possible because farmers, unlike other businessmen, can report either their actual profit or loss, or report under an optional method. By the optional method, a farmer reports two-thirds of his farm gross up to a \$2400 limit, or \$1600 net.

This special advantage for farmers was written into the law since they cannot always control their income because of natural disasters such as droughts.

Since a person's monthly social security benefit is determined by how high his average monthly earnings are during his working life time, it is to a farmer's advantage to report under the optional method and get at least some credit rather than having a blank year on his record because of a business loss.

After figuring his actual net profit or loss on the Schedule F of a tax return, both the actual figure and the optional amount are listed on Schedule F-1. The farmer then has the choice of reporting whichever crediting to his account. The



The following spray schedule is recommended: Spray the peach tree or trees with either Carbaryl (Sevin), malathion, methoxychlor or diazinon when 75 per cent of the blossom petals have fallen. Make the second or shuck split application 10 days after the first application with one of insecticides listed for first spray. Then 10 to 14 days after the second application make the third spraying with one of the recommended insecticides and 14 to 21 days later make a repeat application of the number three spraying.

The home gardener can do a satisfactory spraying job with a small power sprayer or a hand sprayer if close attention is given to the thorough coverage of the tree. It's important to use enough spray to wet all fruit, leaf and bark surfaces. Should infestations of fruit-

damaging insects occur following the completion of recommended spray schedule, Carbaryl can be used effectively up to within one day of harvest. Insecticides are essential tools in the home garden; however, they should be used in accordance with the rate and safety directions printed on the container label.

It is well to remember that Carbaryl may be applied to peaches up to one day before harvest; that malathion should not be used within 7 days of harvest; methoxychlor within 21 days of harvest and diazinon within 20 days of harvest.

Sulphide stains, from atmosphere permeated with coal gas or direct contact with hard boiled eggs, permanent hair wave solution, and other sulphur solutions, use six per cent hydrogen peroxide. Place a clean white cloth over the spotted area and pour a liberal amount of the peroxide, available at drug stores, on the cloth. Allow it to remain on the spot from 30 minutes to an hour. If the spot persists, allow the cloth to remain over night. Do not let the hydrogen peroxide solution come in contact with stained or laquered wood, or permit it to seep into the seams of upholstery, since it will weaken cotton thread.

To remove tar, asphalt and creosote, wipe off as quickly as possible with a cloth dampened with kerosene or naphtha. Tar left for any length of time will produce an indelible, yellow-

brown stain.
