The second quarter scoring went to the Broncos as they made 20 points in this quarter. One of these was due to a Hornet fumble on their own 26, and Sonora covered the ball. The Hornets fought hard to get on the scoreboard again before the half, followed by a Martin pass to Hanna for a 14-yard gain to the Sonora 21. On the next pass, Sonora intercepted on the 1-yard line, fumbled the ball and Sudan recovered on the 3 when the clock ran out with Sonora leading Sudan at the half, 26-13.

The third quarter was a defensive battle with neither team scoring. The Bronchos attempted a field goal which failed when all they could see was Hornet Guard Monte Roberts as he'recovered the ball for Sudan. In the last quarter. End Joe Hines received a pass from Martin, operating on the Broncho 23, at the 7 and went on over for the TD. Bellar kicked the point, and the score was 26-20, Sonora. The Hornet defense really went to work, hitting hard as they forced the Bronchos to fumble on the 38 yard line when Roberts again covered the ball for Sudan. The Hornet hopes were high, as they had the ball with four minutes left in the game. But the heartbreaking play came, when they fumbled and Sonora recovered the ball. But the fighting Hornet defense held the Bronchos, forcing them to punt on 4th down, with 2:07 left on the clock. The Hornets got a clipping penalty on the punt, which put them back on the 5 yard line, 95 yards from where they wanted so much to be. They tried desperately to get away a pass and also a running play completed, but had to give up the ball with only 6 seconds remaining, and Sonora won over the Hornets, 26-20,

The Hornets lost this game, but they played a good game, and the Sudan School and community canbe justly proud of this team. This game with Sonora could have gone either way, with only a 6-point margin.

Redlands, Calif. - The father of a teenage girl who vanished last March has mailed letters to more than 10,000 newspapers in the United States and Canada, asking help in finding her.


