The same story noted that the allied commands reported 4,063 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese battle dead in one week, and 6,813 the previous week, bringing the total enemy killed to 10,876.

The summary for the war according to figures given to the Associated Press, show 32,712 Americans killed in action since Jan. 1, 1961. The enemy had 461,256 killed in those eight years, according to Allied sources.




