Give this a whirl, and see if after reading it, you're like we are: wondering why we Americans are such big dopes:

The payroll deduction for Social Security went up to 4.4 per cent on January 1, based on earnings up to \$6,600, and the company paying the wages has to match it, for a total of 8.8

per cent on most paychecks. In 1966, the person making \$6,600 paid \$277.20 and his boss matched it for a total of \$554,40. This year it will be \$290,40 on each, for a total of \$580.80.

Suppose a fellow started out right now at the age of 21, and suppose he worked to the age of 65.

If there were no more increases in Social Security payments, this would mean total contributions by this young fellow and his employer of \$25,-555.20 during the 44 years he was working.

If these contributions were placed in a trust fund accuring 4 per cent interest per year, the interest over 44 years would amount to approximately \$22,-500.00. That means at age 65, the employee would have at least \$48,055 in the bank drawing 4 per cent interest.

With that amount of money, the employee could draw, when he reached 65, \$160 per month for the rest of his life in interest alone and never touch the principal.

. . . .

Or if he wanted to spend what he had accumulated, he could draw out \$560 a month for the next ten years and in addition could work and earn as much as he wanted to without losing this income.

This maximum amount now payable under the retirement plan is between \$124.00 and \$135,90 per month.

This sorta makes one wonder if the Social Security program is bona fide old age retirement and survivor benefit program or if it is a political football being kicked around by the politicians in order to gain votes.



Chiefs Scalp 'Lopes For 18th Season Win

Frustrated by four losses in their five second half district games, the Friona Chieftain basketballers broke out of a long slump here Tuesday, walloping Abernathy, 74-47.

The Squaws remained in the thick of the fight for the second half girls' title with a 47-

Friona's girls are 5-1, the same as Abernathy, but both ere a game behind Floydada, unbeaten the second half at 6-0 Abernathy plays at Floydada Friday.

The Chiefs trying for the fourth time for their 18th win of the season, finally got some breaks. A 30-point performance by Eddie Wood, his best personal scoring total, sparked the win. The 74 points were the most scored by the Chiefs this year, and it was the team's biggest win over Abernathy in three

A great second half brought the win, as the Chiefs beat Abernathy with a fast break in the face of a full-court press.

Abernathy led during the early part of the game, with neither team able to hit the borad side of a barn. Friona held together long enough to come from behind for a 23-20 halftime lead.

The Chiefs began to use the fast break to good advantage in the third quarter, and with Wood kicking in six quick points, the team took a 10-point lead for the first time, 37,27 with 3:20 left in the quarter.

The Abernathy boys seemed to tire in the fourth quarter, as Friona was able to get open for numerous lay-in shots. It was 62-42, Friona, by midquarter. Reserves entered the action and helped pile onto the

The Squaws survived some shaky places to post their 24th win of the season, although they never were in serious trouble.

overtime after 44 hours. By 1917, this will be increased. to \$1.60 per hour and overtime after 40 hours. Most hospital employees are already on a 40hour basis, he said.

The payroll increase will, in itself, cost the hospital an additional \$18,000 per year, it was observed. This amounts to \$1500 per month.

The increase in room costs at the hospital could bring an additional \$2,000 per month into the hospital coffers, based on a recent average of 400 patient days per month.

Several expenses are involved in administering the Medicare program, Barnett stated.

The hospital officials asked the indulgence of their customers in accepting the price increases as necessary to maintain the hospital's well-
