The act was quite a hit even then, and if it's true what the publicity releases say about the sisters gaining poise and professional class, then Friona people are in for a treat at tonight's Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Just being able to see and enjoy good entertainment such as the Brooks Sisters will offer isn't the only good reason for attending the banquet.

This is the "kickoff" for Friona's Chamber of Commerce activities for 1967. All Frionans who pride themselves in being a part of this year's anticipated growth should attend the banquet.

It's our big once-a-year community fellowship, where we all get our yearly-pep-talk and then pitch in to build our city up.

Porter Roberts, Friona Fire Department public relations officer, came by to remind us this week that the fire department has several items which it is glad to loan out when they are needed.

Included are a resuscitator and oxygen tank, a wheel chair, crutches and walkers.

This "humanitarian side" of the fire department is one which is not often plugged. Residents appreciate the firemen for their devotion to duty. But the department also has this service angle which it is proud of.

As this is the time of year when most of us are wrestling (or at least should be) with income tax forms and wondering if we or Uncle Sam is going to come out ahead, we thought our readers might be interested in the following piece.

"We're borrowing it from the Ochiltree County Herald. It states some facts which we had feared were true all along, but had not taken the time to add up.

Give this a whirl, and see if after reading it, you're like we are: wondering why we Americans are such big dopers:

The payroll deduction for Social Security went up to 4.4 per cent on January 1, based on earnings up to \$6,600, and the company paying the wages has to match it, for a total of 8.8 per cent on most paychecks.

In 1966, the person making \$6,600 paid \$277.20 and his boss matched it for a total of \$554.40. This year it will be \$290.40 on each, for a total of \$580.80.

Suppose a fellow started out right now at the age of 21, and suppose he worked to the age of 65.

If there were no more increases in Social Security payments, this would mean total contributions by this young fellow and his employer of \$25,555.20 during the 44 years he was working.

If these contributions were placed in a trust fund accruing 4 per cent interest per year, the interest over 44 years would amount to approximately \$22,500.00. That means at age 65, the employee would have at least \$48,055 in the bank drawing 4 per cent interest.

With that amount of money, the employee could draw, when he reached 65, \$160 per month for the rest of his life in interest alone and never touch the principal.

Or if he wanted to spend what he had accumulated, he could draw out \$560 a month for the next ten years and in addition could work and earn as much as he wanted to without losing this income.

This maximum amount now payable under the retirement plan is between \$124.00 and \$135.90 per month.

This sorta makes one wonder if the Social Security program is bona fide old age retirement and survivor benefit program or if it is a political football being kicked around by the politicians in order to gain votes.

A letter with his subscription renewal from D.W. Hanson of Inglewood Calif, reminds us that the Friona Sentinel was published by G.A. Harris from 1908 to 1915. He wonders, and so do I, what may have become of these old newspaper files. Does anyone have a clue?

**Brooks Sisters To Star At Chamber Banquet**

Friona residents have the opportunity to see a really professional act as the entertainment portion of the annual Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet tonight at Friona High School.

The banquet portion of the annual event gets underway at 7:30 p.m. at the high school

cafeteria. It will be followed by the entertainment at 8:30 p.m. at the auditorium.

Tickets still remain for the event, at \$4 each. Tickets may be purchased for the entertainment portion of the event only, at \$2 each. Both types of tickets may be purchased at the door.

The Brooks Sisters, three girls from Denton, Tex. who have vaulted from the East Texas town to the ABC-TV color-sound stages in Hollywood, are the featured attraction.

The girls are Malyn, 17, who is the organist; Elaine, 15, the pianist; and Annette, the "imp" 12, on the drums.

In 1964 the girls were brought to the attention of Dallas agency, Joan Frank Productions, whose manager Dick Leonard was so impressed with their "star quality" that he arranged to fly the booker of the Ed Sullivan Show to Dallas so that they could be seen.

Within two weeks of the Dallas audition, they were on the Sullivan show, and unheard of for the Sullivan show, were again presented two weeks later on the same show. They later accompanied Mr. Sullivan for his six-week summer engagement at Lake Tahoe.

After touring some of the largest state fairs of the nation with several "name" stars, the girls transferred their headquarters to the West Coast in late 1966.

Annette landed a spot on the NBC color show "Swingin' Country," where she was seen with such stars as Rusty Draper, Molly Bee, Roy Clark and others.

Since moving to Hollywood, the girls have worked on their already - superlative act, and now all play guitars, as well as using quite a bit of choreography in their act.

Coming up for them are more "shots" on the Ed Sullivan Show, and just prior to the late Walt Disney's death, the Disney studios were planning a featured part in forthcoming Disney film productions for the act. For the moment, this is postponed, but as plans at the Disney studios go forward, it is confidently felt that these appearances will be jelled.

OWN EXPENSES RISE

**Hospital Reveals Room Rent Hike**

Parmer County Community Hospital, following a meeting of its board of directors recently, has announced an increase of \$5 per bed per day for its room rent structure.

H.E. Barnett, hospital administrator, explains that there are three basic reasons for the

increase in the hospital's charges:

(1) The hospital is under the minimum wage law for the first time, causing increases in its payroll setup; (2) General price increases or costs of operation and (3) Medicare.

"The board feels badly about

the hospital's price increase, but feels it is the only way it can continue to operate and stay in the black," Barnett said.

He explained that while hospital employees generally are already above the minimum wage requirements, the areas where this is not true caused a general pay increase across the board, amounting to roughly 10 per cent.

The raises do not affect the doctor group nor himself, Barnett explained.

It had been about two-and-one-half years since there was a general pay increase for hospital workers.

Barnett pointed out that under the present minimum wage requirements, the hospital must pay at least \$1 per hour, with

The show will be held in Friona next weekend, February 17-18.

Judging the steer division will be H.M. (Flip) Breedlove, vice president and agricultural representative of the Farmers State Bank, Clarendon. The steer show will be held on Saturday.

The swine and sheep will be judged by Bobby Lee, vocational agriculture instructor at Wilson High School. These divisions will be judged Friday, February 17.

Jerry Adams, vocational agriculture instructor at Abilene, will pre-judge the swine and sheep early Friday morning.

Billy Graham Movie Is Coming To Friona

"The Restless Ones", considered the most successful motion picture yet produced by Evangelist Billy Graham, will be shown in Friona, March 3 and 4 at the High School Auditorium. Cooperative To Host Washington Tour

All-expense paid trips to the nation's capitol city will be awarded to winners of an oratorical contest which was announced this week by Leo Forrest, manager of Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative, Inc. The contest is open to any boy or girl at least 16 years of age but not 18 years of age prior to September 1, 1967. Mr. Forrest said, "Winners will join winners of similar contests sponsored by other electric cooperative across Texas on the third annual Texas Electric Cooperatives Government-In-Action Youth Tour to Washington, D.C. All expenses of the 13-day trip beginning June 8 will be paid by Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative, Forrest said. Each entrant will be required to give a five to eight minute talk on the subject "My Future in Rural Texas" and answer one or more of 50 questions asked by the judges. The oratorical contest will be judged on the basis of (1) knowledge of subject - 40% (2) speaking ability - 30% (3) poise - 10% (4) personality - 10% (5) appearance - 10%. Interested young people may obtain an official entry blank from their school or the offices of Deaf Smith County Electric

Cooperative. The deadline for submitting entries will be February 17, 1967, Mr. Forrest said. As participants in the Texas Electric Cooperatives Youth Tour, local contest winners will travel by chartered bus to Washington, D.C., where they will spend four days visiting places of historical interest and seeing the nation's government in action. On Wednesday, June 13, the Texas group will meet more than 800 students from other states for a program sponsored by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association and the Rural Electrification Administration. The program will feature presentations by officials of these organizations and other Washington personalities and possibly the Presidential staff. The eventful day will end with a charter cruise down the Potomac which will include entertainment and refreshments. Also included on the 13 day agenda will be visits to the following: George Washington's Mount Vernon home, Arlington National Cemetery, the U.S. House and Senate, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the Smithsonian Institute, the Lincoln Memorial and other places of interest.

# Chiefs Scalp 'Lopes For 18th Season Win

Frustrated by four losses in their five second half district games, the Friona Chieftain basketballers broke out of a long slump here Tuesday, walloping Abernathy, 74-47.

The Squaws remained in the thick of the fight for the second half girls' title with a 47-36 win.

Friona's girls are 5-1, the same as Abernathy, but both are a game behind Floydada, unbeaten the second half at 6-0. Abernathy plays at Floydada Friday.

The Chiefs trying for the fourth time for their 18th win of the season, finally got some breaks. A 30-point performance by Eddie Wood, his best personal scoring total, sparked the win. The 74 points were the most scored by the Chiefs this year, and it was the team's biggest win over Abernathy in three years.

A great second half brought the win, as the Chiefs beat Abernathy with a fast break in the face of a full-court press.

Abernathy led during the early part of the game, with neither team able to hit the board side of a barn. Friona held together long enough to come from behind for a 23-20 halftime lead.

The Chiefs began to use the fast break to good advantage in the third quarter, and with Wood kicking in six quick points, the team took a 10-point lead for the first time, 37-27 with 3:20 left in the quarter.

The Abernathy boys seemed to tire in the fourth quarter, as Friona was able to get open for numerous lay-in shots. It was 62-42, Friona, by mid-quarter. Reserves entered the action and helped pile onto the lead.

The Squaws survived some shaky pieces to post their 24th win of the season, although they never were in serious trouble.

Friona stretched a four-point first period lead to eight at the half, 25-17. Late in the third quarter, with Cindy Ingram and Hazel Fallwell hitting the bucket, the Squaws took a 33-21 lead. Six quick points by Abernathy trimmed it at the quarter to 33-27.

The visitors trimmed the margin to five, 35-20, with five minutes to play, but Friona rose to the challenge. They caught Abernathy in a scoreless streak to stretch their lead to 47-34 with two minutes remaining.

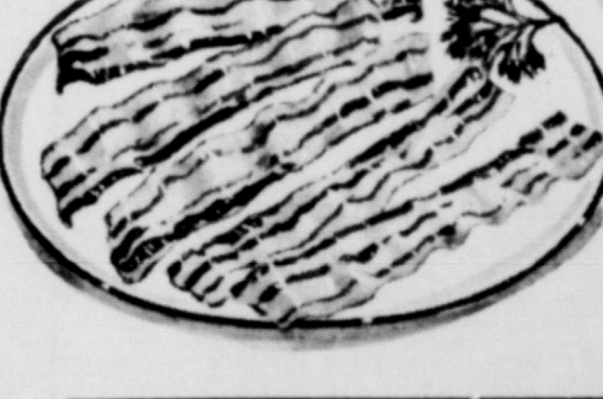

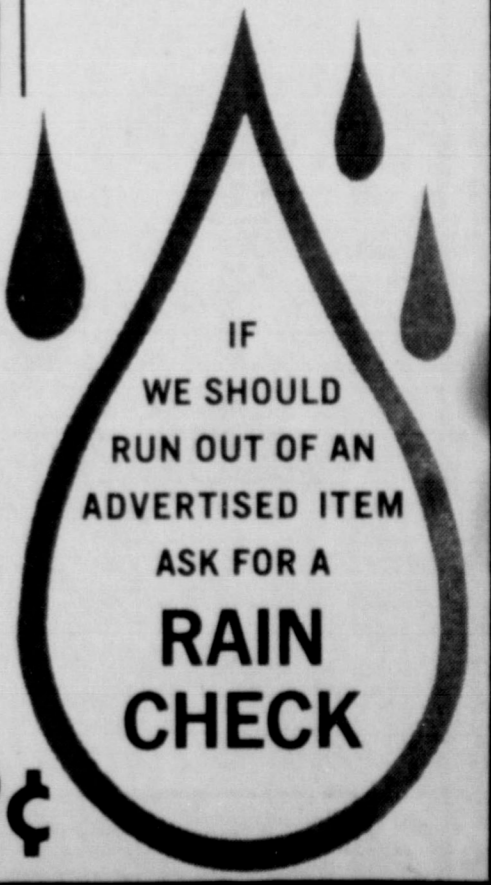

(Continued from Page 1) overtime after 44 hours. By 1977, this will be increased to \$1.60 per hour and overtime after 40 hours. Most hospital employees are already on a 40-hour basis, he said.

The payroll increase will, in itself, cost the hospital an additional \$18,000 per year, it was observed. This amounts to \$1500 per month.

The increase in room costs at the hospital could bring an additional \$2,000 per month into the hospital coffers, based on a recent average of 400 patient days per month.

Several expenses are involved in administering the Medicare program, Barnett stated. The hospital officials asked the indulgence of their customers in accepting the price increases as necessary to maintain the hospital's well-being.

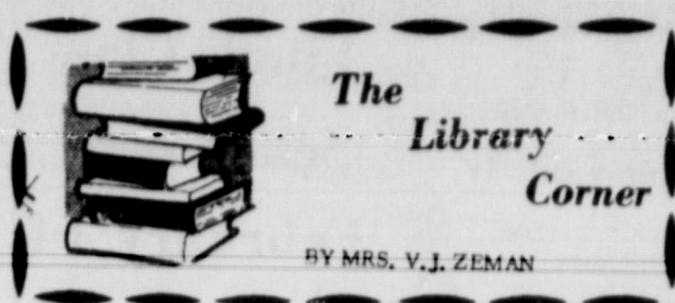

As a leader and teacher of young girls, not only will leaders teach her to use her sewing machine, but they will be helping her to develop skills that will give her pleasure all her life. Learning to use the sewing machine with ease, she will become more free to express her own creative ideas in making her clothes. The first pre-requisite to teaching is becoming familiar with the cleaning and care of the machine. After this, a series of lessons will be given on the use of the machine. These meetings are scheduled for March.

Some 4-H leaders want to start their clothing project work early and this seems to be a good idea too, -- waiting until schools are out create many conflicts such as Bible Schools, vacations and etc.

Much thought and study has been given in recent years on the process of aging. To the younger group this seems a very uninteresting and far-away subject. However, unless one plans to die young, they will reach that stage in the life cycle sooner or later.

Many counties now have a committee on aging whose purpose and function it is to study problems and help promote educational programs which will be of value or interest to older adults. A list of suggested program ideas and activities for County Committees on Aging, local committees and professional groups who are interested in promoting the welfare of senior citizens is available through your County Extension Office. The Home Demonstration Agent will be happy to assist and furnish you with ideas and programs, based on research of special needs in the problem solving process.

The program ideas are certainly not entirely for those 65 years and over because today's middle-aged citizen is tomorrow's senior citizen. Some of the programs are designed to prepare to be 65 and over. The aging population is of major concern of Texas.

In the recent meeting of Parmer County Program Building Committee, the need for a county sub-committee for study of county needs on aging was suggested. More than 166 counties in Texas have begun to organize such a committee and 105 counties are fully organized. In Parmer County interest in this phase of our community development is needed.
