JUNE NATIONAL DAIRY MONTH

June has been designated as National Dairy Month. To help promote the use of milk in the diet, a Coffee Can Bread recipe is submitted by Lady Clare Phillips, Co. Home Demonstration Agent.

One may eat part of the milk as well as drink it. The minimum requirement is 2 cups a day for an adult.

To make the best use of time, a yeast bread can be made in less time than the ordinary bread by not having to knead the dough.

This bread is not as light as the ordinary yeast bread for it requires only one rising, but it is a tasty bread and easy to make.

COFFEE CAN BREAD

Put 1 package dry yeast, 1 tablespoon sugar and 1/4 cup warm water in a bowl. Cover and let stand until bubbles. (Takes about 15 minutes) Add yeast mixture to one tall can evaporated milk, 2 tablespoons cooking oil and 3 tablespoons sugar, teaspoon salt and 4 1/2 cups flour. Mix well. Divide in two parts and drop in two well greased coffee cans. (1 lb. cans). Punch down with spoon to remove all air. Place plastic lid on cans. (The ones that come with coffee cans). Press tight all around. Let stand at room temperature until lid pops off (takes about an hour). Remove lid and bread is ready to bake. Bake in moderate oven (350 to 375 degrees) about 45 minutes until crust is brown on top.

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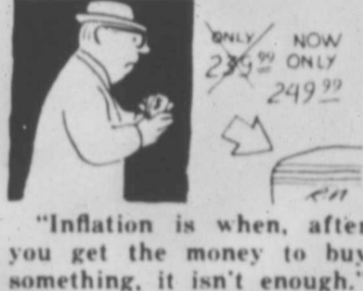

What Happened To Harvard?

Cartoonist and caustic commentator on the current scene Al Capp said recently that Harvard University had degenerated into a "combination pigpen and playpen."

Everyone except the anarchists and the lunatic fringe of the liberal left has been appalled at what has happened on the campus of the revered institution, Harvard University.

What is the reason for the disintegration in this renowned intellectual community?

Harvard was founded to provide education for young men, with the express purpose that this education was to be guided by the principle of dedication to truth, Christ, and the church. How far has Harvard strayed from this?

Radical Shift

Though established by men who revered the Bible and had uncompromising faith in God, the university became the citadel of leftist educational and political philosophy.

Of course, the evolution from the original philosophy of putting God first to the present attitude—which has produced the current chaotic condition at Cambridge—was brought about by a complex variety of factors.

But, underneath it all, the denial of the authority of the Bible should be recognized as a very significant determinant of direction.

Of course, I am aware that those who themselves deny the authority of the Bible will dispute this.

Nevertheless, it cannot be denied that those who believe

the Bible and who follow in the steps of the Master do not go about promoting anarchy.

They do not make it a practice to shout obscenities at all who disagree with them.

Students and others who are patterning their lives after the example set by the Nazarene do not act as the Harvard rebels have acted.

Denying the authority of the Bible was the first slippery step on the road which has led Harvard to the brink of anarchy.

Contrast

I have just returned home after attending the commencement convocation of Bryan College, a small Christian liberal arts college in Dayton, Tenn.

One thing which impressed me as being in sharp contrast with what is happening on some other campuses was this: each graduating senior, as he or she was handed the coveted diploma by the president, stepped to the microphone and repeated from memory a verse of Scripture.

A Negro girl was among those receiving diplomas. When her turn came to step to the microphone, she quoted from the prophecy of Jeremiah the words of the Lord, "Call upon Me and I will answer thee and show thee great and mighty things, which thou knowest not."

Doesn't it seem to you that a life based on this principle will be likely to achieve more than one which is based on the principle of disbelief, destruction and disorder?

Maybe if Harvard had not abandoned its dedication to God...

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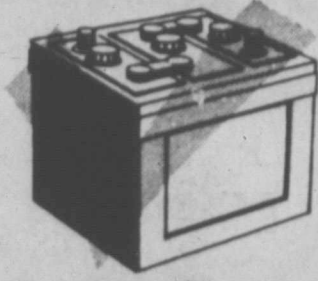
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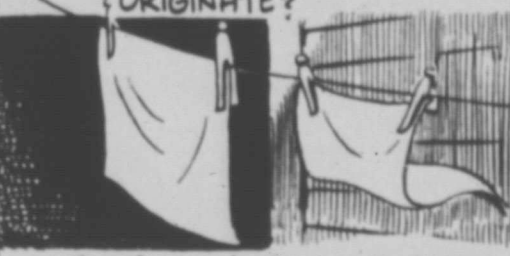

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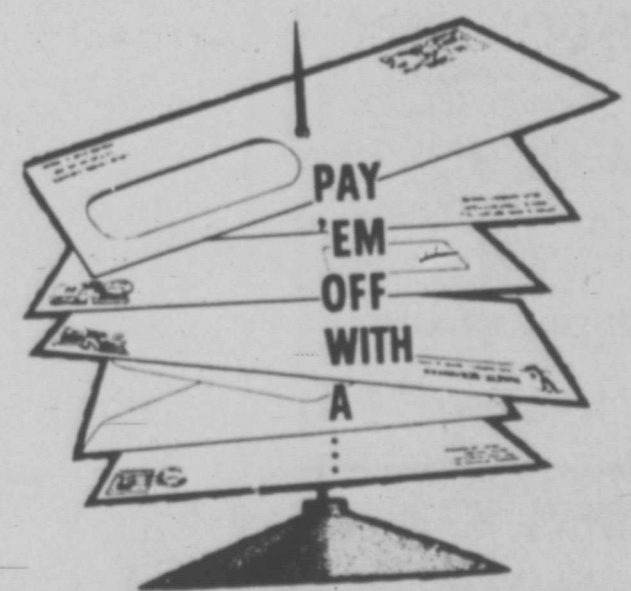
