SCHOOL BOARD HIRES TEACHER

The Sudan School Board of Trustees met Monday night when Mrs. Lois White was hired as high school math teacher. Mrs. White is the wife of the local Methodist pastor. They recently moved here from Idalou. W. E. Hancock reported that other vacancies and applications were also discussed but no decisions made at this time. He al-

so stated that the increased enrollment of the elementary school will necessitate the hiring of two additional teachers for the lower grades.

CITY ANNOUNCES CLEAN-UP CAMPAIGN

Arnold Reed, mayor of the City of Sudan, announced this week that the city is sponsoring an all-out Clean-up Campaign beginning June 16-30. He stated that all trash, weeds or other rubbish that is piled in the alleys will be picked up by city collectors. He asked that persons who have articles too large to be taken to the alley or too heavy for two men to load, to call the City office for special pick-up service.

He also announced the purchase of a specially developed fogging machine which is mounted on a pickup and operated by one man. The Thermo-Fogger puts out 175,000 cubic feet of dry fog per minute. A highly concentrated chemical, Baytex, is used that does not coat cars or other things. There is no waiting period for this chemical and fogging can be done as the

mosquitos arrive. Also in line with the insect eradication program, the city has put chemical in most of the area lakes that will kill the insects in the larva stage.

Reed stated however, that to make this program effective, the city must have the cooperation of all residents to keep their premises clean and free from standing water. He also stated that the same city ordinance that was enforced last year concerning the vacant lots, will apply this year and is being put in motion. Property owners that do not clean these lots will be charged for these services by the City.

Reed said that any clean-up campaign is as successful as the people of the city make it and stressed that if each resident will do their part, the entire City will be a better place to live.

Dorothy Jones, City Secretary, stated that persons wishing to be notified before fogging is done should call City Hall and leave name and telephone number.

Organizational Meeting Set By Museum Assn.

The date for the organizational meeting of the Lamb County Museum Association has been set for Thursday, June 26, 2:30 p. m. in the county courtroom at the Court House in Littlefield.

Plans were made for the organizational meeting at the regular session of the Lamb County Historical Committee held Thursday afternoon at the Reddy Room in Littlefield.

Mrs. S. D. Hay, Sudan, chairman of the Historical Survey Committee, sponsoring organization of the Lamb County Museum Association, pointed out to have a successful county museum all Lamb countians should participate in some way in this

effort to preserve our County historical heritage. Mrs. Hay stressed the small museum is the "museum of today" and statistics are proving this point in Texas. In 1964 there were only 90 museums of this type opened to the public; today there are 280 open to the public; and 120 are now in the planning stage.

Organizations in each town are asked to have representatives present for this meeting and one and all interested in assisting with the establishing of the museum are urged to be present. Antique collectors in any field are especially encouraged to be present to make suggestions concerning their particular field.

There will be special displays needed for the county museum other than articles used strictly by the Lamb County Pioneers.

To emphasize the importance of the small county museum, Mrs. Hay pointed out that many who will not take their children to the larger institutions will bring them to the smaller museum because they will not have to cope with traffic problems and other disadvantages.

The museum will serve as a visual history program for children in the county and the site must be selected from a standpoint of parking space; room for school classes to move through freely, economy, and also as a

tourist attraction.

Mrs. Roy McQuatters of Spade is chairman of the museum planning committee. At a recent meeting of the group, by-laws were prepared, and also a charter is being readied to present at the organizational meeting. Other activities at this first meeting will be the electing of officers and those who will be named to the Board of Trustees.

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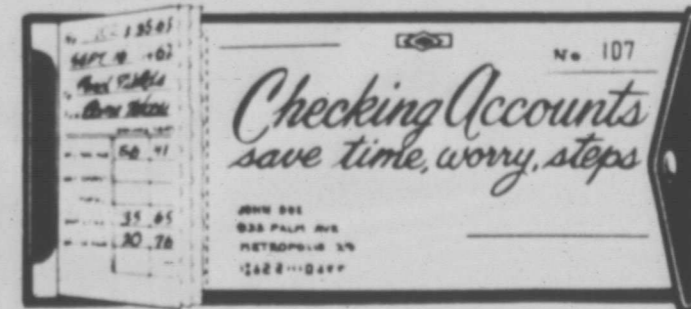
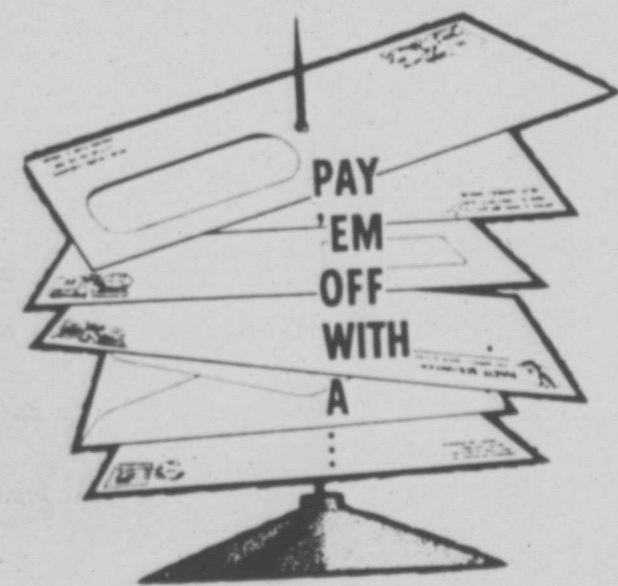
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SUDAN LOSES IN BABE RUTH LEAGUE

Lady Warden Heads Berlin Prison



Elisabeth Harre, 42, a tall and attractive brunette, is warden of Ploetzensee Prison for juvenile delinquents in West Berlin, the first woman ever to head a male prison in Germany. After graduating from law school and meeting considerable opposition from masculine prison authorities, she joined the staff at Ploetzensee in 1962, was named deputy warden two years later, and became chief in 1968.

At Ploetzensee, which can accommodate 465 inmates. At present there are also 100 adults under her supervision in a separate wing: Aged 14-24, the younger prisoners are serving anywhere from 6 months to 10 years. Except for the 6-month sentences which must be served in full, the boys are eligible for release after two-thirds of their time. A proportion of the inmates are repeat offenders, but the over-all ratio of younger delinquents convicted in Berlin has dropped sharply from 1.66% in 1961 to 1% in 1967.

The daughter of a theologian, Berlin's lady warden believes in rehabilitation rather than reprisal. She has already introduced reforms that include a "Halfway House," without bars on windows or locks on doors, and located outside the prison complex, where those serving the final 6 months of their sentence may work in town and return to prison only in the evenings. Weekend passes permit them to visit their families and attend sports events or the movies, theatre, etc. They also bring out a newspaper, hold a bazaar to sell prison-made items, and have a gala Christmas complete with stage and choir performances. To avoid a criminal stigma, prison terms served by juveniles are not recorded on their identification papers.

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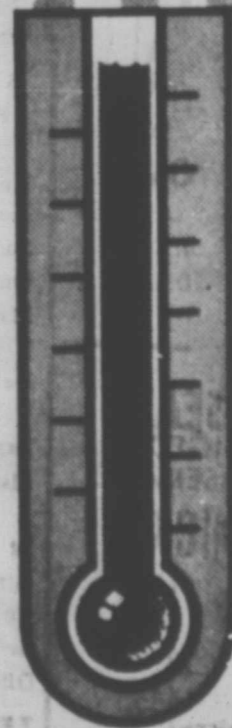
